No sooner had we said something about highway fatalities in this column last week, when there was another very freakish accident last Saturday morning early with another fatality.

This causes us to have some more to say about accidents, etc.

There is a move under foot to try to get some changes in the laws through the next legislature. These changes, if they come, will put more teeth into those things connected with highway accidents. For example, closer vehicle and driver examinations, stiffer penalties for driving while intoxicated, some penalties which can and will revoke a driver's license for a period of time, etc.

These changes in the law will come about only when the public gets tired of the loss of thousands of lives on our highways, and billions of dollars in property, and higher insurance rates. The public gets and can expect the kind of law enforcement they want, in whatever realm of their lives. And what is more, the public deserves the kind of law enforcement they demand!

All of us, when we get into a car to go on a trip, do not think for a minute that we may be involved in an accident on our trip. If that were so, we wouldn't go! But it is the truth!

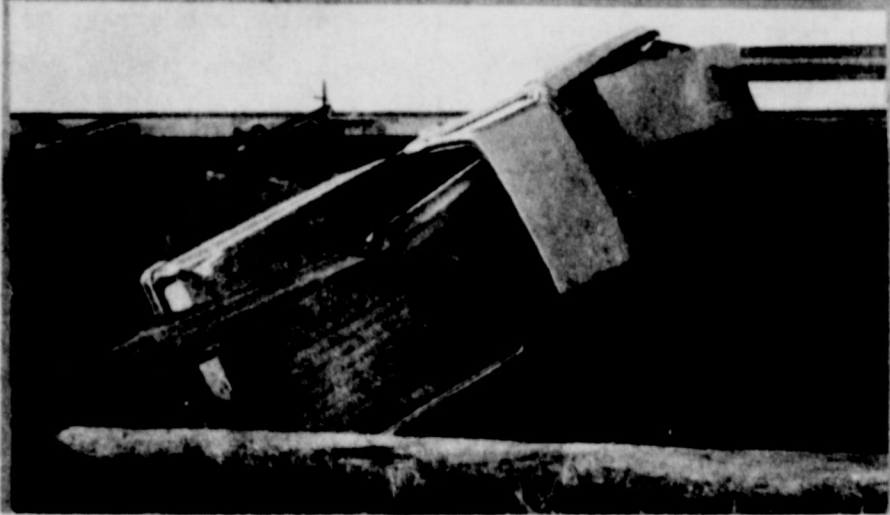
If you are in favor of more highway safety, then it would be in order to write to Gene Hendryx, your state representative, or to Dorsey Hardeman, our state senator, and tell him that you favor any action the legislature may take in increasing safety on highways and living away with the terrible state of lives and property.

And there is another aspect that we might predict, and we expect it to happen if nothing is done to curtail the trend - there will be federal patrolmen on our highways if we do not or cannot control the situation on the state level. There have been some murmurings about this already, and there will be more if our state doesn't do something about it.

We can accomplish greater safety by urging and demanding greater safety on our highways. And that is the only way that we can get it done.

Governor John Connally has named some to a committee to study new laws for greater safety on highways and recommendations are being sought, and support of the safety program is being asked for so that the legislators will feel free to go ahead and do what the people want. This is one realm where everyone should get behind the governor and the legislature and it for the sake of our citizens, regardless of whose idea was in the first place. The idea is good, regardless of its source.

There is also a move to get the state legislature to raise the pay of the classroom teachers in the state. This is a program that has been lagging for some time, according to many who are working for the salary raise, according to the national average, there is some room for continued to back page



Man Killed In Freak Accident Saturday Morning

Howard W. Myers, 23, whose driver's license address was Pineville, Mo., was killed instantly when the Ford Ranchero he was driving hit the end of a steel guardrail on a bridge 16 miles west of Sanderson early Saturday morning. Melvin Carl Shook of Lubbock, was a passenger in the vehicle and received serious facial injuries and was hospitalized in Alpine.

The guardrail went through the left side of the car, striking the driver in the head and decapitating him.

Fifty-one feet of the steel rail was torn loose and about 30 feet passed through the cab of the vehicle. The injury to Shook was caused by the rail.

The clock on the dash of the vehicle showed 3:30, but it is not known if the clock was in operation at the time of the accident.

The men had stopped at a local truck stop and inquired of the way to Lubbock, according to an employee at the station.

Following the accident, Shook caught a ride into Sanderson and the ambulance had to come back to town to get him to take him to the hospital.

Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, ambulance driver, said that Shook appeared to be in satisfactory condition.

Myers' body was taken to the Geeslin Funeral Home in Alpine. Mrs. Claude Hill, Justice of the Peace in Marathon, came to the scene of the accident and ruled death the result of an accident.

