There is no implication of the fact that life might be ever anything more than one long beach party, and if you miss that then all of life is lost.

There is no implication of the fact that there is some usefulness in life for those who must suffer the pains and handicaps that goes with arthritis and with other diseases.

There is no implication that a person with arthritis or some other crippling disease need not withdraw from society, from a circle of friends, nor should they be expected to.

Many of our other advertisements are in such a tone --- to either move up, have fun, or stay out of the way of those who are.

Such a care-free way of life, as depicted and expected by and to so many, has to some become their soul's expectation!

Have we created this monster in America?

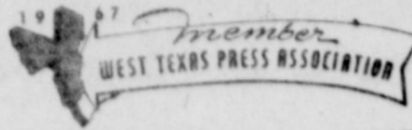
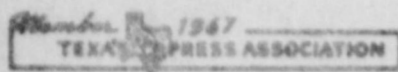

To qualify for the citation, according to the release, an operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience and must have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed and examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

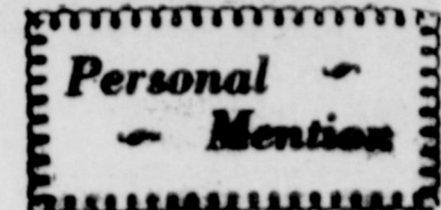
He is a science teacher in the junior high school.

### WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Businessmen were formerly urged to mail early for Christmas delivery, but now according to National Federation of Independent Business members, it's advisable to mail early merely to send mail a short distance—even in the same city!

Business Week Magazine recently conducted a report on the situation. They found that the Chicago office because of its central location is swamped with mail all year around, and has been forced to divert truckloads of mail to far distant cities like St. Louis, New York, and Buffalo for sorting and shipment to sectional centers.

The San Francisco post office which also handles all military mail going to the Pacific, has had an annual volume percentage rise of 11%. Volume in Manhattan has risen 8.5%.

In Boston, officials report a deluge of mail, and reveal that at the present rate of increase, everyone in the U.S. will have to work for the Post Office by the year 2000 in order to deliver mail on time.

National Cash Register, Dayton, Ohio, reports they mailed tickets to their Business Equipment Show in early September, but were not received till late October by angry recipients who missed the event.

Similar complaints are made by firms announcing sales by mail, claiming customers do not

get the notices until after sales are completed.

Post Office officials, in turn, blame business for their gripes. Second and Third class mail, they say, is a major drainage, does not cover its mailing costs, and is blamed for the record 1966 deficit.

Direct mail, is a \$2.4-billion a year industry, and grows. Denver Postmaster George Vender reveals that in a typical week, "We got in 200,000 pieces of sample toothpaste, trying to get out 200,000 more wash samples. This stuff is heavy, and a carrier just can't carry all of it in one day."

Why can't the P.O. handle mail efficiently, whatever the volume? Lack of personnel appears to be a major factor. Niland, legislative director of the United Federation of Post Clerks blames the P.O.'s failure to add to its present staff of 700,000, and for limiting of time work.

Other reasons given are increasing numbers of uneducated foreign-speaking clerks.

In an effort to remedy crisis, a supplemental appropriation of \$400-million, has been asked.

Over 180,000 employees have been added since July, 1966.

A \$100-million automation program is started to have major post offices mechanized in two years.

Since time and expense needed to train workers on new equipment, a full-scale investigation of the national Office is urged, posthaste.

May 1, 1925—The first automobile compulsory insurance act was passed in Massachusetts, requiring owners to "furnish security for their civil liability on account of personal injury caused by their motor vehicles and trailers." It became effective January 1, 1927.

May 4, 1626—The sale of "Manhattes" (Manhattan) island by Indians for the sum of 60 guilders (\$24) was made to Peter Minuit, First Director General of New Netherland.

May 13, 1607—The first permanent English colony in North America was founded by some 100 colonists on the bank of "River of Powhatan," Jamestown, Va.

May 15, 1672—Massachusetts General Court enacted the first copyright law in the American colonies, issuing a copyright to John Usher, a bookseller, to publish a new edition of "The General Laws and Liberties of the Massachusetts Colony."

May 20, 1927—Charles A. Lindbergh took off for the first trans-atlantic solo flight, piloting the "Spirit of St. Louis."

