

**LISTEN TO LUKE**

There have been some changes come about in our community recently that are--- in our humble opinion---not good, and we think that steps should be taken immediately to see that it does not happen again.

We are referring to the rash of burglaries that have been plaguing all the residents of the community during recent weeks.

There was a spell of such goings-ons in the not-too-far-distant past, when some of the local stores were hit with some degree of regularity by petty thieves and even safecrackers, and now the condition exists again, only with cars and homes being burglarized.

We are referring to the theft of several guns, rifles, and shotguns, out of pickups last week, namely: Dr. Flowers, Buddy Sudduth, Herbert Brown, Bevo Glavan, the burglary of the Dairy King last weekend; the burglary of the beer joint on the east end of town; the burglary of the Ernest Harkins home and of the house where his laborers live last weekend; the Petty home recently, and probably some more that we haven't heard about.

Time was in this town and area when we could leave our houses and our cars unlocked without fear of anything being taken. We can even remember on several occasions we accidentally left our business front door open, and we know of other businesses that have had the same thing happen without a loss of any kind.

We feel that all citizens should be on the alert for such thievery, make every effort to thwart the activities of such thieves, and punish them severely under the law when they are apprehended.

It would be easy for us to assume and think that all of this is being done by out-of-towners as they are going through, and this assumption may be right. But it may not be right, and those among us, whether natives or travelers, who are thieves and lawbreakers should be punished under the law so that it might also act as a deterrent to others who may think that they can get away with it.

Some people are honest naturally, and some are honest because they are afraid of the consequences of dishonesty. And some people are dishonest because there is no penalty for it, or there hasn't been for them.

The Sanderson Eagles were hosts to the Buena Vista boys' A & B teams last Tuesday night and to the Del Rio B team and freshmen on Friday night.

The B-team won handily over both their foes, beating Buena Vista 58-28 and the Del Rio freshmen 48-23.

In the Buena Vista game, Bill Littleton was high scorer with 23 and Leslie Hall also hit in the double figures, scoring 13. Coach Norman Gladson used all of the players on the B-team in that game. Sanderson was in charge of the boards throughout the game, and controlled the play and pace rather freely. At half time Sanderson had a 24-17 lead which lengthened to 47-22 at the end of the third period. Other players included Walter Shoemaker, Johnny Freeman, Johnny Flowers, Sam Bell, Emilio Martinez, Manuel Olivas, Tony Flowers, David Bolinger, Dee Carroll, and Brad Harrison.

In their other game, against Del Rio freshmen, the B-team had an 18-9 half-time lead, and 38-13 at the three-quarter mark. Olivas had 15 points to lead in that department, Littleton had 14. Both of the A-team games were nip-and-tuck affairs. The court also authorized the purchase of a Ford pickup for Precinct Three from Dudley Motors.

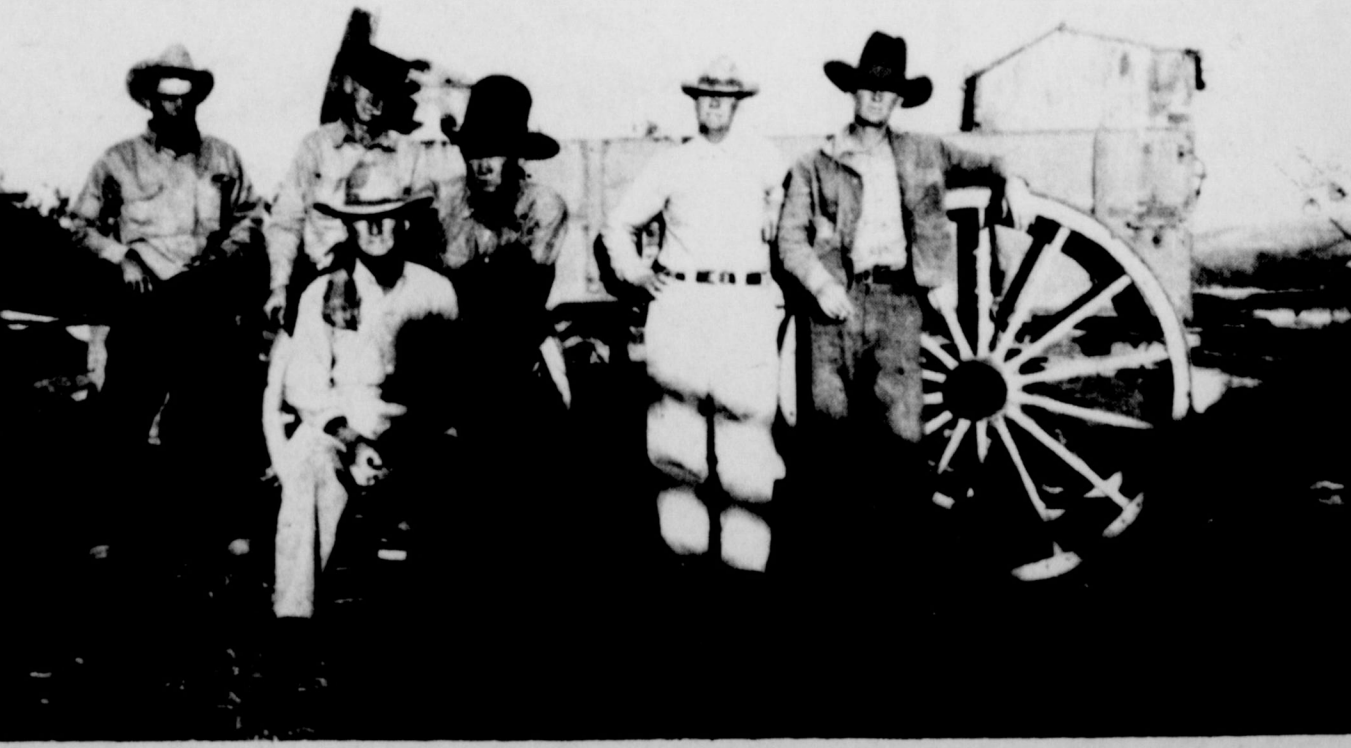
**Annual Pageant By Presbyterians To Be Sunday**