Texas Highway Patrolmen Gene Pate of Alpine and Malcolm Bolinger of Sanderson, stated that the vehicle was going at a very fast speed when it hit the end of the guard rail going west.

Four-Inch Snow Meets Local People Tuesday Morning

About four inches of snow fell Monday night and Tuesday morning on this area and it melted down to .45-inch, according to the Soil Conservation men, Chesley Wilson and Darwin Schrader.

The snow began falling about 10 o'clock in the afternoon Monday and by nightfall had begun covering the ground.

A cloudy and still day Monday forecast some change in weather and snow was expected, according to weather reports.

Some heavier snow, up to one inch, was reported to the west of Sanderson, but it extended only about 30 miles to the north and diminished as it went.

There was no cessation of traffic, so far as is known, but travelers were seen to be driving cautiously and some stopped in Sanderson Tuesday morning when there was more thawing.

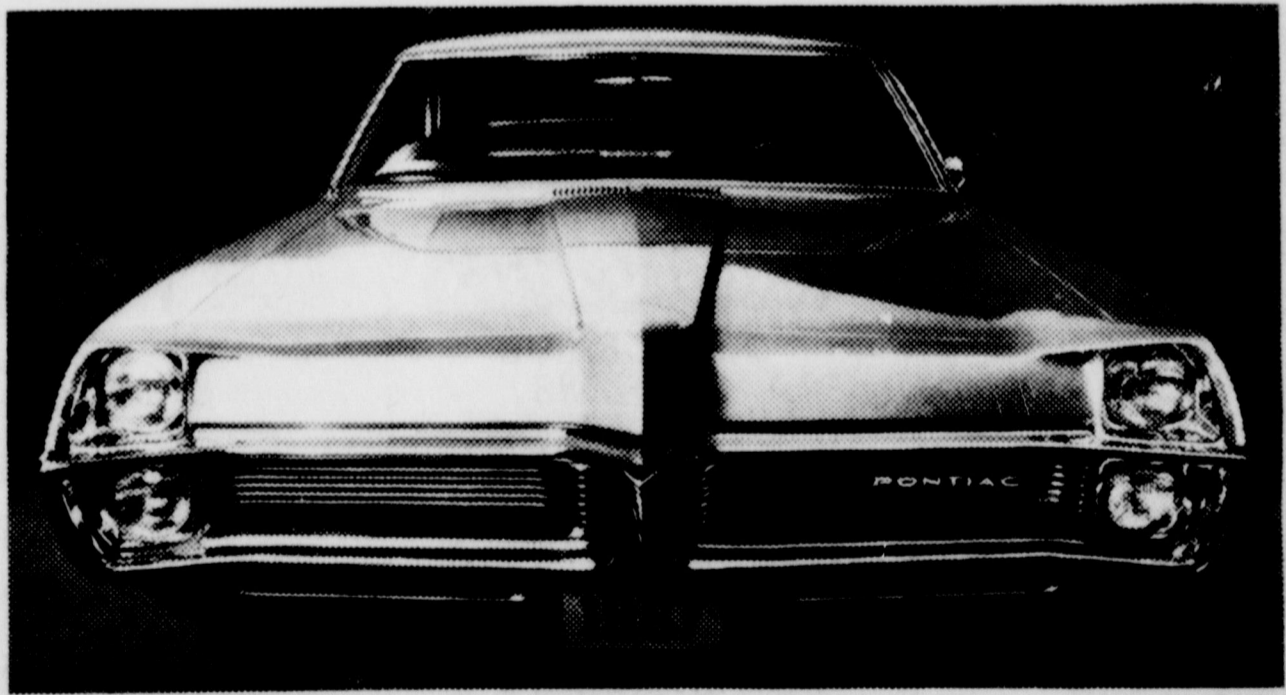

improving the lot of the teachers, also.
 In conflict with this proposal is the attitude of the governor who favors more the raising of the salary of state employees. There seems to be quite a fight looming over this, and again, it is the voice of the people that will be heard in the legislative halls of the state.
 We certainly have no objection to bringing the salaries of the teachers up to par and have them earning a wage commensurate with their educational requirements and with their jobs. We do not think that there should be a blanket raise of the salaries of all of the state's employees, however.
 In tune with what we said in the first part of this column, a raise for the law enforcement


officers of the state would do a lot of good in helping the traffic safety situation, and would also make the job more attractive to more applicants who go into other fields of law enforcement, or into other fields rather than law enforcement because of salary. At the same time, the Department of Public Safety would have to have additional funds if they were to raise the salaries of present officers, and at the same time make possible the hiring of additional patrolmen

to enforce the laws on our highways.
