We cannot but wonder, as we write this, about the future of the countless thousands who have lost so much as a result of the Beulah hurricane damage. It was a terrible disaster. Calls began coming to our

office soon after the hurricane hit the Texas Coast from people wanting to know what they could send and to whom they could send it for the assistance of some of the flood or hurricane victims. These were calls from local people who could remember only too well what others did for them and of their obligation to be of whatever assistance they could.

If not before you have read this, then probably real soon, items will have been collected to be sent to the disaster area to be distributed by some agen-

cy to the victims. It should not be difficult for the Red Cross chapter here to have a nice collection to send in when we think about the fact that it was just over two years ago that the Red Cross spent over \$200,000.00 in Sanderson aiding flood victims here. Not only is it our time to help pay from this standpoint, but time to help those who need our help so much.

The power of wind and water has not been completely demonstrated yet, but we have seen some examples of the destruction that those forces can cause.

In last week's mail we got a book that was published to commemorate the 50 years of existence of the Texas Highway Department. It is, in fact, a history of the organization in pictures and words. And very interesting, too! We took the liberty to use one of the pictures from that publication on the front page this week. It shows the opening of the Pecos River bridge in 1923 and is an interesting shot, we think.

No history of the Texas Highway Department would be complete without a history of D. C. Greer, who has been the head of that organization for many, many years.

Because of his leadership, Texas roads are what they are today. And considering the hundreds of thousands of miles of highways within the state and the thousands of miles that are in the planning or construction stage, Mr. Greer is responsible for a lot of highway.

And, another thing that can and should be said in his behalf, is the fact that during all of his tenure as the head of that state department, there has never been any hint of any scandal or malfeasance or irregularity concerning state or or national funds used in the construction of roads.

We do not know Mr. Greer, but the highways, bridges, culverts, roadside parks, local and district offices, and other tangibles will stand a long time as a monument to a man who was able to get things done well. And even long after the passing of all these things, there will be living in other people the results of the examples that were set by him in leadership, integrity, and stewardship of


Mrs. Beulah Newton, 88, died in a hospital in El Paso early Monday morning. She had been in failing health for a long time but had been in the hospital only a few days.



PRINCESS THEATRE LEWIS WELCH, JR. RETURNS TO US ON "AMERICA"

Air Controlman Airman Apprentice Lewis W. Welch Jr., USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Welch, returned to Norfolk, Va., last week aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS America after an extended deployment with the U.S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

During the past eight and one-half months the 77,000 ton America has steamed nearly 55,000 miles, participating in exercises with air and naval units of our North Atlantic Treaty Organization allies.

When the Middle East crisis flared, the America came to the aid of the communications ship USS Liberty after that ship was mistakenly attacked by Israeli aircraft and torpedo boats on June 8. The next day crewmen assisted in transferring wounded Liberty crew members to the America and rendering medical assistance.

The ship recently added more laurels to her record by winning the Battle Efficiency Award for Atlantic Fleet attack aircraft carriers for 1966. The award is presented to the attack carrier which, through competitive exercises, proves to be in the highest state of combat readi-
