Tom Mix was one of our idols in boyhood days, and what any boy about my age would not be given to stand next to him and have that arm around him! Probably there was no Tom Mix show that we did not see at least twice and the miles and miles that we saw him ride Tony, the bad man, and the number of fights he won! You just can't go up against Tom Mix! And long before Dodge cars were using "white hats" as the symbol of the good guys, Tom Mix was the epitome of the good guys! 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Large Crowd At Dryden Saturday For Air Show Sponsored By Civil Air Patrol

A large crowd was on hand at the Dryden airstrip Saturday afternoon to witness the air show sponsored by the Terrell County Civil Air Patrol.

Fly-ins began about 9:30 a. m. Saturday and about 300 people from out-of-town were on hand for the show, according to Dr. Jeff M. Flowers. These included army personnel from Laughlin Air Force Base in Del Rio, CAP officials and personnel from Odessa and Midland, and demonstrators of various types of aircraft from Del Rio and Odessa-Midland.

Serving of the barbecue meal began at about 11:00 a. m. and

at about 12:30 there was an introduction of the visiting guests by Dr. Flowers, the local unit commander.

CAP Group Commander, Lt. - Col. Joe Johnson of Odessa, was introduced and presented the organizational charter to Dr. Flowers. The presentation is shown in the picture at the top to the left. Not shown in the picture is Col. Shelton from Laughlin AFB, who brought a letter of commendation and best wishes for success from the commander of the Air Base. He also presented Dr. Flowers with a map of this area for use of any who are doing any flying between here and Del Rio and for any other purposes for which it might be put to use. Some photographs and a model of some of the operational aircraft at Laughlin AFB were also presented to the local unit.

U. S. Representative Richard C. White was introduced and made a speech to the crowd; George Baker of Fort Stockton and Jim Kent of Monahans, the Democratic and Republican candidates for the office of Representative of the 66th District of Texas were on hand and made brief remarks about their campaigns. 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Mrs. Sotela Garcia ... 112-year-old resident dies.

The death of Mrs. Sotela Garcia Sunday marked the passing of the oldest resident of the community.

Funeral services were held in St. James Catholic Church Tuesday morning at 9:00 o'clock with Rev. Dan Dierschke, pastor, officiating. Burial was made in Santa Rita Cemetery.

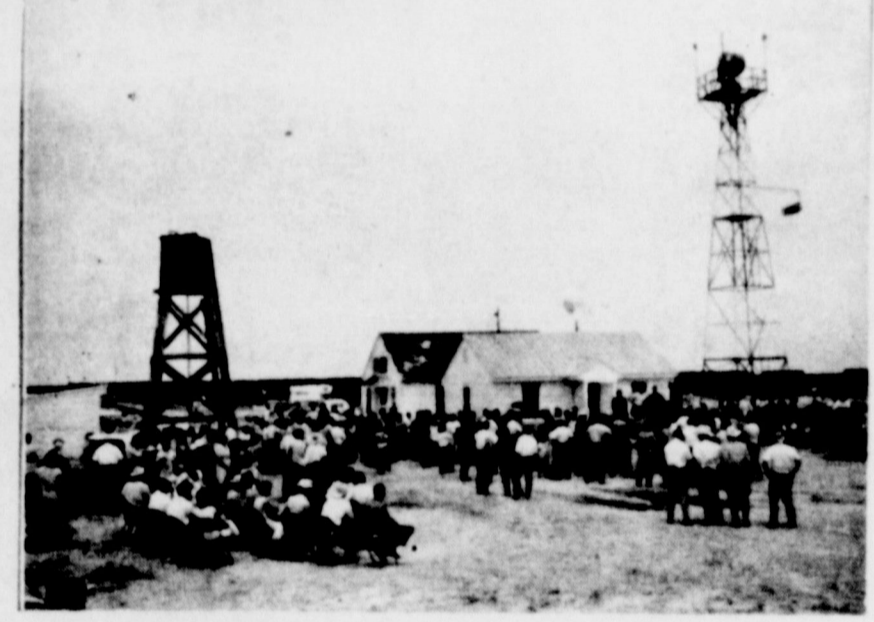
Although Mrs. Garcia's family was able only to estimate her age after all of the papers she had were destroyed in the flood in 1965, she is thought to have been 112 years old. She spoke of seeing in Monterrey the "Emperatriz" (empress) who was Princess Charlotte of Belgium who was married in 1857 to Maximilian, the French Emperor of Mexico for a brief period after the Civil War. "I saw her when I was a little girl, she passed by in a coach," said Mrs. Garcia. That and other things which she recalled over the years have made it possible for relatives to estimate her age.

Until an attack of "flu" in January which diminished her strength and caused her health to fail during the past three months, she had been in good health considering her age. She had surgery after a gall bladder ailment developed nine years ago and made normal recovery. She never did wear glasses and was able to make patchwork quilts by hand until recently.

