Woman Dies Of Asphyxiation In County Jail Sunday

A woman identified as Josephine Atkinson Schmidt, 37, of Andrews, died in the Terrell County jail possibly early Sunday morning. She was found by Pilar Rodriguez, custodian at the courthouse who had gone to take care of his early-morning duties there.

When Rodriguez arrived at the courthouse, he found it filled with smoke and saw the body of the woman lying in the cell. He summoned Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg, who in turn got Dr. Jeff M. Flowers and the woman was pronounced dead. Justice of the Peace W. G. Shoemaker is withholding a verdict pending the findings of an autopsy being performed in San Antonio.

The victim had smoked several cigarettes apparently, from the number of stubs found on the floor. The mattress in the north end of the cell was almost completely consumed by fire, and the other mattress in the downstairs cell had caught fire. Deputy Sheriff Hogg stated that the woman had been jailed Saturday afternoon about 4:30 on a charge of being drunk and that during that afternoon and evening he had checked on her and up to about midnight, when he went home, she was alright and there was no fire in the cell.

The supposition is that the woman fell asleep with a cigarette lighted and the mattress caught fire and she was asphyxiated by the smoke.

News of the autopsy was received Tuesday morning by Bill C. Cooksey, Terrell County Sheriff. The report was that the woman had died of carbon monoxide inhalation and there were no burns or marks on the body that could have contributed to or been associated with her demise.

Mrs. Schmidt's body was taken to Kenedy from San Antonio for burial Tuesday afternoon.

CAP Air Show Saturday At Dryden; Large Crowd Expected To Be On Hand

Terrell County's first air show will be Saturday at the Dryden air strip. The show will be sponsored by the county's Civil Air Patrol, which was organized about six months ago.

Dr. Jeff M. Flowers, commander of the local unit, stated that everything was in readiness for the event and that they were expecting about 3,000 people to witness the show.

The fly-in of visitors is expected to begin at about 9:30 in the morning and people who like to watch aircraft land and who like to view different types of aircraft are urged to be on hand early to watch the fly-ins.

Serving of the barbecue lunch will begin at 11:00 a. m. and will continue until all are fed or until 1:00 p. m.

At 12:30 there will be the introduction of guests and a presentation of awards.

At 1:00 p. m. there will be a fly-by demonstrator aircraft.

Demonstrations of helicopter rescues will be at 3:15 p. m. and beginning at 3:45 p. m. there will be scenic plane rides.

At 9:00 p. m. the Patrol is sponsoring a dance at the V. F. W. Hall with music to be by Charles Cook and his orchestra.

The price of admission to the air show is \$1.50 and will include the noon meal.

The Civil Air Patrol includes both adults and young people and instructions are given the young people in various phases of the science and mechanics associated with flying and the entire unit is available to work as they can in search and rescue work in this area. The members have been active in painting and repairing the buildings at the airport, clearing the area adjacent to the runways and an area for parking, and otherwise doing maintenance work at the airport.

The adults in the organization are primarily responsible for the leadership of the youth and do the administrative work for the Patrol.

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Second Street Closed at School

Second Street has been closed on the block where the school construction is going on and will be permanently closed on authority of the Commissioners Court.

The two blocks between First and Third Streets and between Pine and Hackberry will be used for the schools.

Since the junior high school students will be using the gymnasium in their physical education classes during the day, a certain hazard would also have existed in having the students crossing Second Street, plus the fact that closing the street will make possible much more playground area.

It was also pointed out that the school property extends the full length of the block on both sides of Second Street and possible expansion at some other time would be simpler with the street closed.

Some Voters Restricted To Statewide Officers

Under provisions of Art. 5 .05c of the Election Code, enacted in 1967, a person who is a fully qualified voter except for the requirement of six months' residence in the county is entitled to vote on statewide offices and issues, although he may not vote on local offices and issues until he has lived in the county for six months. He is also entitled to vote for any district offices of districts in which he has lived for the last six months preceding the election.

