**LISTEN TO LUKE**

A slow mist that fell almost all night Friday, Saturday, Sunday night, Sunday, and Sunday night, and was still misting at the time of this writing, has got things pretty wet around here. There has been little or no actual downfall of rain locally, but in some parts of the county showers of near 3/4-inch have been reported on top of or preceding a period of slow-falling mist.

The earthworms and snails in our yard are hunting dry ground and are the only things complaining up to now.

There will be a good weed crop coming along soon that will have to be cut down in local yards, and the weed crop in the pastures will be welcomed.

So far as we know, the rainfall has been general, since it was reported by travelers to be steady to Alpine, Fort Stockton, and Del Rio.

Fishermen, locally and nationally, should be interested in the fact that the water behind Amistad Dam is over 100 feet deep and deepening.

Another fact, according to information we have received, is that nearly a million fish have been released into the lake by San Angelo hatcheries.

To date there has been 787, - 750 bass fry, 70,000 advanced fry, 39,475 fingerling bass, and 16,800 fingerling channel catfish.

And additional releases of game fish are planned, according to the information we have.

All this adds up to some fishing ahead.

The burglary of Riggins jewelry store last week made some local citizens aware and a good rumor resulted Sunday morning.

The employees of Kerr's were getting the final figures on their annual inventory and working on Sunday morning. All of the cars parked there and seeing the activity of people inside led to the rumor that Kerr's had been burglarized Saturday night.

This was not a fact. But the awareness of people to such things might be the way that such things are detected.

That brings us to wonder this: It seems almost fantastic that a person or persons could break a showwindow on a well-lighted street and reach in and get several watches, take them out of the boxes, and several rings and not be seen by someone, either before, during, or after the burglary.

At any time of the night when it has been necessary for us to be up at a very late - or early hour - we saw that we were seldom alone.

It may be that someone saw someone on the streets even at a late hour - either driving or walking by several times - to "case" the job, and this information continued to back page

A program on "respect for law and order and duly constituted authority" will be Monday, September 9, at 7:30 p. m. at the high school auditorium.

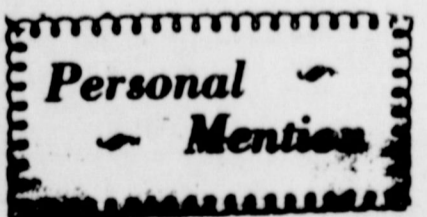

Clyde Griffith died in a Fort Stockton hospital early Tuesday morning. He had been a patient there for several weeks.

He was born in Pleasanton in May of 1891. He is survived by his widow; a son, Clyde Jr., of Redding, Calif.; a grandson, Joel Edward Griffith, of San Antonio; and two sisters: Mrs. John Claibourne and Mrs. Frank Harrell of Charlotte.

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church in Sanderson Wednesday afternoon with the pastor, Rev. Albert Peak, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery following Masonic graveside services. The funeral arrangements were under the charge of the Owens Funeral Home of Fort Stockton.

**Mrs. Alexander Has Close Call In Big Bend Accident**

Mrs. Wandah Alexander, who teaches homemaking in the Sanderson High School, had a harrowing experience and a narrow escape Thursday evening.

Mrs. Alexander, who was crippled by polio and has little use in her back and arms, uses a special harness for her arms when driving. She left Thursday afternoon for Big Bend National Park to get her son, James, who has been working there this summer, for him to enroll in school for his senior year. On the road into the Basin in the park, her car went off the road, overturning and ended in the bottom of a ravine with Mrs. Alexander scared, but unhurt.

The accident occurred about 7:00 p. m., according to reports, but she was not found until about 11:00 a. m. Friday.

James Alexander came to Sanderson Thursday night and found that his mother had left to go for him and realizing that he had not seen her on the road, left immediately for the return trip to look for her. She had not arrived in the Basin and at daylight Park Rangers, the Border Patrol, and employees of Buck Newsome, who operates the horseback concession in the park for whom Alexander worked, and other of his employees began the search for Mrs. Alexander.

