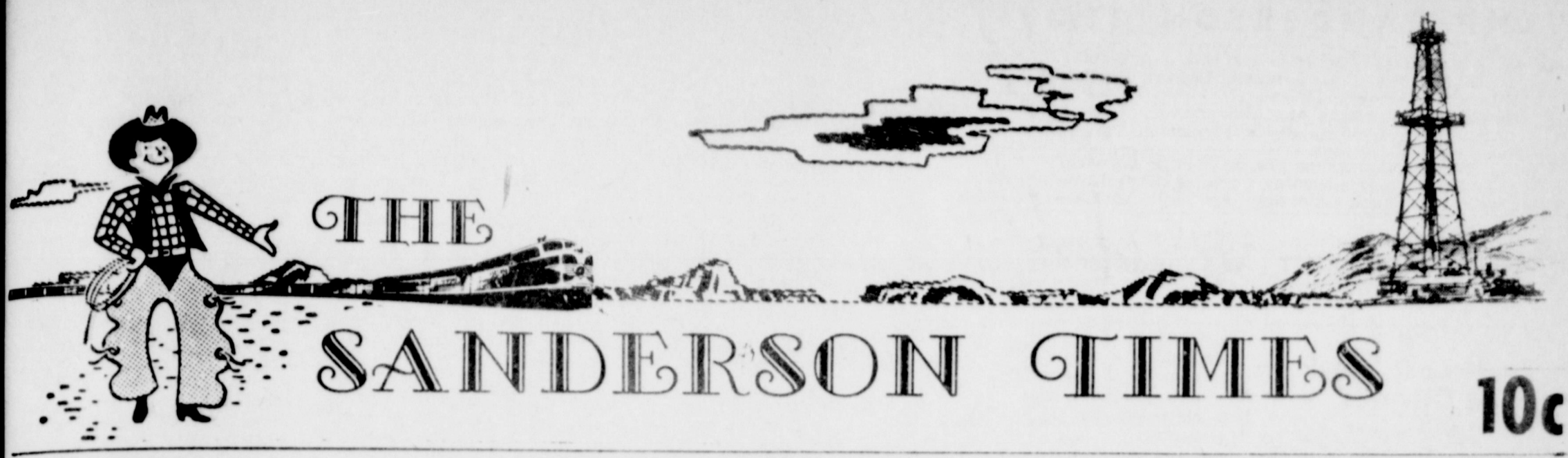

Texaco, Inc. Sends \$500 Check To Fire Department

A letter of appreciation and commendation to the Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department, and a check for \$500.00 was received this week by Dudley Harrison, treasurer of the fire department, from Texaco, Inc. The appreciation and commendation was for the efforts of the members of the local fire-fighting unit who were responsible for the saving of the Texaco bulk plant here about two months ago when it was involved in an explosion and fire.

The letter and check was from Warren Burg, district manager for the gasoline company.

Burg, in expressing the appreciation for Texaco, Inc., praised the efforts of the volunteer firemen and their bravery in combatting the fire and successfully putting it out, thus saving all of the bulk storage locally as well as the two transport trucks and the fuel in their tanks. The fire and explosion occurred in the early morning hours during the transfer of fuel from the transports to the local storage tanks. A large storage tank containing gasoline and diesel fuel was burning from the open ports at the top and the transports' ports were also open and the vapor burning from them. Jolly Harkins is the owner of the local Texaco products bulk plant.

Dudley Harrison and W. W. Sudduth were the local firemen who put the fire out above the tanks, thus saving the property.

