We read a piece of news today that was informative and interesting. According to this writer, and we have only his word for it --- the national deficit has risen from 2.7 billions of dollars in 1965 to 7.0 billions for this fiscal year. We are reprinting his table below for your scrutiny.

The figures came to us from George S. Benson, president, National Education Program, Searcy, Ark.

To tell the truth, I don't even know what all this means, but it seems like an alarming figure, with a big bunch of zeros involved. We do know what "deficit" means, and I don't like to think about how much that I may be responsible for.

There are any local citizens who have dogs that are prone to bark, they should take caution to see that the animals are kept up during the next several months, as it is customary, especially during lambing season for the ranchmen around here to take all precautions possible to protect their lamb crop from the marauding dogs that can do so much damage in a little time.

We have heard that there are eagles that have been seen in this area, too, and they probably are being taken to rid the ranches of those predators. The newly-born lamb doesn't seem to be worth very much to the mother ewe. Each one that is lost is a loss of \$15 or more, depending on the market. And we feel that one lamb, more or less, means little even to the ranchman.



Several Cases Disposed Of By Judge Thurmond

Several cases that have been pending in district court were disposed of last week by District Judge Roger Thurmond of Del Rio, who has been recuperating from a recent heart attack.

Manuel Valez Duran, 34, pleaded guilty to a charge of robbery by assault and was given a sentence of five years in the state penitentiary. The case grew out of an incident in March of 1965 when Gonzalo Huerta Lopez was found on the Herman Couch ranch in a critical condition after being stabbed seven times in the head, back, and chest. He claimed that he had been attacked by a man known only to him as Manuel and robbed of a radio, shoes, and \$40 and then dragged under a tree and left for dead. He managed to make his way several miles to the highway where he was found and taken to the hospital for treatment.

The assailant was later located in Mexico and subsequently crossed the border and was arrested by a U. S. Deputy Marshal in Phoenix, Ariz. Through the cooperation of the U. S. Border Patrol word of the indictment of the assailant and of his being wanted was relayed to Phoenix and that agency transferred Duran to Marfa and then brought him here for identification by Lopez, who was arrested by the Border Patrol in Terrell County on January 5. Lopez was charged with illegal entry and placed in custody of the Border Patrol for deportation, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, who expressed his appreciation to the Border Patrol and the U. S. Deputy Marshal for their cooperation in clearing up the case and helping to finalize it.

Three Arrested Here Recently Were 'Wanted'

Last weekend two young men driving a Ford Mustang were arrested for investigation of car theft.

It was later determined that the car was stolen in Atlanta, Georgia, and that one of the men was AWOL from Fort Benning, Georgia. The men were taken to Del Rio by a U. S. Deputy Marshal to face a federal charge of interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle.

On January 22, a 28 year-old man was arrested in Marathon after a charge originating here when he had driven away from a local service station without paying for gas which he had bought. He was returned to Sanderson and accused of misdemeanor theft. A later investigation showed that he was wanted in Pennsylvania on a charge of rape. He was driving a 1965 Mustang which had been bought in Pennsylvania with a forged check. The Pennsylvania State Police are making arrangements to return him to that state.

Library Project Is Begun Here

A public library for Terrell County is well into the planning stage after a meeting of several interested parties in the home of Mrs. E. E. Farley last Thursday evening.

Mrs. Farley, high school librarian, presided at the meeting as temporary chairman and will head a nominating committee also composed of Mrs. Irvin Robbins, Rev. Bob Moon and Mrs. R. A. Gatlin, to present a slate of officers for the meeting Thursday evening again in the Farley home at 8 P. M.

Mrs. Farley, after attending several meetings of librarians, has been pushing the project of the library, but only in recent months has anything more than talking about the project been accomplished. The Legion Auxiliary raised \$300 at rummage sales and earmarked the fund for the library needs. Then the Sanderson Culture Club members pledged their support in any way possible to get the project going. After a place for the library, a large room on the second floor at the courthouse, which contains shelves, tables, chairs, etc., was recently made available by a vote of the Commissioners' Court, the groundwork began to be laid and it is hoped that the library will soon become a reality and fill a real need in the community.

