LISTEN TO LUKE

By Albert:---

Another story in The Times tells of the recent meeting of the local CAP group last week when films were shown to the interested persons.

There are some real possibilities for helping the youth of the county in this effort and also for the group to do another service in the search and rescue portion of their activities----if the need ever arises, and we pray that it doesn't.

The instruction in mechanics, aerodynamics, meteorology, navigation, and even some flight training for some who qualify, can be good training for the youth, as will the discipline that must go along with a group effort of this kind. Those who are working on the project deserve the backing - in whatever form is possible - from the rest of us and we sincerely hope that their efforts reap the greatest benefits for those who are participating.

The organization is not for primarily, as we understand it - a group of flying enthusiasts to play soldier. But to give training in things associated with aviation to the youth who are interested in getting it and who are willing to work for it; with the availability of the youth and adults and their training and equipment to be used in any emergency where their facilities and abilities might be used.

Most of the information we get about the activities of the CAP is during the time of emergency, such as a downed aircraft, and search for the aircraft and subsequent efforts to rescue or retrieve. This, as we say, is a function of the group, but only secondary because of its availability.

We find it difficult every week, in trying to write a news story about a cage game to try to give credit where credit is due and not take away from anything. When it comes to the guards in girls' games and to some of the forwards in girls' games, this is extremely difficult. Sometimes the guards work their heads off effectively in controlling the opposing forwards. But the score never does reflect the efforts of the guards, whether a team wins or loses. It is always won on the scoreboard, and unless a fan is there and sees what is going on on the Eaglette guard end of the court, it is difficult to describe. The same thing is true with some of the forwards. The high-scorers are known, and their ability is recognized and praised. There should never by any interpretation of trying to discredit the high-scoring ability of any of the girls. But there is little to be said sometimes about a forward who seems to be in the right place at the right times, retrieving balls, setting up plays, taking the load off the high-scorers at times, and helping tremendously in opposing the efforts of the other team's forwards. The same thing is true of some of the boys who do not make the high-scoring honors, but they often-times set up the plays and pass the ball off to the other person, helping the team, not the player.

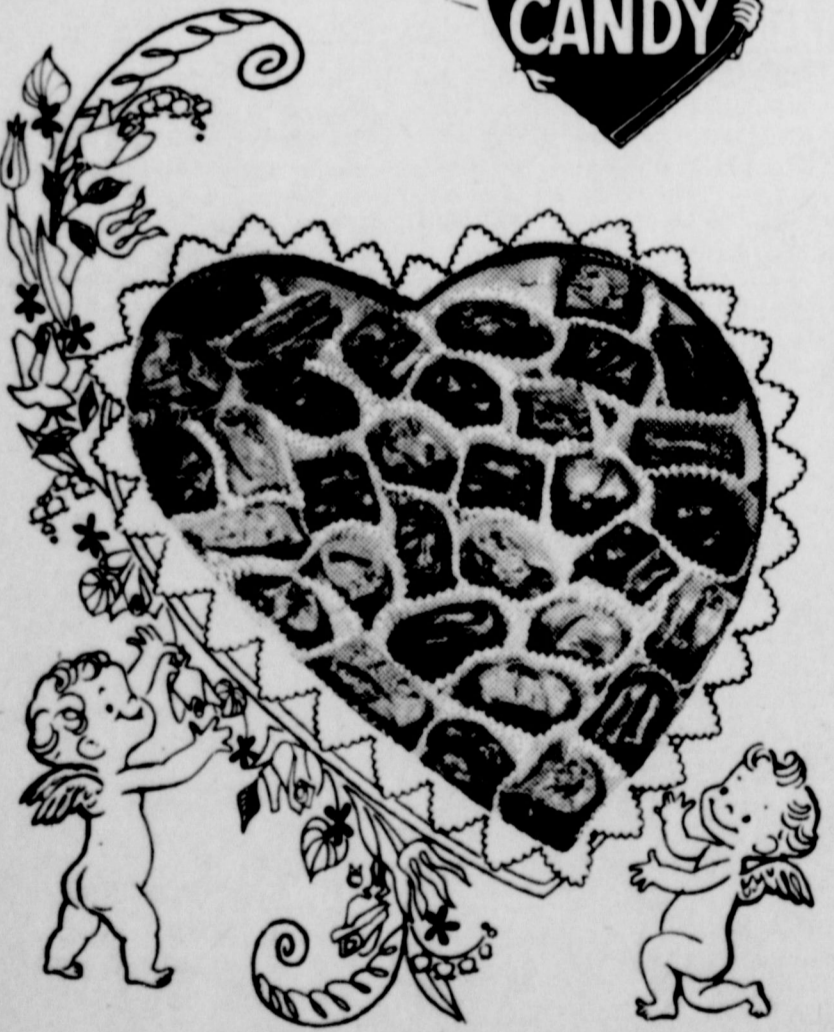

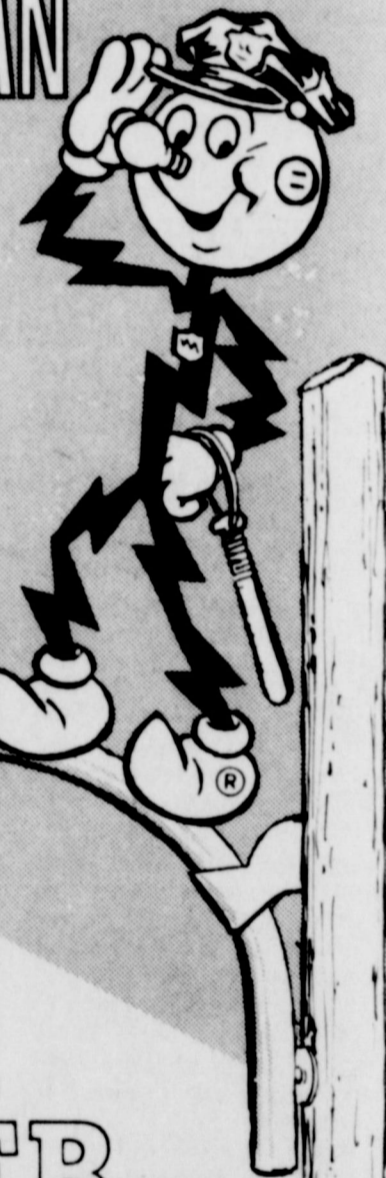
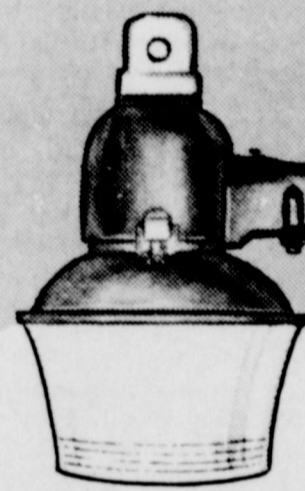
