With the opening of school, things really got to buzzing in a hurry. There seems to be more cars around the school this year than before and the traffic is a little bit heavier it seems, in the vicinity of the high school.

The fact that there is still a little activity in the construction of the new junior high building, probably accounts for some of the traffic, but there is still a need for everyone's being very careful when driving in that area of town, particularly at noon when everyone is anxious to get home and eat.

For example, there seems to be no way to come close to doing the dividing properly without bringing a corner of all of the precincts into Sanderson. This means that all of the people at the gas plant in precinct four, whatever precinct they may be in in the future, will have to come into Sanderson to vote, or all of those in Sanderson in that same precinct will have to go out to the plant to vote, which seems rather unlikely.

The same thing will be true in the other precincts, with possibly as many people who will have to come to town to vote, away from a more scattered area.

There is a story this week of the rehabilitation of some homes and businesses in the 300 block of Oak St.

The clean-up work that was done next to Mi Ranchito Cafe makes the corner look neat and also removed a hazard. The same thing needs to be done in some other locations in the next block east to both improve the appearance of the neighborhood and eliminate some serious hazards.

Weeds have grown up and are hiding some partially uncovered cess pools, the danger of snakes exists, and the walls and roof of the house could fall in.

Visitors Stress Need Of Law and Order At Open Meeting

Charles Sherrill of Fort Stockton and Dixon Mahon of Ozona, district judge and district attorney of the 112th judicial district respectively, talked of law and order and need for respect of and cooperation with laws and law enforcement agencies here Monday night. There were about 60 present in the high school auditorium to hear the remarks of the two visitors.

There was a question and answer period which followed and Jim Kent of Monahans, candidate for the office of state representative from this district in the Republican Party, and Terrell County Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey were invited to the platform for the discussion portion of the program.

The talks were arranged by the Sanderson Masonic Lodge and Ruel Adams served as master of ceremonies for the introductions.

Judge Sherrill pointed out that often we want "the law" to do something and that the people is "the law". "By our letters or by our insistence or by our ballots we cause the laws to be enacted, upheld, or rescinded. But in no instance do we have the right to break any of the laws and not be classified as a criminal".

Judge Sherrill pointed out in the discussion period that it was his opinion that much of the crime in the nation was due to recent Supreme Court decisions, misinterpretation by national news media, and oftentimes the withholding of the facts by national news media.

Mr. Mahon, in his prepared statement, gave statistics to indicate a rise in crime among younger violators of the nation, and figures to show a possible cause - the shift of population to the urban areas. He said that not only was there a cost of approximately \$25-billion to crime, but also a loss in the rot of society that was incalculable. He stated that in his opinion,