The library will be an outgrowth of a national trend instituted in recent years for improvement of library service throughout the nation. Governor John Connally called a conference last April to get key leaders in every community of Texas to endeavor to spark an interest in libraries.

Only tentative plans were made by those attending the meeting last week. It is hoped that the library at the beginning will be kept open two afternoons a week with a paid attendant on duty all of the time. Volunteer help will be needed both before and after the library is opened to catalog books and perform other duties.

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Lindsey H. Hicks, Area Ranchman, Dies In San Angelo

Funeral for Lindsey H. Hicks, 66, prominent Terrell and Crockett County ranchman, was held Sunday at Ozona's First Methodist Church with burial in Ozona Cemetery directed by Johnson's Funeral Home of San Angelo and Jones Funeral Home of Ozona.

Mr. Hicks died at 8:18 a. m. Friday at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where he had been a patient two weeks.

He was born in Coleman July 23, 1900, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Hicks, pioneer ranchers. He lived in San Angelo as a child and later moved to Sheffield.

He moved to Ozona but maintained a ranch between Sheffield and Dryden until recently. In 1950, he and L. W. Puckitt bought Findlater Retail Store in San Angelo and renamed it Hicks & Puckitt Hardware Store. They closed that operation in 1956 and established Hicks & Puckitt Water Service, Inc., which was concerned with installing irrigation systems and furnishing water to oil fields.

Mr. Hicks was coowner of this operation at his death. The water service company is located south of San Angelo on U. S. 277.

He was married to Lois Drake in San Angelo Jan. 27, 1950. He was a member of Ozona's First Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Lin W. Hicks of Sonora; a daughter, Mrs. Fredrick Buss of Chicago; a stepson, Banky Socks

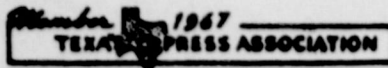

fredo Hernandez, also charged with robbery by assault, was sentenced to 99 years in the state penitentiary by Judge Thurmond. He was the man who shot Sheriff Cooksey in November of 1965 near Dryden when Cooksey was called there to investigate some items found in a cave that aroused the suspicions of the people of that area. There had been several burglaries in the Dryden area and it was thought there might be a connection with the items in the cave and the burglaries.

Hernandez, who was in the cave when Cooksey, Lewis Cash, Benny Ray Ross, and a Mexican employee on the ranch went to investigate, shot Cooksey without any provocation or warning and robbed him of his wallet and pistol, and forced the Mexican ranch hand to drive him south toward the river. A detailed and lengthy search for the assailant of Cooksey was begun and lasted until August 20 of last year when Hernandez was captured after a gun fight with the sheriff and Texas Ranger Alfred Allee, Jr. when Hernandez burglarized a service station in Dryden. Hernandez, who had earned the nickname "the cave man", had been seen in the Dryden area following the shooting of the sheriff, but every effort to apprehend him had failed until the time of his capture in August.

Both men were taken to Huntsville by Sheriff Cooksey and other officers Saturday.

Judge Thurmond also revoked the probationary sentence of Roland C. Hunt, who had received a five-year sentence here on a charge of felony theft. He was arrested in Dove Creek, Colorado, and will be returned to Texas soon.

Since he had broken the terms of his probation, Judge Thurmond issued an order for him to be taken to the state penitentiary to serve his sentence.

Confidence Vote Given Executive Committee Following Report of Progress of Medical Center Project To Local Steering Group

The executive committee of the Terrell County Medical Center made a progress report at the meeting of the steering committee, held in the county court room Tuesday night. The steering committee was formed last March to put in motion the Sears-Roebuck Foundation Plan for obtaining a doctor for Terrell County, and is composed of representatives from each civic organization, club, church, etc.

After Jack Hayre had given the history of the fund-raising for the medical center and the efforts to secure a doctor, he explained the necessary steps to be taken for incorporation of the organization. According to Hayre, articles of association must be presented with the application for charter to the Secretary of State. It is the articles of association that designation of the tax exemption for medical center donations must be sought by stipulating the organization to be a non-profit one. According to Texas law, the articles must name the first directors or trustees.