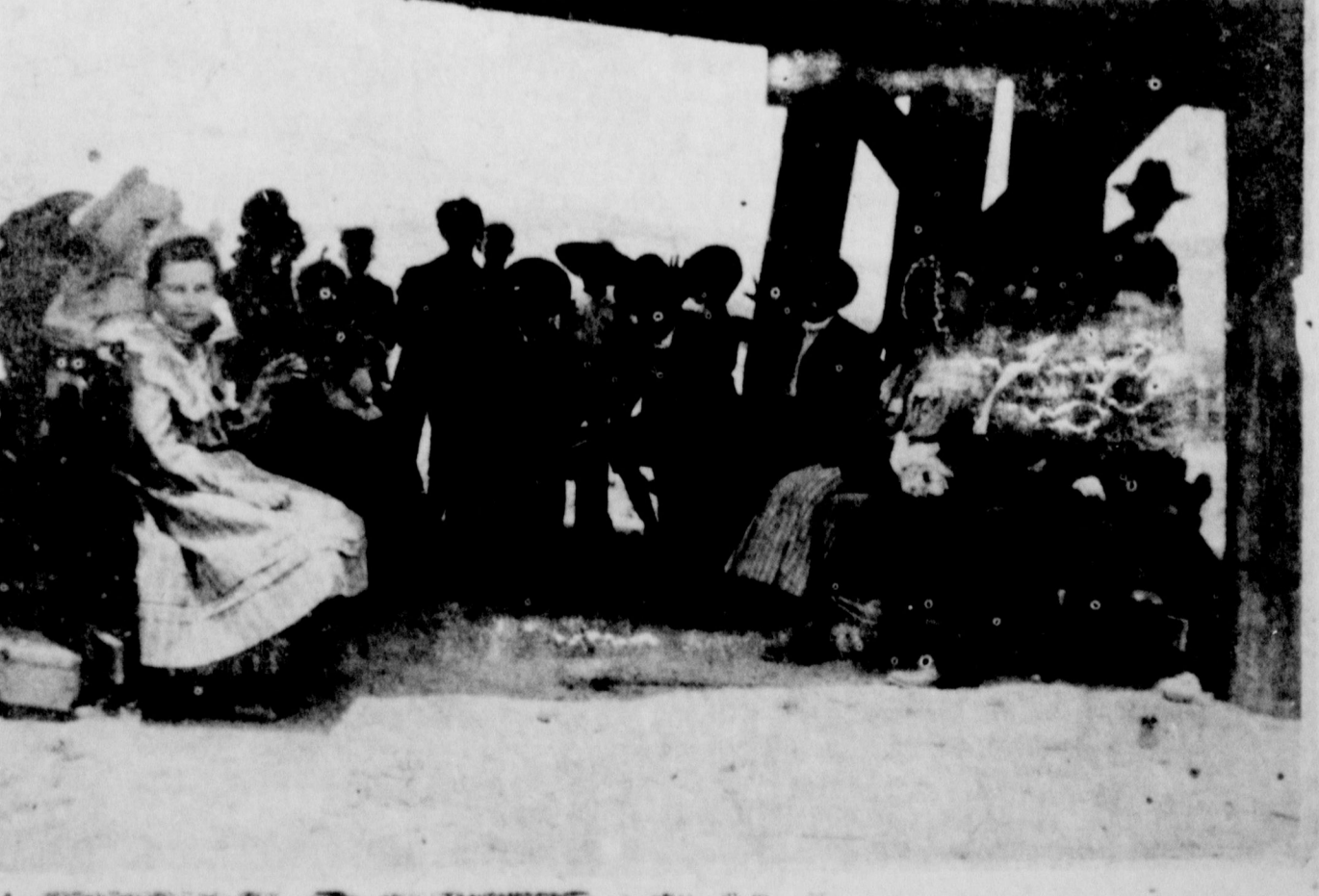
Besides her husband she is survived by six other children.

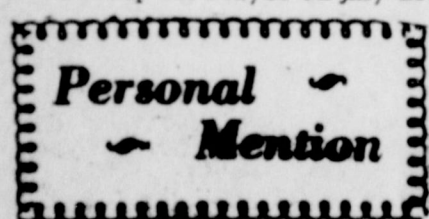
Scout Leaders Of District Meet In Sanderson

