We unpacked that barrel for the first time in January of 1946 after my discharge. It was interesting then, to see what all we had packed and to come out with some antiques.

Recall the old-type square-toothpicks? It would be interesting to know if anyone else has any!

And another interesting thing about that experience was the fact that I packed all of my civilian clothes carefully in mothballs - GIs then couldn't wear clothes - so that when I got out I would have some good clothes to put on.

And in spite of all the care-taking and planning, the only thing I could wear when I got out was the handkerchiefs. Mothballs during those times must have made the clothes stink! -- or something!

Besides reminding me of the important events in my life, it also reminded me of the fact that the best laid plans of mice and men do go awry.

Some wives we know will tell me for mentioning the fact - though my mentioning it does not change the fact in any way - but it's only about six weeks until deer season and men of the state are making plans for the big safaris into the Trans-Pecos area in search of fun, relaxation, and deer, and not necessarily in that order.

There are more and more of the ranchers in this area who are realizing the commercial value of the deer. They were once looked on as an oddity, a convenience for sport of the ranchmen and his friends, but now as a potential source of income due to the desirability of man to instinctively react to the hunt as an expression of manhood.

For a chance to get away from it all for a while - for a chance to be out with the boys - or some other ridiculous reason.

With most of us, however, I believe it's an opportunity to use the rifle that we have had these years and have little chance to use otherwise, or an opportunity to use the rifle that just bought to see if it is any better than the one we have been using.

The contest was sponsored by Dudley Motors, local Ford dealer, who with other Ford dealers are sponsoring the contests all over the nation.

In the 8-year-old group, Jody Callahan, Tom Whistler, and Jim Finley placed first, second, and third.

The top three places in the 9-year-old group were Randy Massey, Rocky McDonald, and Marvin Davis.

Paul Hinkle, Kendall Billings, and Ruben Calzada were the top three in the 10-year-old group.

Absentee Voting Began Wednesday

Absentee voting for the general election began Wednesday and will continue for 20 days, through Friday, November 1.

Ballots may be obtained at the county clerk's office.

In addition to the national, state, and county candidates on the Democratic end, and many candidates under the Republican heading, there will be two listed under the American Party heading, George Wallace and S. Marvin Griffin, a stand-in for Curtis LeMay, who was selected by Wallace as a running-mate too late to be on the ballot, and a write-in column.

Fourteen proposed constitutional amendments will also be on the ballot.

Sample ballots may be obtained at The Times and it is recommended that people be aware of the changes in the manner of voting this year and of the change in the style of the ballot.

Sample ballots are especially popular this year, since the form of the ballot in Texas has undergone some radical changes in style, and candidates, party workers, and persons interested in amendments are seeking to educate voters.

As in the primary elections earlier in the year, the ballot square is being used and must be marked to indicate a choice.

In past elections it was usual for many people to vote for candidates in one or more offices and ignore the amendments, and yet they often are of greater importance to the state, and have more influence on the lives of the individual voters, than does the outcome of a contest between people.

Voting on the amendments is especially important to people, because in so doing they have a chance to make a direct decision on matters of government, rather than leave them to elected representatives or administrative officials.

The Times, and many other newspapers, devotes considerable space each year to presenting a summary of the issues covered in the amendments.

Hard-Hitting Brackett Downs Eagles; District Competition Begins This Friday

A hard hitting and fast team of Brackettville gridsters was responsible for the defeat of the Sanderson Eagles Friday night in that city, according to the coaching staff of the Sanderson Eagles. They scored early and were up high, Coach Carroll Eggleston stated. He continued: "The coaches were all very proud of the boys and their at-

titude and effort displayed during the second half."

The Eagles had only five first downs in the first half and eleven during the second half; the hosts had 11 first downs during the first half and only eight in the second half and did not use their entire second unit at any time during the game, the coaches reported.

Sanderson missed two possible chances to score in the first half, either one of which, if successful, could have turned the tide of the game, Eggleston reported.

