Election Laws Changes Told

Secretary of State John Hill has provided Texas election officials details of all changes in state election laws enacted by the 60th legislature.

Major changes include:

Voters again must register between October l and January 31. All voters must sign up (including citizens over 60 in cities of less than 10,000 population).

Voters may mark ballots with "x" or check marks rather than scratching names of candidates they oppose;

Counties may use electronic voting machines on approval of the secretary of state;

Those who have not yet met state voting residence requirements may vote for president and vice-president;

Those who have moved from county to county within six months before an election can

vote for statewide officials; Some city election dates will be changed from the first Tuesday in April to the first Saturday in April;

Election officials will get a pay raise from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour:

Voters in bond elections will be required to sign affidavits they own property and to identify the property;

Write-in votes will be outlawed in primaries except for party offices, like county chair-

Only opposed candidates will have to file campaign expense statements.

Parents Must Go To Traffic Court With Juveniles

A little publicized provision of the State's new traffic safety laws requires that one or both parents of juvenile traffic offenders appear in open court with the youthful law breakers.

The law, which became effective today also states that juveniles can plead guilty only in open court before the judge and that parents or guardians must be present before the teen is convicted or fined.

"In today's busy world it is difficult for many well-meaning parents to keep up with the actions of their teen age children. This provision of the new law should benefit conscientious parents and their youngsters,' Russel H. Perry, President, Association of Texas Fire & Casualty Companies said when commenting on this phase of the new traffic laws.

"Up until now," Mr. Perry added, "teens could be arrested and fined without the parents knowledge. Teens could and did build terrible driving records. In many cases, the parents could have called a halt to the dangerous driving; if only they had known what was going on.

Mr. Perry also pointed out that the driving records of all members of a family household affect auto insurance rates under the Texas Driving Insurance





Have you looked at your paycheck lately?

If you have, you probably were shocked, and even more shocks are coming.

On top of a Social Security tax increase on January 1st, the administration is now asking for another big boost in the payout program. This would raise the minimum benefit for retired workers to \$70 a month, and would assure workers with twenty-five years of coverage at least \$100 a month. In addition, it's currently proposed to extend medical insurance to disabled beneficiaries, and allow larger earnings without loss of benefits.

Young Americans in the work force will pay for these increases, if they are enacted. Young people particularly should realize that the foundation of all financial provisions for retirement security is a sound dollar. They should demand, as should all Americans, that the Social Security system be properly managed so as that one day the working public will not rebel against the system. Even under present benefits the combined tax on employees and employers will rise to 11.3% within a few years.

Social Security benefits should be adequate but they should not be vulnerable to political influences.

It might be wise to make a careful appraisal of the system, which is now three decades old, to see if it provides real security.