She was born in the State of Tamaulipas in a small pueblo and her family thinks she first came to Texas in 1908. She settled in Marathon and came to Sanderson sometime after 1924. Many long-time residents here remember her from their childhood.

She was married four times

Mrs. Margaret Gray Woodward, 70-year-old native of Del Rio, died Saturday morning in San Antonio after suffering a stroke Thursday night.

Private rites and burial in Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery were in that city the first of the week and Requiem will be on Saturday, April 27, in the Trinity Episcopal Church in San Antonio.

Born in Del Rio on November 20, 1897, the daughter of John M. and Kate Rose Gray, longtime residents of Del Rio, she graduated from the Del Rio High School and attended the University of Texas. She taught school before her marriage to Col. H. G. Woodward and they resided on a ranch near Sanderson.

Besides her husband, she is survived by a son, John M. Woodward of Houston and several other relatives including Hugh Rose, Mrs. Tol Murrah and Roger Rose, cousins, of Sanderson.

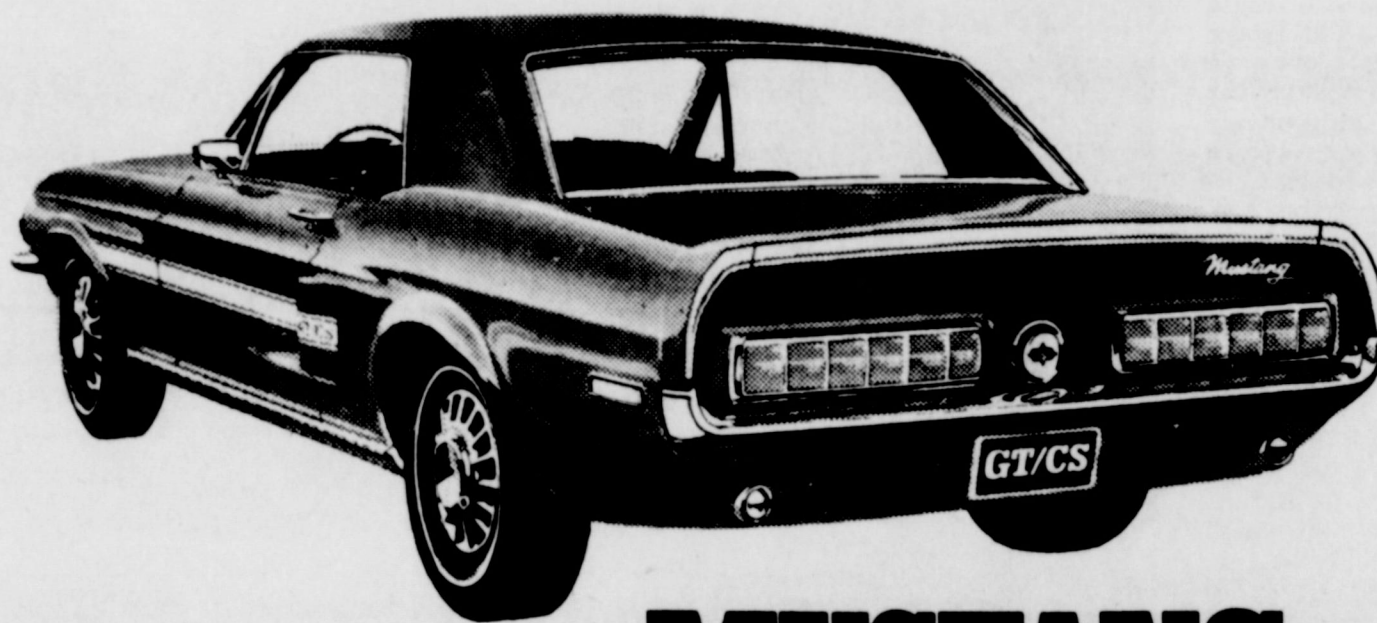

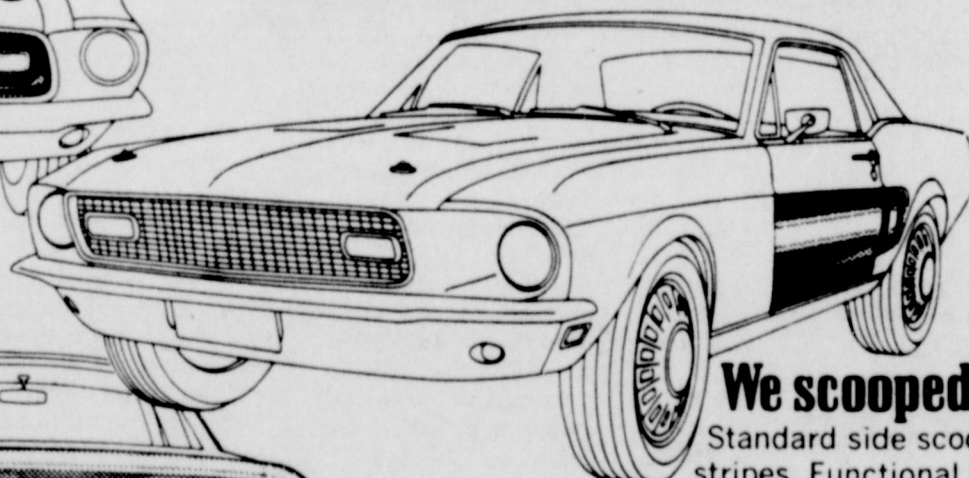

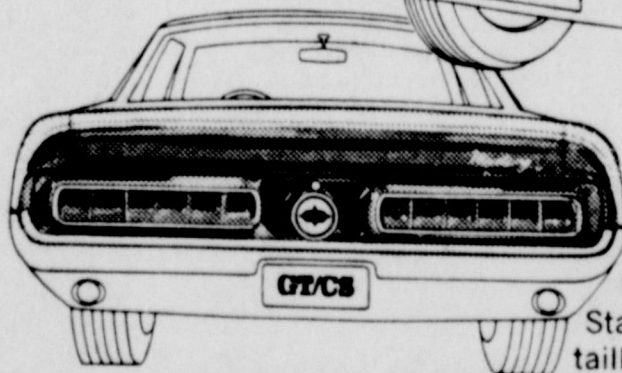

Postal Patrons Advised Of New Pandering Law

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail, Postmaster Hodgkins said today in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet—"How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements"—which is now available at the Sanderson post office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-sized leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaint to the post office.

The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement which is, in his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language, to his post office with the words, "Request for prohibitory order" on the face of the envelope.

Postmaster Hodgkins said, "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to children."

"Last year the Post Office Department received some 140,000 complaints from those offended by pandering advertisements. While in most cases the ads were not legally obscene and were therefore mailable, they are often offensive and are usually not the type of material one would want his children to read," Postmaster Hodgkins said.

He added that because the law gives a mail patron the sole right to decide what is offensive, and does not deny others the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt it does not violate Constitutional guarantees of the freedom of speech.

While the patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, Postmaster Hodgkins believes that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because "the great bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 so-called 'smut dealers' who are frequently swapping mailing lists."

