He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. K. Mitchell, Terrell County ranchers, who with their daughter, Miss Lelee Mitchell, attended the graduation exercises.

Mr. Mitchell was in the honors program and graduated with honors with a major in animal science as a distinguished student of the College of Agriculture.

He was on the dean's honor roll seven semesters; a scholar in the Department of Animal Science; won the American Society of Animal Science Award twice; and the Professor of Aerospace Studies Outstanding Scholar Award. He held honorary memberships in Phi Kappa Phi, which he entered in his junior year; in Alpha Zeta, in which he was president, reporter, and chairman of the Constitution Committee.

A pet javelina attacked and bit Mrs. Alton Yeary severely on each leg Tuesday of last week near the Club Cafe on the east side of Sanderson.

David Cook, local game warden, had received complaints that the pet hog had snapped at some people and went to the cafe to talk to the owners about the pet, he said. He was on his way into the cafe to talk to Mrs. Yeary, who operates the business, when he heard a scream and ran to the north side of the cafe in time to see the javelina attacking Mrs. Yeary. He shot the animal with his pistol and gave aid to Mrs. Yeary.

Several stitches were required to close the wounds on each leg.

Cooke warned people of the dangers in trying to keep pet wildlife which so often harm someone and have to be destroyed. He stated that Mrs. Yeary had gone around to the north side of the cafe to call "Porky" to follow her home as the animal was asleep under the air conditioner and evidently when she called the pig was startled and attacked.

Speculation existed in the hazards involved had it been a small child or if the person attacked had been knocked to the ground.
