Big Entry List For Horse Show Last Saturday

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Baker of Arnold, Neb., former residents of Terrell County, had the Grand Champion mare of the sixth annual Sanderson Rodeo Club's Quarterhorse show. The mare is Bar Queen Jo. The reserve champion mare, unnamed, was owned by J. F. Cowley of Eldorado.

The Grand Champion stallion was Tiger Rey, owned by Gary Montz of Alpine and Oso 52, owned by Jesse Dotson of Fort Stockton, was reserve champ.

King Sando Leo, also owned by the Bakers, was the only entry in the gelding class.

Judge of the show was Ray Lewis of Dell City. O. T. Suddugh, president of the club, was the show manager, and Gilbert Bell is vice-president.

Barney Blue Joe, owned by D. W. Vawter of Sanderson, won first place in the junior and senior cutting class. Second place was won by Bar Queen Jo, owned by the Bakers; third place honors went to Gyp Dusty, owned by Phil Maddox of Sanderson; and fourth place went to Leo Red Jet, owned by Carlene Maddox, also of Sanderson.

Dark Powers, owned by J. F. Cawley of Eldorado, won the barrel racing event in lieu of no competition.

October 30 Set For Approval Of Local Dams Project

The Watershed Work Plan Staff of the Soil Conservation Service at San Marcos has scheduled 102 man-days of work during July on the Sanderson Canyon Watershed Work Plan. The work plan is slated for completion on October 30 of this year and will be presented to the local sponsors for their approval.

The Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District and the Commissioners Courts of Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster Counties are the sponsors.

One engineer and two economists from the Work Plan Staff will be in Sanderson July 8-12 to tabulate flood damages and calculate damage schedules.

Study Slated of Rio Grande As Possible 'Scenic River' Is Planned by U.S. Bill

The House Interior Committee approved a bill last week to study 300 miles of the Rio Grande west of the Terrell County line as a possible designation as a scenic river.

The national legislative committee agreed to an amendment by Rep. Richard C. White of El Paso to add the Rio Grande as one of 28 streams that are to be studied for this potential designation.

The portion to be studied extends from about 75 miles below El Paso in Hudspeth County, along the scenic Camino del Rio highway, through Big Bend National Park and beyond to the eastern boundary of Terrell County.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., succeeded in amending the Senate version of the Wild Rivers bill to include the Big Bend section, from Presidio to Langtry, as a river to be studied.

The area received national at-

tention in 1966 when Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson rode the river on a rubber raft through the Big Bend canyons. The Sierra Club, a conservationist organization, has scheduled a similar trip for next November.

The Rio Grande at 1,885 miles is the fifth longest river in North America. It provides much of the boundary between the United States and Mexico.

Approximately a 70-mile reach of the river in New Mexico would be declared a scenic river immediately under both the Senate and House bills.

White's amendment would require the consent of Mexico to study the U.S. side of the river for possible designation as a scenic river.

White said the International Boundary Commission has encouraged him to seek the study of the Rio Grande, much of which flows through country still in a wilderness state. Presidio is the only town adjacent to the river under the 300-mile segment to be studied.

Instead of a picture, this week we are publishing a copy of the organizational meeting of the first Terrell County Chamber of Commerce. The date is April 20, 1920. The organizational meeting is self-explanatory and later details of the organization will be following. The documents were loaned by Edward Kerr and are from the files of his late father, Joe Kerr Sr.

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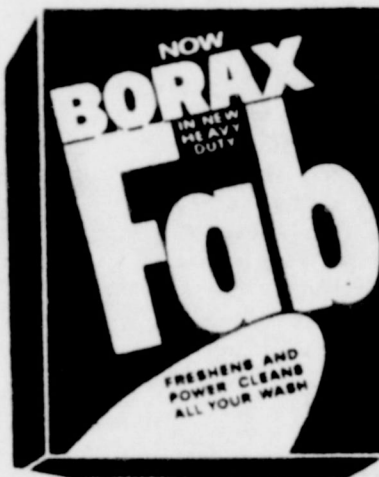
