Former Resident Dies In Rotan

Funeral services were held in McCamey for Onofre Lopez Jr., 32, relative of several Sanderson residents and a former resident here, last Friday. Burial was in that city.

Lopez was killed instantly on Wednesday afternoon when a 2,000-volt line which severed and sagged came in contact with his body while he was working on a high-line near the city limits of Rotan. Fellow workers had to climb the pole and bring the body down.

He was born December 7, 1935, in Comstock and had lived in Sanderson and McCamey before moving to Stamford. He was married to Socorra Molina on July 10, 1954, in Rankin.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Viola Lopez, Loree Ann Lopez, and Anette Lopez; two sons, Rudy and Eddie Lopez, all of Stamford; his mother, Mrs. Pat Trevino of Fort Stockton; and two sisters, Mrs. Mona Rodriguez and Mrs. Martha Gonzales, both of Fort Stockton; his grandfather, Luciano Trevino; and an uncle, Luciano Trevino Jr., both of Sanderson.

Senator Accused Of LCB Meddling

The assistant chief of the Texas Liquor Control Board's enforcement division has asserted San Angelo Sen. Dorsey Hardeman used influence to keep TLCB agents from examining records of an Impact liquor store.

William A. Mason said Hardeman interfered when he sought to examine records of an Impact liquor store.

Impact is in a wet precinct adjoining legally dry Abilene.

Mason said that after a telephone call from the store manager, Hardeman asked the investigator wait until the senator could be present later in the day and argued that TLCB agents lacked authority to see the records until Mason showed him a copy of the law.

"He finally agreed that we did (have the right)," said Mason. "But by then the records had disappeared. We finally managed to get them sometime later," charged Mason.

Hardeman was in Del Rio, could not be reached for comment at midmorning today.

Also today John W. Crank, former chief investigator for TLCB, who was either ousted or who quit, said Hardeman and other legislators have appeared at administrative hearings of the liquor board.

"Getting a member of the legislature to represent a guy was almost a sure way to get his penalty for a violation either reduced or eliminated altogether," said Crank today in

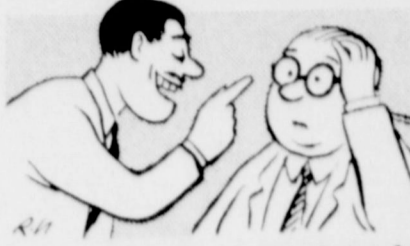

Whooping Cough ----

Your Youngsters Can Be Protected By Immunization

Whooping cough is an acute infectious communicable disease which involves the respiratory tract.

The characteristic cough accompanied by a whooping sound is almost diagnostic.

The American Medical Association's fact sheet on whooping cough reports that the disease was known as early as 1578 and occurred in epidemic form in England in the 17th century.

The organism responsible is a rod-shaped bacterium known as *Haemophilus pertussis* which is



found in the discharge coughed from the respiratory passages by a victim of the disease. The organ-

ism does not survive for any length of time outside the body and is quickly destroyed by drying and exposure to heat and sunlight.

The disease may occur at any season but is most common in late winter, spring and summer. Most cases appear at ages under five years. One attack usually produces immunity. Vaccination against whooping cough is effective. Many school districts require vaccination against whooping cough and several other childhood diseases before children may enroll in school.

Symptoms include inflammation of the respiratory tract and much secretion of mucus, which becomes quite thick and sticky as

the disease progresses. Coughing may be prolonged and violent and accompanied by a whooping sound. Sometimes the child may vomit after a coughing spell.

Convalescence usually begins after four weeks. Very young children are most seriously affected.

Medical care, isolation and good nursing care are essential.

Mark The Square, Or It Won't Count

Numerous changes mark the ballots being used in 1968 primaries, and some are causing considerable confusion, it is learned from questions asked by some absentee voters, and from comments of candidates and election officials.

Major change in form of the ballot are use of ballot squares to be checked opposite the name of choices, rather than the old method of scratching. Also noted is the elimination of county of residence after the names of state and district candidates, and a new sequence of offices.

On 1968 ballots federal candidates go ahead of state candidates, which means that even though Congressmen are elected by district, they are listed above statewide candidates. Sequence of offices on the ballots is prescribed by the new code, and must be followed in all counties in the same manner.

Another new requirement is that a square must be marked in order for votes for unopposed candidates to be counted. Leaving them unmarked will simply mean that the vote will not count for the un-opposed candidate.

