Sites Set For Hearings On SP Passenger Service

El Paso, San Antonio, and Houston are three of seven cities in which hearings will be held by the Interstate Commerce Commission in regard to the Southern Pacific Railroad's proposed discontinuance of the passenger trains between Los Angeles, Calif., and New Orleans, La. Plans were to discontinue the service on June 24 but on June 7 the ICC ordered an investigation and stated that the trains should continue operating for at least four months.

The hearings to begin on July 15 before ICC Hearing Examiner Louis E. Bartoo, will be concluded on July 30.
