Mother, who is the stamp-buyer for this firm, and who always comes in with the latest issue of the saddle-blanket type stamps, came in with one this week that marks the 175th anniversary of the Bill of Rights and shows an artist's conception of what the Bill of Rights is - postage-stamp-size.

The stamp shows a flat hand held up "stop-wise" against a surface, and opposite a fist is held up. Between the two are the words: "The rights of the people shall not be violated".

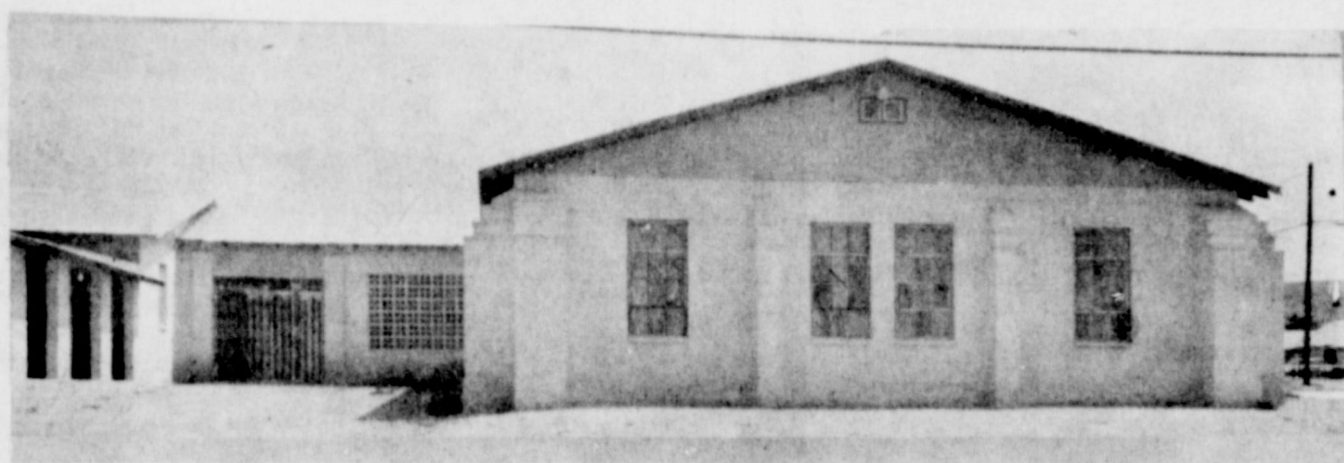

The Golden Jubilee of the designation of St. James Parish and the Silver Jubilees of the building of the present church and of the pastorate of Rev. N. Femenia will be observed this weekend in Sanderson.

Bishop Thomas Tschoepe of the San Angelo Diocese will celebrate a special community mass at 7:00 p. m. Monday; Bishop Sidney M. Metzger of the El Paso Diocese will preach the sermon at this service and Bishop Thomas J. Drury of the Corpus Christi Diocese will be present, as will other clergy of the three Dioceses.

The observance of the jubilees will begin with a High Requiem Mass at 6:30 a. m. Saturday for all of the faithful departed of the parish of the past 50 years.

At 9:00 that night there will be a special dance in the Parish Hall with an orchestra from Alpine furnishing the music.

On Sunday, there will be the regular masses at 7:00 and 9:00 a. m. and a free barbecue served in the Parish Hall at noon.

Monday will be the day for the religious commemoration of the Golden and Silver Jubilees and will begin with a mass at 7:15 a. m. for the parish and especially for the benefactors.

The special community mass that evening will be by the visiting church dignitaries.

The picture below was taken about 1901 after the arrival of Joe Kerr Sr. in Sanderson and prior to the changing of the name of the business to Hancock and Kerr following the purchase of an interest in the business by Mr. Kerr. The old store was the westernmost part of the old building which was destroyed by the flood. It later had two sections added to the east and a new front put across the south side on Downie St. The lower sign to the right of the shutter advertises a brand of shoes. The "S" in Hancock's is on a door giving access to the attic in the building. The third man from the left is Frank Harrell and the fourth is Joe Kerr Sr. The picture was furnished by Mrs. Frank Harrell.

Catholic Church History Noted

The history of the St. James Catholic Church is noted during the time of the observance of the Golden Jubilee of the establishment of this Parish.

According to files of The Times at the time of the dedication of the present building of the St. James Parish, there was no active congregation or resident priest here in 1901 when Joe Kerr Sr. and his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Kuykendall came to Sanderson. She wrote to the Bishop of San Antonio, relating to him the situation here and asked his help. A Father Magnon came to Sanderson from about 1902 or 1903 to 1907, coming first about every six months, then about three months between visits, and then about every month.

There was a small adobe building that was used as a place of worship by the local Catholic congregation. This was replaced in 1905 by a larger building that sufficed until the construction of the present building in 1941.

Money to buy the lot and build the old adobe building was raised by contributions.

