

El Buen Pastor Church Building Project To Begin Soon South of Present Parsonage

The building project for El Buen Pastor Methodist Church is slated to begin within the next few weeks. Contracts were awarded to The Kerr Mercantile Co. last week for the construction of the building. There were two other bidders on the job, according to Rev. Moises Yanez, pastor.

The building will be situated on the property just south of the present parsonage.

Rev. Yanez stated that the building project had started and begun several times during the past several years, but the congregation now had more than half of the cost of the building on hand and a loan was made with the Methodist Board of Missions for the balance. He stated that the help for the project had come from various sources within and from outside the church and ran from \$1 to \$15 per month on the building fund.



Kite Flyers Are Warned of Dangers

Kite-flying is a traditional sport that never seems to lose its appeal to young and old alike, and, whether young or old, smart kite-fliers will observe the basic rules of safety, according to Jimmy Caroline, Community Public Service Company manager.

"One of the most important rules," emphasizes Caroline, "is to never fly a kite where there is a possibility of its getting entangled in electric wires. "

Other dangerous practices in kite-flying include using metal string or wire, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve a kite if it becomes tangled in electric wires. As reminder, CPS has distrib-



Still in the planning stage, huge Vista de Amistad Tower, expected to loom 650 feet high on the shore of Amistad Reservoir in the vicinity of the new highway bridge spanning Devil's River, has been found economically feasible and work is underway on a structural feasibility study.

The \$6 million project will involve a complex including the tower, a marina, marina motel, golf course, club house and various recreational facilities on the shore of the reservoir.

the structural feasibility study. The Economic Development Administration in Washington approved a grant of \$90,000 for the feasibility study.

The tower is planned for a site 50 feet above the water level of the lake, making the tower itself rise an estimated 700 feet above the lake.

Two restaurant levels are planned for the tower. They will be some 12 stories from the ground, resting atop eight supporting arches that form the base of the tower. These arches or legs form a giant framework 320 feet in diameter coverging 80 feet above the ground level.

The roof of the top restaurant forms an observation deck and recreational area 170 feet in diameter, consisting of an indoor air conditioned area surrounding the center core but with the major part being the outdoor perimeter, the plans of Edward Gondeck of San Antonio, architect, indicate in the drawing.

This level will have swimming pools, lounging areas, recreational areas such as shuffleboard, ping-pong and other amusement facilities. The level will serve as a facility to the patrons of the 125-unit motor hotel situated immediately above, providing facilities for relaxation and recreation, and, in addition, affording guests an opportunity to enjoy a complete panoramic view of the entire area, partly visible from individual rooms.

Plans call for the tower strucing span for 210 feet to reach

er. This will consist of a high level public observation area; above it, a two-level cocktail lounge and supper club and atop this, a high-level observation area for proposed government use for surveillance of the lake region. It will provide accommodations for radio and microwave equipment and the uppermost portion of the tower will consist of a 160-foot radio and microwave tower.

Three glass-walled elevators housed inside glass tubes will form the center core of the entire structure and will serve all levels. A fourth quadrant will house a spiralled safety-stair. Two additional elevators will serve the restaurant levels and the motor hotel, according to the plans. Approximately 570 acres of land make up Recreational Area D, proposed site for the Vista de Amistad Project. It is situated almost directly between the Devil's River Basin and the Rio Grande Basin of the lake and is expected to provide a dramatic view of the entire lake and Amistad Dam. Its location will provide almost equal opportunity for observing Mexican and Texas portions of the lake and region.

Architectural plans call for the project to include a marina motel of approximately 250 units located on the cliffs of the lake immediately north of the base of the tower. A floating marina complex including mechanical boat launching facilities, dry land and inwater boat storage is also planned for construction at the foot of the marina motel.

The area under consideration is composed of two peninsulas, the smaller being the location for the tower, marina and marina motel. The larger peninsula is approximately 8,000 feet long and projects northeasterly into the Devil's River Basin- It is considered an excellent terrain for an 18-hole golf course.

The total project will cost an estimated \$16,000,000. Early plans and specifications for the tower structure have been completed and an estimate of \$9 million for construction of the tower has been made by contractors.




