Time has brought about many inges in our educational sys-, the same as it has brought ut many changes in other ses of our lives.





Yardsticks for creation of a district are counties which can provide a tax base of \$100 to \$200 million valuation and potential for 1,000 student enrollment after five years of operation.

The district must put up most of the cost of plant site and construction, and part of the operational cost. State funds are available on a basis of \$425 per year per full student unit, and student fees are now set at a maximum of \$50 per semester for any state-supported school.

Regions were suggested by a state co-ordinating board for higher education.





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