Sid Harkins related his recent telephone consultations with a Sears Foundation sponsored architect. It was learned that bids for constructing the clinic should be sought as soon as the group has corporate entity and that the architect expects to be present at the bid opening and would remain as overseer through the actual construction which is expected to take from 60 to 90 days.

Dr. Jeff Flowers explained his need for expanding the building plans to include modern obstetrical facilities, so that he may serve the community more fully.

At present, the doctor does not have adequate facilities for the practice of obstetrics locally, nor does the proposed building plan contain them. The architect explained he could not modify the approved Sears Foundation plan with the doctor's suggestions without coming into conflict with the Joint Hospital Accreditation Agency. The architect did leave hope that when actual building is started, the innovations can be introduced locally without involving Sears Foundation in a controversy.

Dr. Flowers expressed optimism about the plan. He stated further that he is the doctor in Sanderson and intends to spend his time practicing in Sanderson, and he hopes obstetrical facilities can be made available locally.

Mrs. Jimmy Davis reported on the difficulties encountered in the selection of a building site. While she mentioned no particular sites, she stated most places investigated had insurmountable drawbacks, such as exorbitant prices or slope prohibitive to correct. Sears Foundation recommendations, coupled with local ideas, stipulated the site should be a corner lot, centrally located not on the highway, reasonably priced, on high ground with good drainage. The two lots across the street west from the Methodist Church have been selected, after the committee investigated all other sites available.

Judge R. S. Wilkinson, who has made his office facilities available to the Medical Center project, reported the clinic fund now contains \$44,054.07 cash on hand in the bank. This amount includes a little over

\$1,000.00 in earned interest on money in savings accounts. \$4,120.50 in pledges are yet to come in. Judge Wilkinson reports pledges are coming in better now that the doctor is here.

The steering committee, an enabling body, elected the five members of the present executive committee to be the initial trustees of the non-profit organization, to proceed with obtaining a charter, to sign the articles of association, to obtain bids for the construction of the building, to cause by-law to be drawn up for consideration of the members of the organization, and to oversee construction of the building.