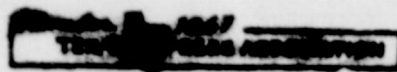

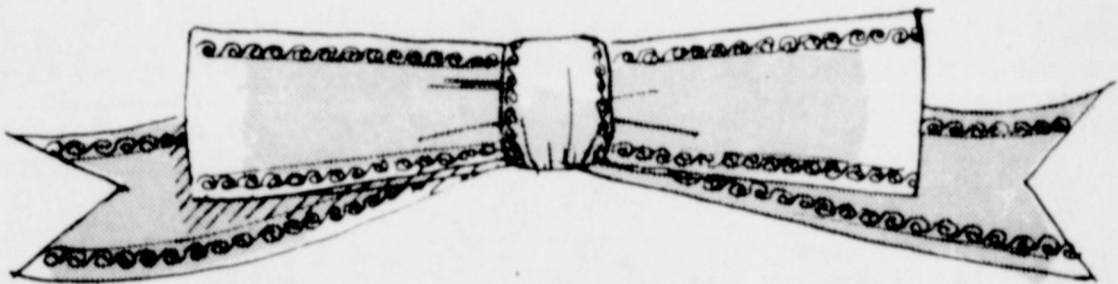

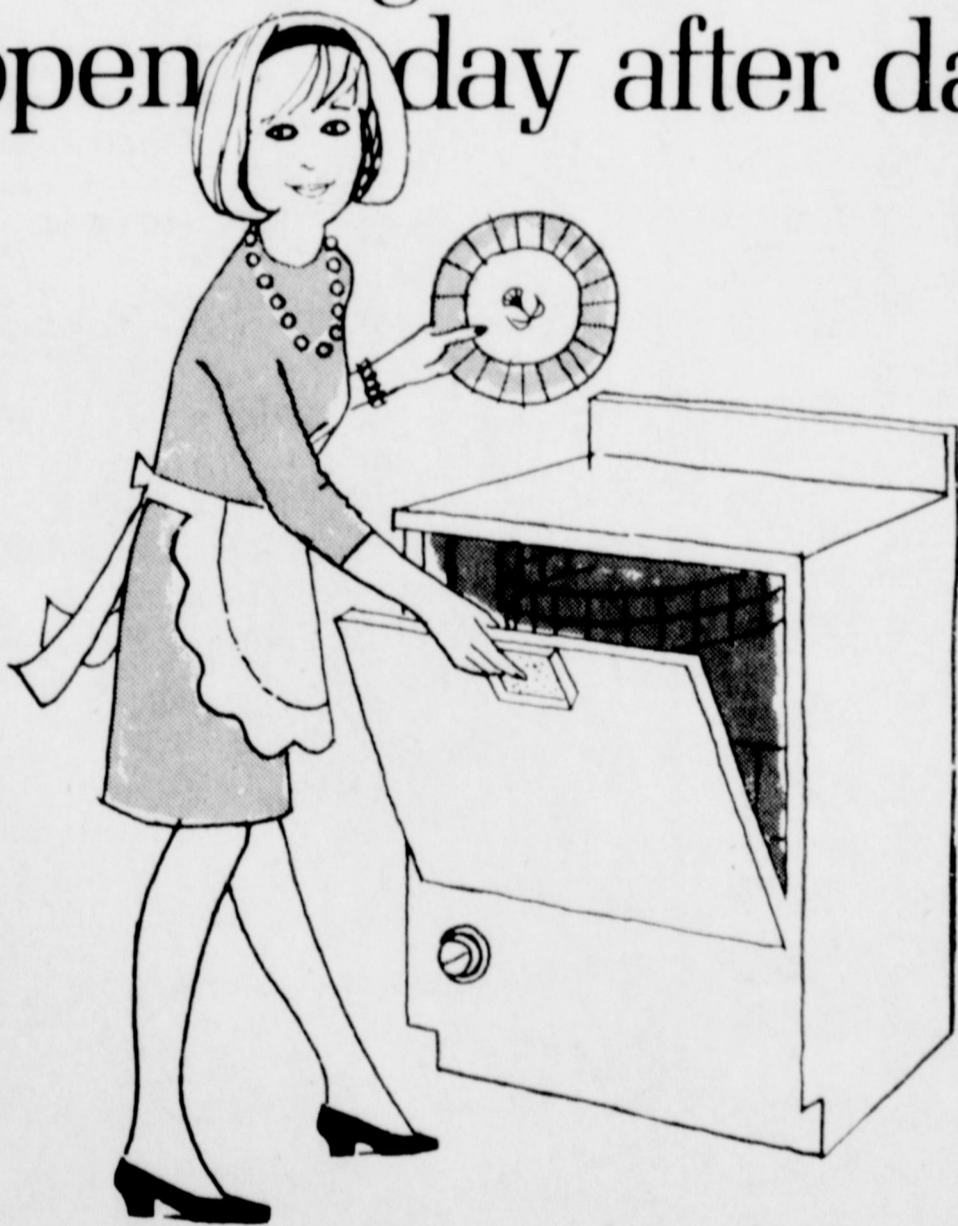