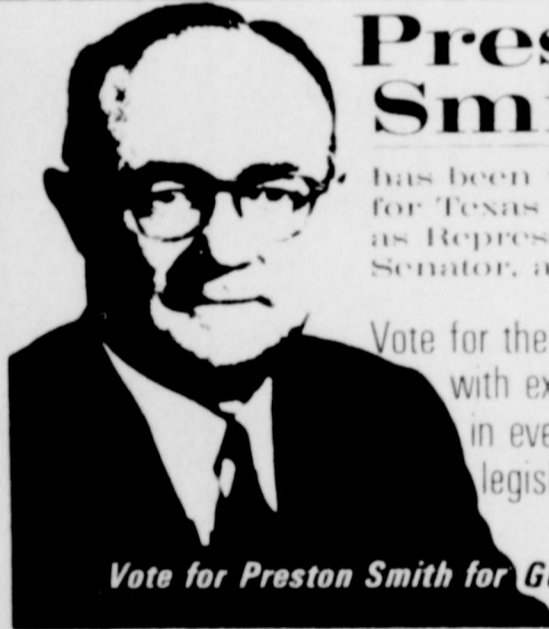

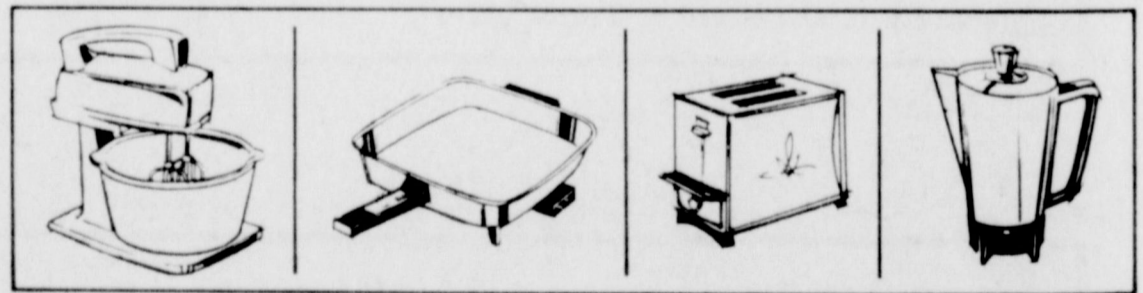

A half-century later, some American men are spending what Mrs. Rowe did — and more — on their own grooming aids and toiletries. As a matter of fact, manufacturers of men's colognes and aftershaves say they are currently leading the entire fragrance field in gallons sold annually! It is said they now represent fifty per cent of all fragrance sales.

The sale of male hairpieces is also booming. With the emphasis on youth in the American society, and the sale of men's cosmetics at a level undreamed of a decade ago, hairpieces are being sold, talked about and worn these days in large numbers.

According to the manufacturers of men's hairpieces, the average age of the men customers is now between 25 and 40. Estimates of the number who wear hairpieces today range around the 500,000-mark. The hair used in men's custom hairpieces comes off the head of women, particularly those in Italy and Spain.

Direct observation and psychological tests given in a study of home accidents by a large insurance company reveal that some women are more accident-prone than others. The accident-prone woman is generally shorter than average, and quite feminine in appearance. She is slightly hypochondriac, is quite emotional in her approach to problems, and is not well organized. Sloppy workers are also accident-prone. The accident-free woman, on the other hand, is taller, calmer, faster at her work, well-organized, uses the correct tools, and follows directions. So it was said.

Marking Ballot Correctly Insures Counted Vote

George Baker, unopposed for the Democratic nomination for the Texas Legislature, 66th District, this week issued a warning to voters on the need for complete marking of the primary ballot.

Changes in the election code effective this year provide for use of the ballot square to be marked, rather than the old system of scratching out the unwanted candidates.

"This means", said the Fort Stockton newspaper man seeking his first political office, "that unless you check the square opposite the name of any uncontested candidate, he will not receive your vote. You must mark the ballot squares opposite the names of your choices in all races, even those without opposition, in order to vote in those races."

Careful study of the ballot form and the instructions is suggested before voting, and if there are any questions election officials probably can clear them up on request.

"I appreciate very much the confidence that voters of the district have indicated by allowing me to run unopposed in the Democratic primary. I plan an active campaign before the general election, and hope to meet many more voters and discuss local problems and state issues with them," said Baker.

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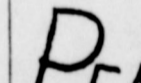
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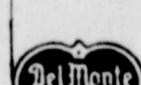
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