Sanderson's first scoring was in the third period when Jerry Greenleaf went around left end for three yards and the TD. The conversion of two extra points was on a pass from Bill Littleton to Manuel Olivas.

Early in the fourth period, Olivas went over center and to his left for 11 yards and another score from 40 yards out by Olivas in the same period, the extra point try after the first Olivas TD was no good and Greenleaf carried the ball over after the second score in the final frame.

The last play of the ball game was a 50-yard touchdown play which was a pass from Littleton to Leslie Hall.

The point-after try was no good.

Sanderson will go to Van Horn this week to begin district competition. The game will begin at 7:30 p. m., as will all of the games during the rest of the season.

Junior Grid Teams Split With McCamey

The Sanderson junior football teams split a double-header last Thursday afternoon with McCamey on the local field.

The 8th grade team won their contest 24-16 and the 7th graders lost their fray 18-0.

Coaches Norman Gladson and Lawrence Barber stated that the 8th grade offense was the best it had been all year and the defense was much improved. The 7th graders showed much improvement over previous games, they said, and were coming on well. They played a good game and worked hard, the coaches commented.

The 8th grade scores were as follows: Chago Flores threw a pass to Juan Saenz good for a 60-yard touchdown play and the same duo combination converted two extra points, first period.

In the second period, Kendrick Harrell ran a reverse play for 50 yards and a score and Flores ran over for the 2-extra points.

In the fourth period, Saenz, on an end-around play, went 65 yards to score and the conversion score was on a running play.

McCamey's scoring was in the second period on a reverse good for 55 yards and on a fake punt formation in the fourth period for 70 yards. Running plays accounted for the conversion of the extra points after the two scores.

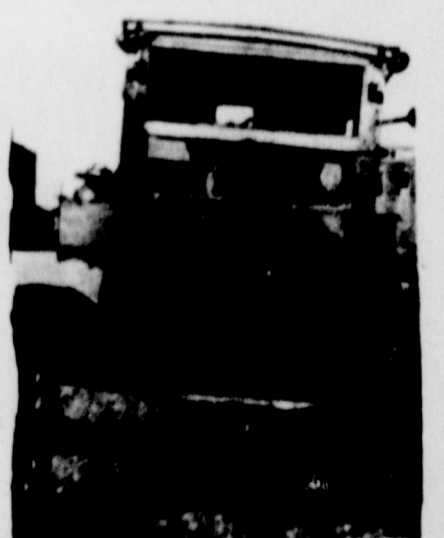
McCamey's scoring in the 7th grade game was two touchdowns in the first quarter and one in the second.

Postal Rate Increases Saturday

A rate increase averaging 10.5 per cent on catalog and parcel post mailing goes into effect Saturday.

The higher rates, approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July, "are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail, on a break-even basis."

Postmaster Ray Hodgkins said the postal department needs additional revenue to offset higher costs resulting from rate increases approved for postal employees last year. The increase is geared to bring revenue from parcel and catalog mail to within four per cent of operating costs.

Mr. Hodgkins said virtually all parcels in the class now sent for under \$1.10 will cost another 10 cents. He said the charge for most parcels now sent for between \$1.10 and \$4 will go up 5 cents, and parcels costing over \$4 to send will cost an extra 20 cents.

Rates are based on weights of packages and the distances they are to be sent.