If a mailer does not strike a complainant's name from this mailing list, and the patron receives a second mailing 30 days after the firm has received the prohibitory order, he may bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster issuing the initial order by writing him and enclosing the second pandering ad with its envelope. If the mailer still fails to respect the order, the Postmaster General may ask the Attorney General to apply for a Federal Court order directing compliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.



Absentee Voting To April 30

Absentee voting for the Democratic and Republican Primaries will continue through Tuesday, April 30, four days prior to the actual voting on Saturday, May 4.

Voters who moved into Terrell County on or after November 4, 1967, must vote prior to April 30 in the office of the county clerk, according to an announcement made recently by Clerk Ruel Adams.

At the last report Tuesday morning, a total of 17 Terrell County residents had applied for absentee ballots.

A new law enacted last year permits registered voters with less than six months' residence in the county to vote on all statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the state longer than one year, but they must vote in the county clerk's office under procedures similar to absentee voting. The new law puts into effect a constitutional amendment adopted in November, 1966.

Formerly, a person who moved from one county to another within the state was totally disfranchised for the first six months after he moved, unless one or more of the various types of districts (congressional, legislative, judicial, etc.) included both the county of his former residence and the county of his new residence. If he had lived in a district for six months before the election, he could vote on statewide offices and issues and on the offices for districts in which he had six

months' residence, but he could not vote on local offices and issues within the county.

The new law preserves the voting rights which existed under the old law, but the procedure for voting has been changed. Heretofore, a person entitled to vote on the basis of six months' residence in a district voted on election day at the regular polling place for the voting precinct of his new residence. Under the new law, no one who has resided in the county less than six months may vote at a regular polling place, and all voting by such persons must be done through the county clerk's office. The voter must appear in person at the clerk's office between the twentieth day and the

fourth day preceding the election unless he is unable to appear because of sickness or physical disability, or unless he is absent from the county during that period. Sick or disabled voters and those temporarily absent from the county may obtain a ballot by mail.

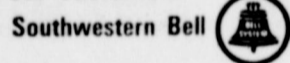

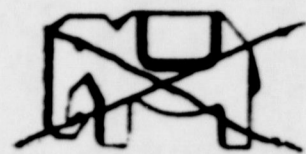
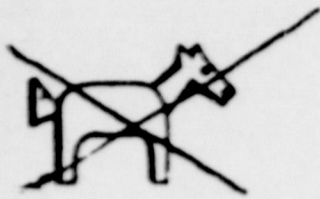