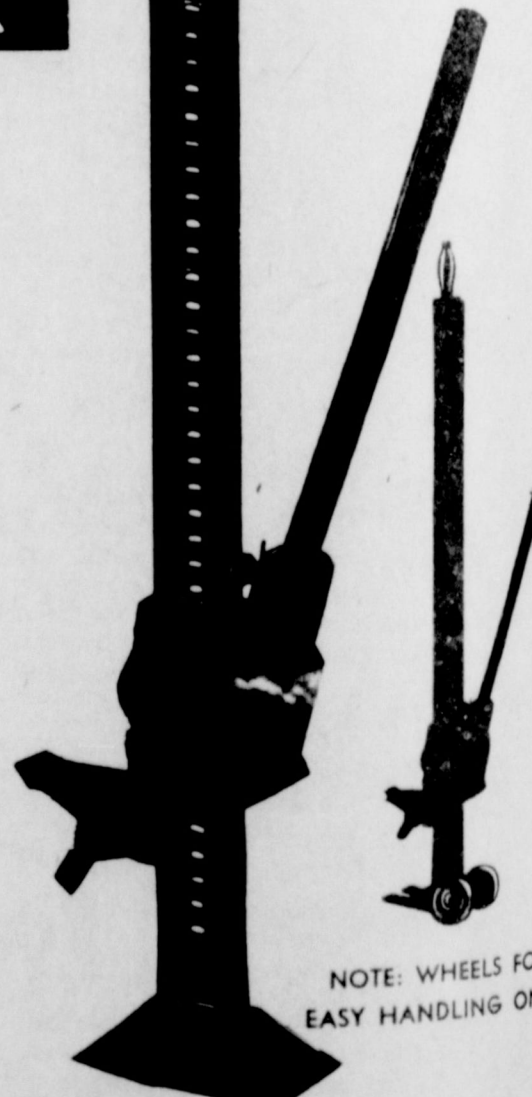

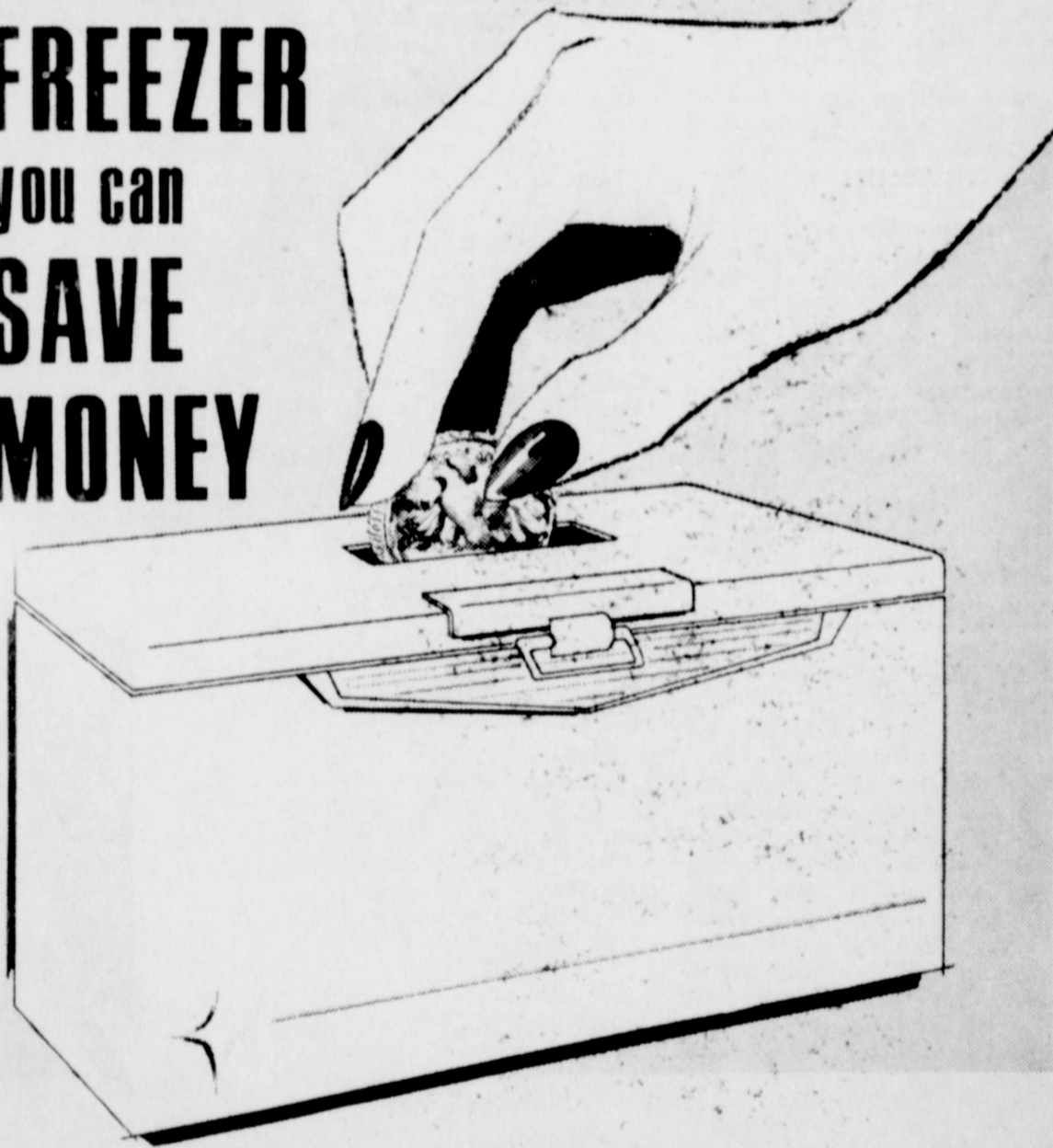