Voters who have lived in the county for less than six months must vote in the county clerk's office, during the period for absentee voting and under similar procedures.

Persons who feel they qualify for voting on statewide offices and issues may consult County Clerk Ruel Adams for further information.

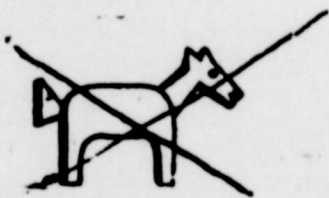

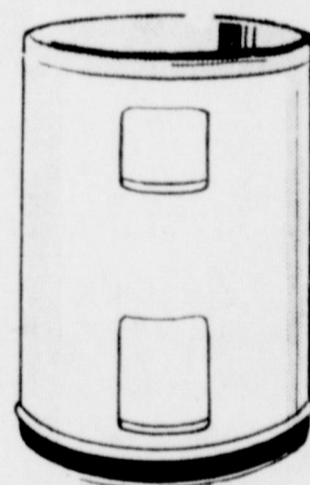

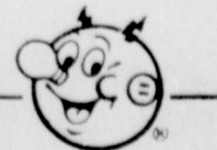

The first is not too difficult to a good student, but the second is given or gained by too few!

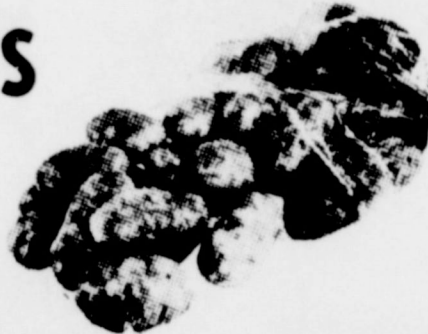

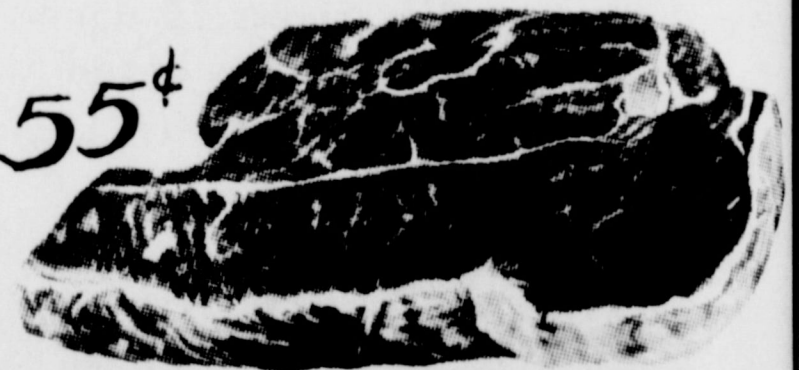

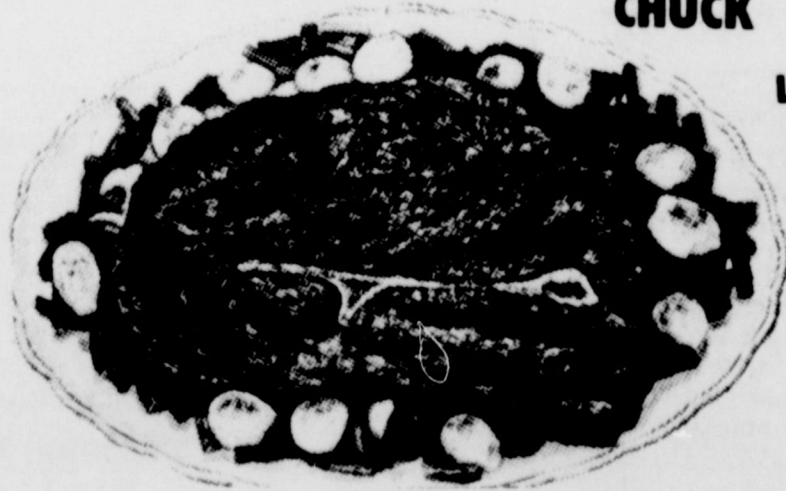
