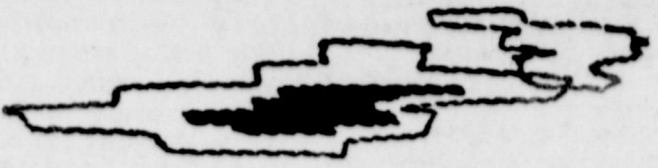

LISTEN TO LUKE

We heard this week that the high school band students were the subject of three letters of commendation for their behavior at Lamesa recently. All of the letters were high in their praise of the behavior of the students and one - from a restaurant - is said to have invited the students back at any time and the owner stated that this was the first such letter ever written by him during several years in business.
Our congratulations go to the students and their leaders, and in an effort to put some icing on the cake we will say that this is exactly what was expected by all of us.

Mrs. Ginette Litton, county treasurer, stated the first of the week that up to that time only 8 dogs had been registered in the county. The deadline for registering is April 1 and Aubry Harrell, who was named by the commissioners to enforce the dog law, stated that all dogs found after that date without current registration would be picked up. Dogs that are born or brought into town after the registration, should be registered after they are six months old, Harrell stated.

There has been no mass slaughter of livestock near Sanderson that we know of this year, but there could be a mass extermination of stray dogs if they are found after the registering deadline.

One of the accomplishments of recent days that is worth noting is the removal of the large pile of debris from the flood that was piled up between the old Sanderson Wool Commission Co. building and the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. O'Bryant. The debris was piled up there by one of the work crews that came here to help us clean up right after the flood.

All of the trash, brush, and dirt was taken to the area east of the bridge and north of the highway, where the Northcut service station and the Orchid Cafe were, dumped there and leveled out in an effort to hide some other debris that was left there following the destruction of those buildings by the flood water.

It is not long until summer and we are going to have a lot of visitors through here on their way to HemisFair and to Mexico City to the Olympics, and to the Amistad Dam. It would be nice to present as pretty a picture as possible of our town to those who are going through.

We have noticed some buzzards flying and mesquite trees budding out. Both of these weather profits are considered to be authentic heralds of spring weather and a sure sign that winter is over. We hope they know what they are flying and budding about.

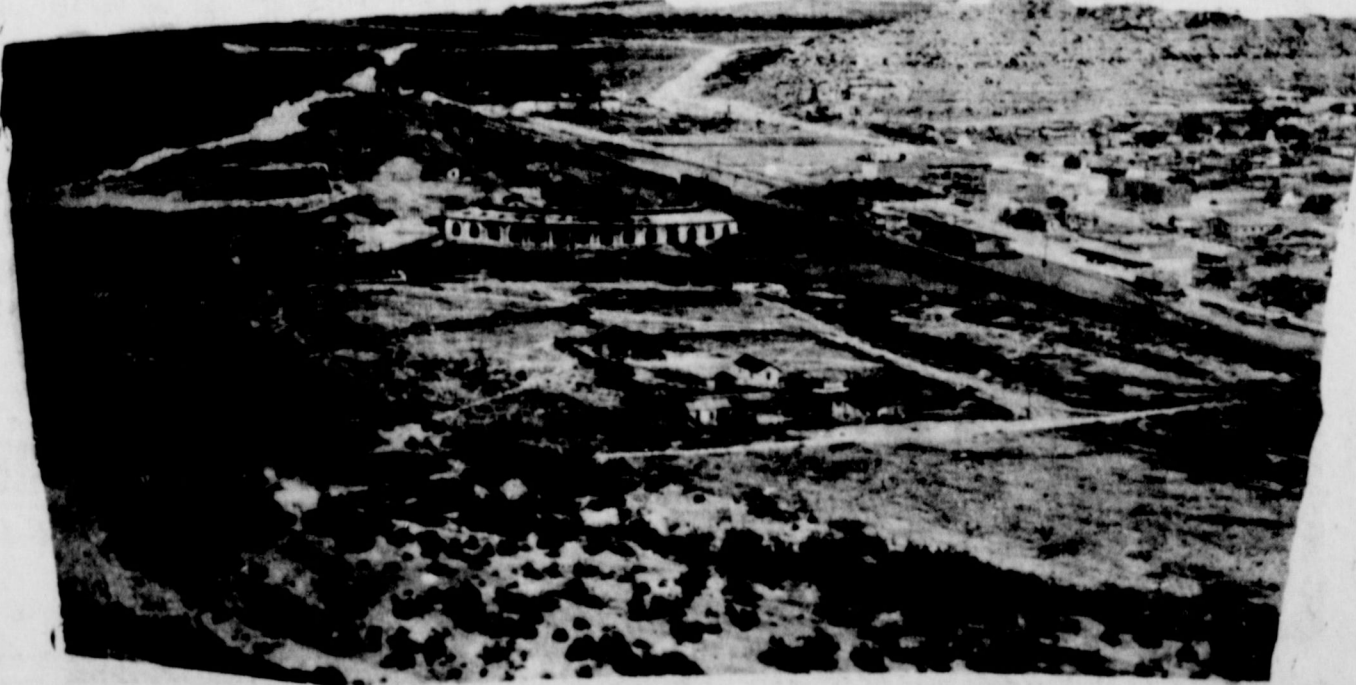
She is survived by a brother, W. H. Savage, of Sanderson and several nephews and nieces.