May 23, 1903—First successful trans-continental trip by a non-professional driver was made by Dr. Horatio Nelson Jackson, a Vermont physician. With a mechanic, Sewell K. Croker, he arrived in New York from San Francisco 63 days later.

May 30, 1821—Rubber-lined cotton web fire hose was patented by James Boyd of Boston, Mass.

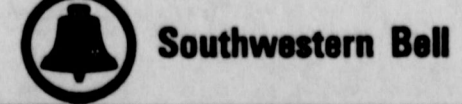

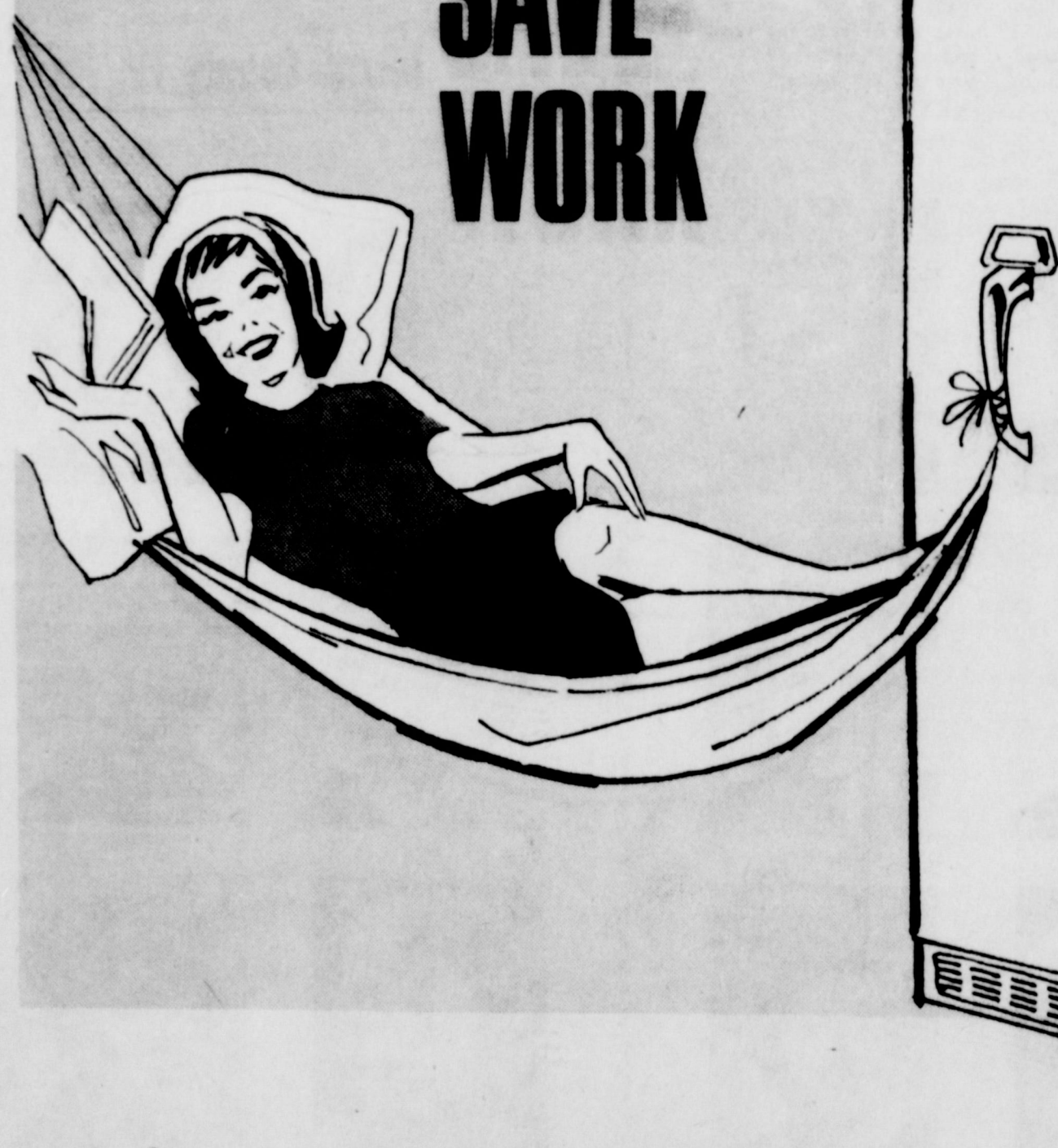

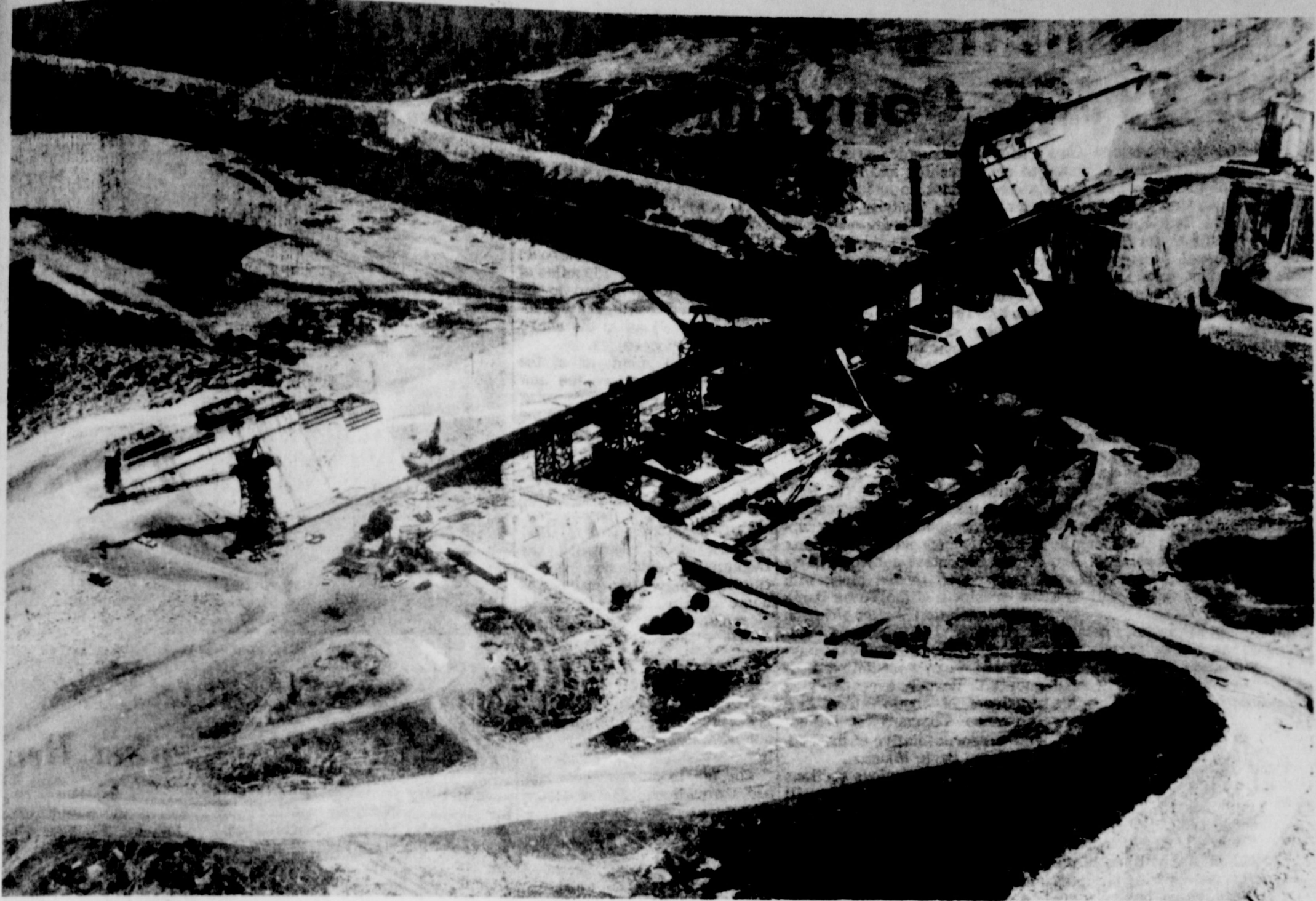