Rev. Joseph Coulombe, who now lives in New Orleans, La., built the present rectory on lots donated by Ed McGinley and he served the local church from 1916 to 1918.

The present building was built on lots donated by Mr. and Mrs. Jim Kerr and was completed in 1941 which is the year that Rev.

Nicholas Femenia was assigned to the local church.

The history of the St. James Parish, originally a part of the San Antonio Diocese, was later made a part of the El Paso Diocese, and then transferred to the San Angelo Diocese at its creation in 1963, has been constantly mingled with the benefactions of the Joe Kerr and Jim Kerr families.

The church was named after St. James the Greater in memory of Mr. and Mrs. James Kerr, parents of the two brothers, Joe Kerr Sr. and James Kerr, pioneer Catholics and business men of Sanderson.

The church replaced by the present church, was known as Immaculate Conception and was located on Oak St. behind the D-R Furniture Outlet and was for years the warehouse for the Ochoa store.

Statistics compiled since the establishment of the Parish, show that there have been 2,783 baptisms, 1,192 of which have been by Rev. Femenia; 482 marriages, 240 by the present pastor; 319 deaths, 188 during the past 25 years.

Francisco Quesada and Maria Isco of Marathon were the first people united in marriage in the newly-formed parish. The marriage was performed November 4, 1916.

The first death recorded was a 3-year-old infant, Guillermo Cierro on October 11, 1916.

The first baptism after the establishment of the Parish was Guadalupe Salcido Beltran, son of Juan and Gertrudes Salcido,

on November 18, 1915. Mauricio Gonzales and Petra Lopez were the sponsors.

Rev. Femenia stated that the records of the church prior to September of 1916 were incomplete due to the fact there was no full-time priest.

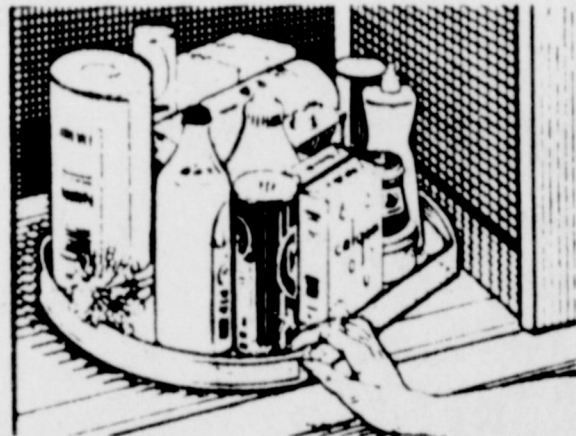

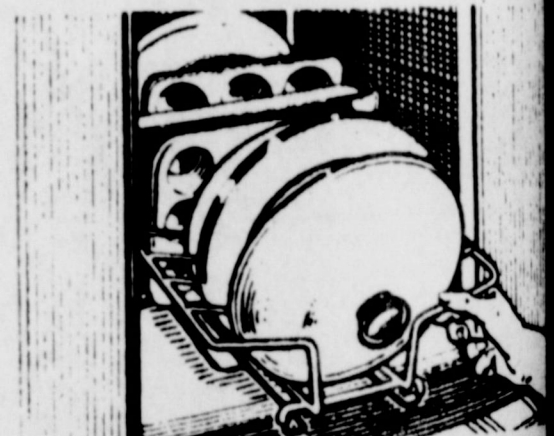

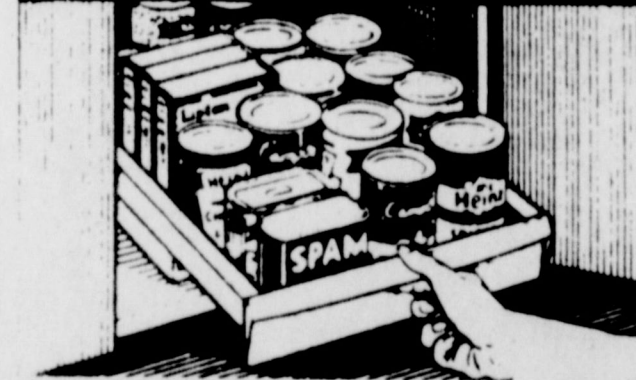

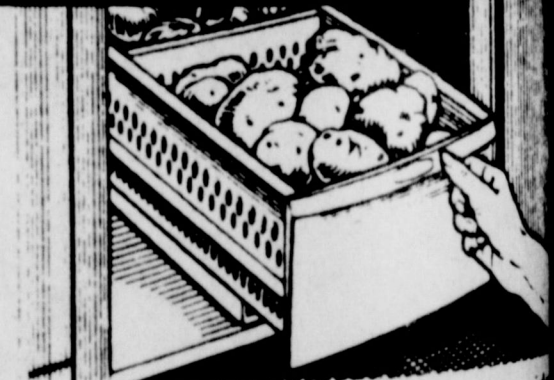
