Sonora had all three, but we were second-best! We can remember, too, when we had neither the winner, nor the sportsmanship award.

We previously called attention to the fact that someone was doing a lot of painting of walls, streets, curbs, etc., and it was doing nothing, really, but making a more unsightly mess over town that would be not difficult to erase and eliminate.

This situation has grown worse and we think there are more who should be concerned with it, and maybe there are.

The mere fact that we think it unsightly and messy does not mean that it is to everyone else, that it should be stopped.

We are going to try to draw attention to it and see if there is anyone else who is interested.

Take, for example, the old general home on Wilson St. It bears at least a superficial examination as you drive by, to see what has happened to it.

And, from where you live, notice on all of the culverts as you pass, all of the walls of unused or seldom-used buildings.

If it was your property, would you want these things to have happened to them? Would you really say that this is the appearance you like presented to visitors here, and do you like to see such "artistry" on everything around you?

And there is a law against the destruction or defacing of public or private property. And if respect of this law is not required of individuals, then it causes them to have disrespect for other laws as well.

And usually, when a person is aware of the law and the penalties for violating it, it makes him a little more hesitant to break the law -- and that is the purpose of the penalty.

If there is anyone who has an opinion on this, that would like to have it publicly expressed, he would be glad to express it on your behalf.

We can remember well when we were in school in Big Lake when someone wrote something on the wall in the boys' rest room. All of the boys in the school sanded down the walls in the rest room and re-painted it and all of the boys in the school were careful to see that no one was writing on the walls again. Vandals hit two businesses in Sanderson Friday night of last week, causing little damage, but arousing some tempers.

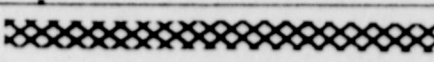

A swastika was painted on the sidewalk in front of The Sanderson Times, and one on the front of the building.

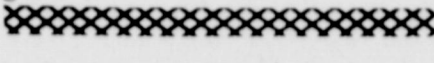
Other paintings over the town on walls, streets, and culverts have become so numerous that it is difficult to determine the latest.

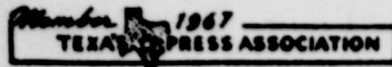

Attending the services in Arlington were his wife, Mary Corder Rowlett, their two daughters, Michael and Robin, his wife's brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. William Ruggles and their two sons, Richard and John.

Sgt. Rowlett was born in Hico February 26, 1914, to the late Mr. and Mrs. Hal J. Rowlett.

He joined the Air Force in 1940 and saw action in North Africa and Italy in World War II, returning to Sanderson in 1945 to go in the service station business with his father. In 1946 he and Mrs. Rowlett were married and in 1950 he re-enlisted into the service with the Strategic Air Command. During that time he and his family were stationed in England for three years. Before going to Viet Nam in 1966, he was stationed at Tinker Air Force Base in Midwest City.

"That's OK, Joel, even astronauts need help with their gear sometimes," says Jeff Kirker, 6, of New Stanton, Pa., as he helps his identical twin Joel into his braces.

Identical twins are supposed to be carbon copies of each other in every respect but twin brothers Joel and Jeffrey Kirker, 6, New Stanton, Pa., have been cruelly different from birth.

Joel, the older brother by five minutes, was born with an open spine (spina bifida), a birth defect that has paralyzed him from the waist down. At the same spot on his back, Jeff has only a birthmark.

"When Jeff doesn't feel well, he gets two blisters on his birth-

mark, otherwise he is a normal, very active little boy," says his mother, Mrs. Thomas Kirker.

Understandably, the young Kirkers pose a medical puzzle. As their mother puts it, specialists are "amazed that only one has the defect and not the other" or else are "quite lost for words" to explain the crippling differences in these identical twins.

Yet Mrs. Kirker says, "We feel we have a great deal to be thankful for because Joel is doing well and we can hope for even more improvement in the future."
