### Grand Jury Ends Two-Day Session

Twelve bills of indictment were drawn up by the Terrell County Grand Jury in two days of hearing evidence this week. The group met Monday morning and adjourned that evening to begin Tuesday morning, adjourning at about 4:00 p.m.

There were no no-bills returned by the grand jury, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cook-

None of the defendants named in the indictments had been arrested and charged before a magistrate, so the names of the accused persons on the indictments could not be released.

Two men were charged with theft on two separate indictments, and with burglary on another indictment; 1 person was charged with burglary; 1 was charged with removing stolen property from the county; 1 was charged with malicious destruction of property belonging to another; 2 were charged with burglary; and 1 with perjury before a grand jury.

Sheriff Cooksey stated that he and Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg had worked long and hard in gathering evidence for the consideration of the grand jury on the cases they heard and upon which they returned the indictments, and he stated that it was the longest list of indictments returned by a grand jury since he had been sheriff of Terrell County.

A panel of petit jurors was summoned for Tuesday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the District Court in an effort to seat a jury to hear a case styled Dionicia Veliz vs. George Gann.

The jury was selected before noon and the case got under way immediately.


Carroll stated that the search for the missing aircraft was abandoned Sunday night and it had not been found.