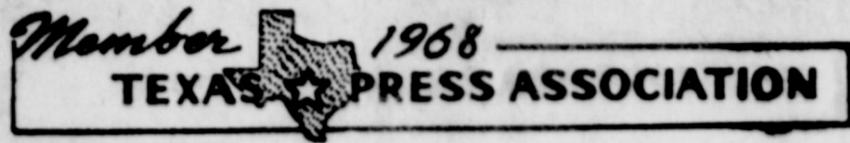

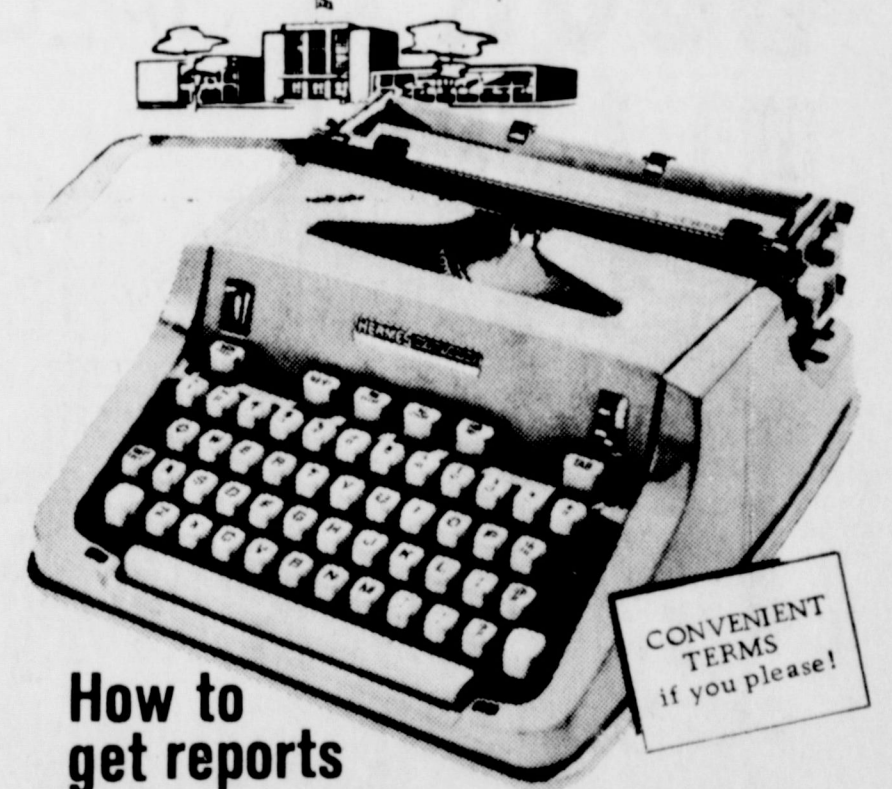

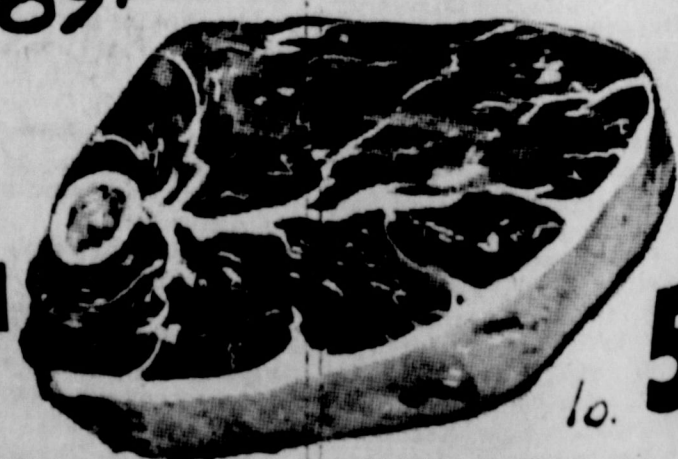