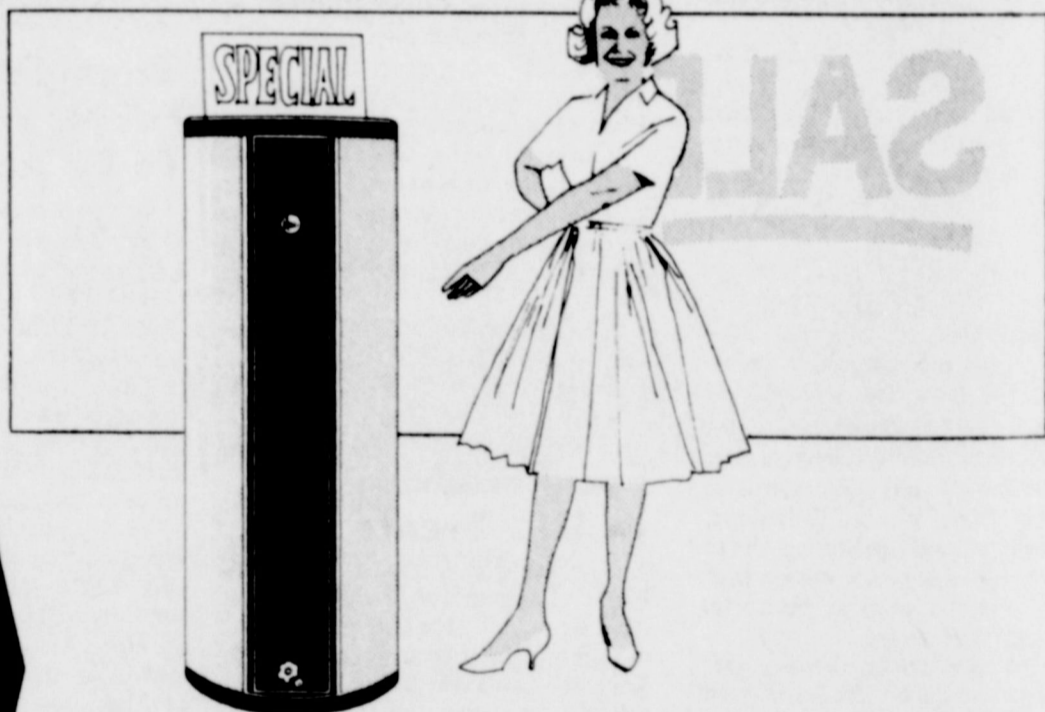

DO THIS FIRST

1. Send for a doctor—immediately.
2. Keep the patient warm.
3. Determine if patient has taken
 - (a) a poison
 - (b) an overdose
4. While waiting for physician, give appropriate counterdose below.
5. But do not force any liquids on the patient—if he is unconscious.
6. And do not induce vomiting if patient is having convulsions.
