Everyone or anyone who has any questions to ask about the pending bond issue to be voted on May 23 should go to the court house tonight to hear the presentation of the facts concerning the proposed building and remodeling program for the local schools, including a new junior high school building.

The elimination of the red brick building is something that has been recommended, advocated, suggested, demanded, and otherwise treated for the past several years - over 20 - that we know of.

Parents of children, friends of parents of children, and friends of the children have long felt that the building was unsafe, a fire hazard, and should be eliminated for the sake of the children.

It has taken the school board a long time - and not those on the present board - but all those who have served on the school boards over the years - to decide to do something about the building. And it must have taken a good deal of consideration, because the present board has been working for some time on it.

We are going to find out at the time of the election just how much some of our taxpayers want the new, safer, more modern building.

We believe that the board has done enough research, investigation, looking, planning, adjusting, cutting, revamping, and otherwise lining up the program sufficiently to warrant a passage of the bond issue and a vote of confidence for those who have worked so hard in the planning.

There should be a large turnout of the taxpaying voters on the day of the election to indicate the will of all-or the majority of the taxpaying voters.

Everyone feels better about any election when it is the will of the people, rather than the will of only a handful.

#### Ernest Harkins Recovers From Anthrax Infection

Ernest Harkins is recuperating in a San Angelo hospital from an infection of anthrax. He was taken to the hospital Thursday evening of last week and was on the critical list for several days

The infection is said to have been contacted while he was disemboweling a cow that had died on the Circle Dot ranch, operated by Sid and Ernest Harkins. Some of the internal organs of the cow were to be taken to a veterinarian in an effort to ascertain the cause of the death of the animal, according to reports, and in the process of extracting the organs, Harkins scratched his arm, causing the infection.

He became ill on Tuesday, but it was not until Thursday that his condition indicated the need for hospitalization and the need for more detailed treatment.

Harkins was taken to San Angelo by Herman Couch and the diagnosis of anthrax came soon after his hospitalization and the treatment was begun immediately.

#### Preliminary Plans Being Made For Flood Control Work

There has been no planning approval that has been received by the Soil Conservation Service for the Sanderson Canyon Watershed project. It is hoped that the approval will come soon after July 1, according to local SCS representatives.

Three men from the SCS planning party in San Marcos were in Sanderson last week making a reconassaince of the Sanderson Canyon Watershed. This trip was to obtain information from the local SCS technicians and to see the watershed.

When approval is given, the information will be used to order maps of possible places to install dams, estimate the cost of planning the project, and to bring the information they have on the watershed up to date.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Hodgkins explained. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the letter-drop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings".

After adding and analyzing the cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the state's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.






