Absentee Balloting On Amendmetns Started Monday

Absentee voting on six proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution began on Monday. Necessary forms for casting absentee ballots are available at the office of the county clerk.

The election will be Saturday, November 11 in all four precincts.

Several changes have been made in the voting laws for the state, according to Secretary of the State John L. Hill.

In all promary, special, and other elections where political party columns do not appear on the ballot, the voter is to place an "X" beside the name or issue he favors. In the past, all undesired candidates or proposals were scratched off the voter's ballot. When voting, any voter may ask for assistance from an election judge so long as the voter does not receive actual preparation help on the ballot. Election officers are required to use the English language while carrying out their duties but may give instructions through another language himself or through an interpreter if requested by the voter.

PARADE OF YOUNGSTERS TO START HALLOWE'EN FUN


