Terrell County has had its share of tragedies lately and we could all hope and pray that we will see a time of peace and quiet.

For the living, this is a part of life that we must face, but the fact, nor the knowledge of alone is a solace to us.
We have read and seen pictures of the fact that Amistad dam is now catching water. It was not planned that it will begin to hold all of the water that is self-bound, or even the flood-gate waters, at this time. The present catch - so we are told - is planned to be only a small amount, and following the completion, which will be soon, it will catch the planned amount, it comes down the two rivers. It is also reported that fishermen are already using the water that has been caught to try their luck, and they say that the fishing is good at Amistad.

Sanderson has enjoyed a good business this summer from travelers going down US 90 for whatever reason and Amistad is not going to hurt this boom in business at all.

Sanderson is about to run over the seams with residents who have moved in.

The oil well drilling crew that is working on the well on the Kothmann ranch east of Dryden has increased our headcount some, and the people who are here to get work started on the 130-mile stretch of pipeline toward San Antonio have also called the population some and there will be many more - probably all our housing can stand - who will move in to work on that project. The company estimates about 225 employees.

All of the administrative work at this end of the project will be handled locally and the payroll for this job should be sizeable. Many of the otherwise-vacant positions were already taken up by employees here for the school construction job, and for the remodeling at the Herbert Brown house.

As one person remarked the other day, Sanderson needs more additional housing, if anyone wants to build some rent units.

We may have said too much already, but we can't seem to be satisfied - and we know that many others are not satisfied - with the fact that vandalism is continuing thing here.

This is not a condemnation of law enforcement, of the youth, the parents, but of all of us! We spoke earlier in this column of tragedies and our opinion is that we have had enough. It could be tragic, indeed, if we had another tragedy associated with simple and maybe even trivial vandalism - if there is such a thing.

What we are referring to - is the fact that someone could be prowling around vacant buildings or houses at night. When it is definitely against the law to break and enter even an empty house, or to willfully destroy property belonging to others, this should be reason enough to try to stem this act, and certainly, an interest in their welfare, their well-

Vandals continue their willful and wasteful destruction of local property.
School Superintendent Ken McAllister reported last week that the school gymnasium had been broken into twice recently and bows and arrows taken. He added that to add insult to injury arrows, similar to those in the gym, were found shot through the scoreboard at the football field.

McAllister stated that besides the burglary and theft of the gym and bow and arrows being wrong and costly, the destruction of the scoreboard was also wrong and even more costly.

He said that the slides had been recovered and the bow-arrow-scoreboard incident straightened out and that the parents of boys involved had agreed to make full restitution for any and all damages to the scoreboard.

Pipeline Company Moves In Here

The O. R. Burden Construction Co. has moved into Sanderson and operations are expected to begin soon on the construction of a pipe line from western Pecos County across the central portion of Terrell County to San Antonio.

The 30-inch pipeline will carry natural gas and will be buried in a ditch about four and a half feet deep.

The company has moved in office vans on lots south of the McKnight Motor Co. and west of the postoffice. They estimate there will be between 250 and 200 men employed during the construction project.

The offices here will remain until the completion of the job which is expected in December.

There will be a crew working out of San Antonio at the same time and crew on this end is responsible for the construction of 130 miles of pipeline.

Watershed Project Okay Not Likely Until Next Year

Late developments indicate that the stalemate on watershed approvals will continue through the end of this year, according to information received last week by Darwin Schrader, local work unit conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

Sam Studebaker, president of the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts reported through a regular newsletter that recently a spokesman for the Bureau of the Budget told the House Agriculture Committee that the jurisdictional issue over watershed project approvals will remain to be resolved by the next President when he takes office. Studebaker stated in the newsletter: "In effect, they were saying that President Johnson does not intend to give any more attention to this question during the remainder of his term".

"The occasion for the hearing was to determine why 41 watershed work plans developed under the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (P.L. 566) had not been sent over by the Department of Agriculture for continued to second page

Be it remembered that at a special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, called by the President at the instance of the County Health Officer, Dr. P. F. Robertson, and held at the Bank Building in Sanderson, on the afternoon of September 13th, 1921, the following members were present to-wit: Joe Kerr, President; G. J. Henshaw; S. C. Bodkin; W. H. Mansfield; B. F. Purl; Max Bogusch; F. B. Carter; Dr. P. F. Robertson; T. R. Kuykendall; W. J. Ferguson, and James Kerr.
The President appointed T. R. Kuykendall Temporary Secretary.

After thoroughly discussing the health conditions of the town; the danger of disease and pestilence, due to the dirty condition of the town and the number of hog pens and consequent filth, and the bad and unsanitary conditions of many of the closets and privies of the town, it was moved and adopted that, This Chamber extend to the said County Health Officer, Dr. P. F. Robertson the full and unqualified support of this chamber in his efforts to banish hog pens, bad privies etc., and to assist in every way to sustain him in forcing a thorough and effective clean up of the town, and all of his efforts in this line.

The President was authorized for and on behalf of this Chamber to make necessary arrangements to assist in the hauling and disposition of the trash; to make such arrangements as he can to have the trash hauled off, and if necessary to use the funds of this Chamber in doing so, and to ask and expect from each and every householder the sum of .25¢ monthly, contributed, for the purpose of having said trash hauled off.

No further business being before the Chamber, a motion to adjourn was adopted.

No official report has been issued as to the cause of the accident which occurred early on the morning of July 13 about 4 miles northeast of the Dryden airport on the Milton Holmes ranch west of Dryden.

Congressional consideration. As a result, USDA delivered 15 plans and promised to submit the remaining 26.

"The legal dispute had been over whether it is constitutional for Congressional committees, rather than the entire Congress to approve watershed plans. The result is that some 100 watershed projects across the country are now stalled. Needed flood protection and water development work has been halted, local planning schedules are upset, and the appropriation of state funds for watershed work has been seriously disrupted."