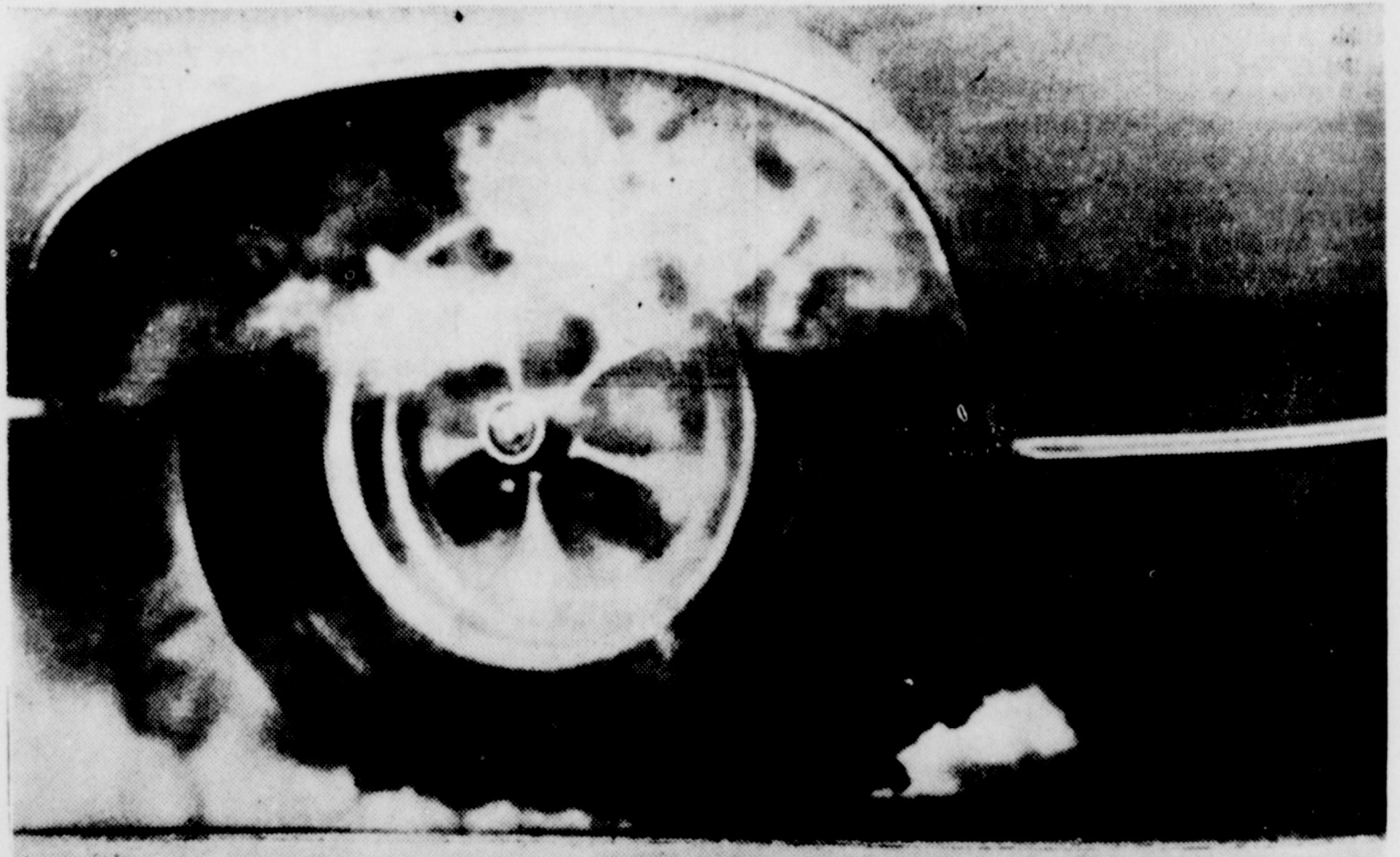
The committee members are Sid Harkins, Jack Hayre, Tom Druse, Darwin Schrader, and R. S. Wilkinson.

Note: - The above does not include all of the things that were brought up at the meeting, such as a complete accounting of all the funds contributed or loaned, all the details of the process of obtaining the charter, etc., some of which will be brought out in future stories about the progress of the building, the organization, etc.

Since the selection of the site for the building, there has been no action taken by the committee or any of them, other than planning, investigating, questioning, research, etc., into the various phases necessary to bring the project to completion as far as their duties as executive committee members was concerned.

What happened when we popped the clutch at 2400 rpm's.

The place: U.S. Royal's high-speed test track in Laredo, Texas.

The occasion: a 1/4-mile acceleration test, to see how the Tiger Paw™ stacks up against four other high-performance street tires.

The car: one of Detroit's hottest. Completely set up with three 2-barrel carburetors, A 4-speed box. Limited slip differential. The whole gutsy works.

Before we actually began, our driver made a few dry runs to see how many rpm's would best get him off the line. 2400 turned out to be the

magic number.

New Rates For Parcels Caused By ZIP Code

The use of ZIP Code will make it easier to mail packages in the future, according to J. R. Hodgkins, postmaster.

New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones went into effect January 15 and the new rates, which are increased an average of about 10¢ per parcel.

The use of ZIP Code in the recipient's address will enable the sender or a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional centers in the country.

By consulting a simple chart, which is available in all post offices, the zone can readily be identified because the first three numbers of the ZIP Code represent sectional centers. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the nation's 33,000 post offices. The new rates will range from 40 cents for a 3-pound parcel destined for local delivery, to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300 miles). The new zoning method will also apply to Air parcel post, catalogs, and to publishers who pay zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals.

It is noted that all parcels mailed between post offices in the El Paso sectional center, of which Sanderson is a part, will be charged at the first zone rate, eg.: a parcel mailed to El Paso from Sanderson cost the same as one mailed within El Paso.

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74-million a year for the Post Office Department. The additional revenue is to help keep the Department within 4% of costs on parcel post as the law requires.