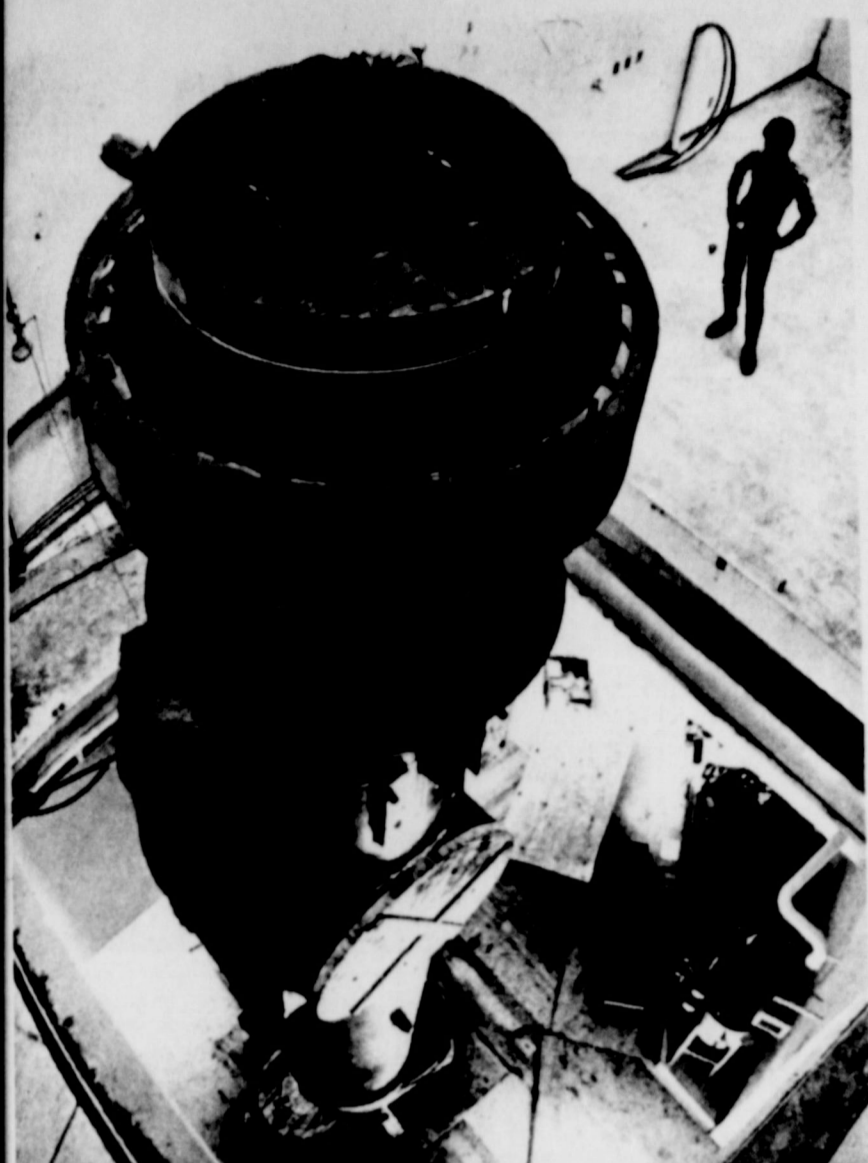

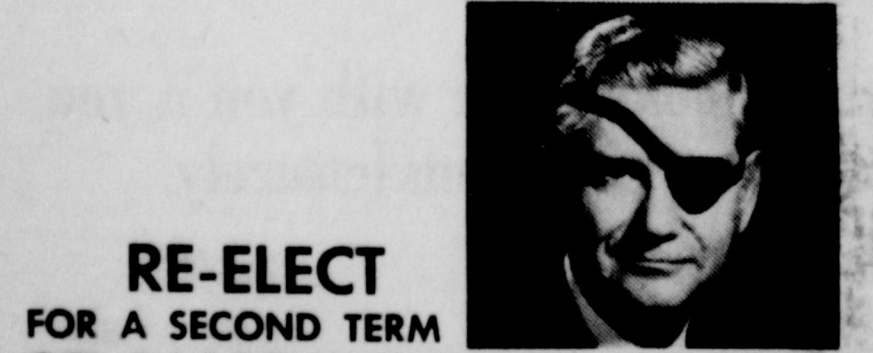

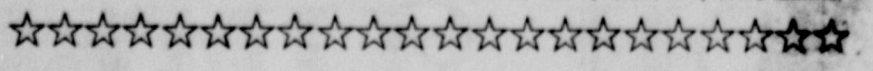
