

## **Building Project For** 'El Buen Pastor' Is Under Way

El Buen Pastor Methodist Church is in the process of beginning a building program, according to Rev. Moises Yanez, pastor. The paper work is now in the process of being completed and actual work is expected to begin after the first of the year.

The congregation has obtained a loan of \$10,000 from the Methodist Board of Extension, and other loans of \$10,000, all of which will be used for the purchase of the land and the construction. The church plans to purchase the property south of the present building and belonging to Mrs. Bernarda Postas, for the site of the new buildings.

Pledges of members of the congregation and friends of the church toward the building program total \$14,000 and the balance is expected to be received in pledges soon, according to Rev. Yanez.