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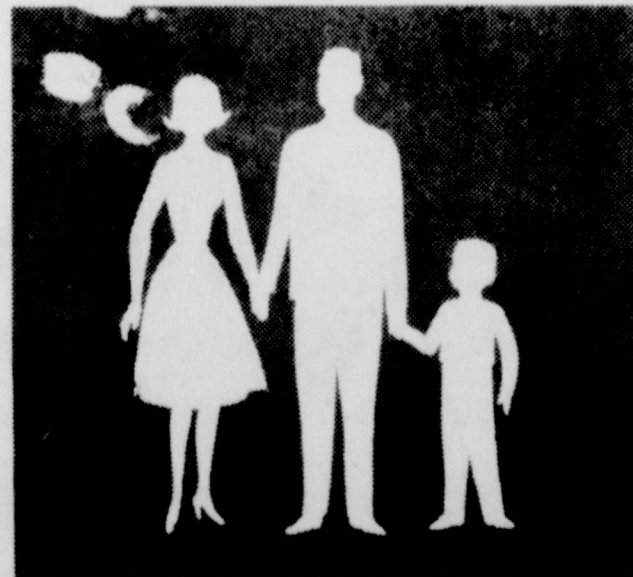

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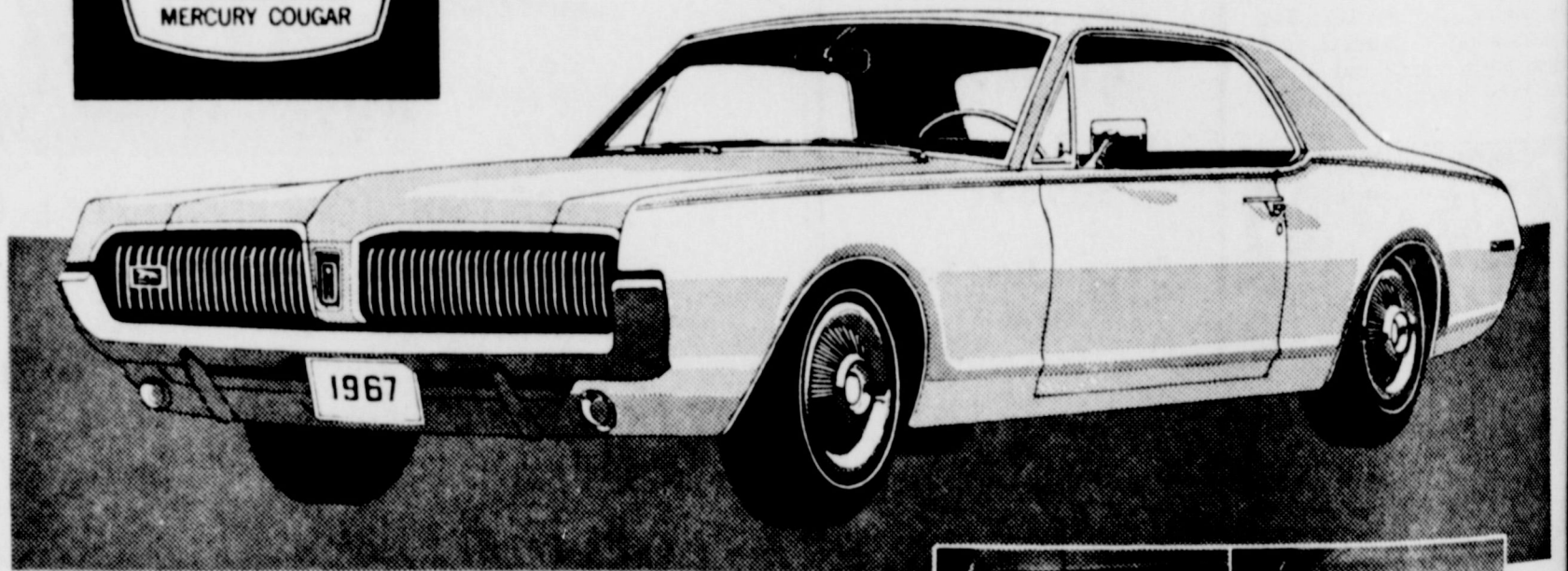
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
