Building Program of School Noted For \$500,000.00 Bond Issue Vote

Details of the building and renovating program of the Terrell County Independent School District were released Monday of this week after receiving information from the architects and imancial advisors.

The proposed bond issue is for \$500,000.00 and includes the with the construction of a new junior high school building:

Building, \$227, 360; heating for high school, \$50, 600; furniture and equipment, \$20,000; test holes, \$2,000; financial advisor's fee, \$5,000; architect's fee, \$21,927; land, \$20,000.

Also included in the expense for the new building will be a part of \$48,613, included in the bond issue for landscaping, removal of old buildings, play grounds, general renovation and improvement.

EXPLANATION OF BOND ISSUE TO BE MAY 18 FOR PUBLIC

A public meeting in the high school auditorium will be at 7:30 on May 18, Thursday night of next week. The purpose of the meeting will be to explain to the public all of the details of the proposed bond issue to seek the support of the voters in the school expansion program which consists mainly of a new junior high school building.

Questions and answers will be available following the detailed explanation.

The balance of the bond issue of \$50,000 which is for renovations includes: \$6,500, lights at football field; plumbing at elementary school, \$500; furniture and equipment at high school, \$10,000; dressing rooms, present gym, \$40,500; renovate high school, \$41,000; renovate band hall, \$6,000.

It was pointed out that the school now owns two lots on the northwest corner of the block to the east of the school block and plans are, if possible, to purchase two lots on the southwest corner of the same block, which would be east of the tennis courts, and four more lots east of those presently owned, which would be the four lots across the street from the St. James rectory. It has also been advised, and it is planned to get Second Street closed between Pine and Hackberry, if possible, to eliminate the hazard of automobile traffic between the two play grounds. It is also planned to convert the entire south end of the school property into play ground area.

The picture below was taken just a few minutes after the one published last week, according to Mrs. John L. Newton, who sent both pictures. And only 45 minutes from the start of the blaze, the building was a pile of ashes, she said. A cooking school had just closed the day before and 17 electric ranges had been sold. One of the engines was repaired and put into operation sans protection of roof or walls and there was no electric power until this could be accomplished.

The mixup was finally straighted out in court proceedings after man's death. But the case illustries how mercurial is meaning—by risky it is for a person to dash a "simple." do-it-yourself will grene confidence that, after he sone, his words will be clear to



Of course, the law's main goal is a carry out the intentions of the accased. But just what were his intentions? With alarming frequency, bickering relatives can read the same words and come up with different meanings.

Consider a few "simple" exprestions that have led to courtroom butles:

"money"—Does this include funds in a bank account? (One wurt said yes, if it is a checking account; another court said no, if it is a savings account.)

"furniture"—Does this include nerything useful in the house? One court said it included linens; mother court said it did not include books.)

"household effects"—Does this include more than furniture? Less? (One court said a stamp collection was covered; another court said inveloped and clothing were not.)

"contents"—Does this include everything physically within? (A court held that the "contents" of a house included the steel safe in the basement but not the stocks and bonds inside the safe.)

In each of these cases the court had to examine the surrounding dreumstances, not just the bare words of the will, to clear up the

This procedure is not easy and not quick. It may breed bitterness in the family, cause legal complications, and—to everyone's chaptin—delay the distribution of the estate. All too often, wills composed in haste must be litigated at leisure.



TAKE NOTICE that en election will be held in said District at the time and places, and on the Proposition, as provided in the Order Calling An Election, duly passed by the Board of Trustees of said District, which Order is substantially as follows: ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS)

COUNTY OF TERRELL TERRELL COUNTY INDEPEN-DENT SCHOOL DISTRICT)

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Board of Trustees a petition signed by twenty or more persons praying that we order an election in said District, to be held within 30 days after the order of election, for the purpose of submitting the proposition hereinafter stated, in accordance with law; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Trustees officially finds and determines that said Petition is signed by twenty or more resident, qualified electors who own tax able property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that said Petition conforms with law in all respects.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF TERRELL COUNTY INDE-PENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election shall be held in said District on the ?? day of May, 1967, and that for the purpose of said election each Commissioners Precinct of Terrell County, Texas, is hereby constituted as a voting precinct:

(a) Precinct No. 1 at the courthouse in Sanderson, Texas; (b) Precinct No. 2 at the Methodist Church in Dryden, Texas; (c) Precinct No. 3 at the Sid

Harkins Ranch Headquarters; (d) Precinct No. 4 at the El Paso Natural Gas Co. gas plant.

The business manager of said District is hereby appointed as the Clerk for absentee voting for said election; and the Office of the business manager, Terrell County courthouse, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and official state holidays; and the aforesaid clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting.


