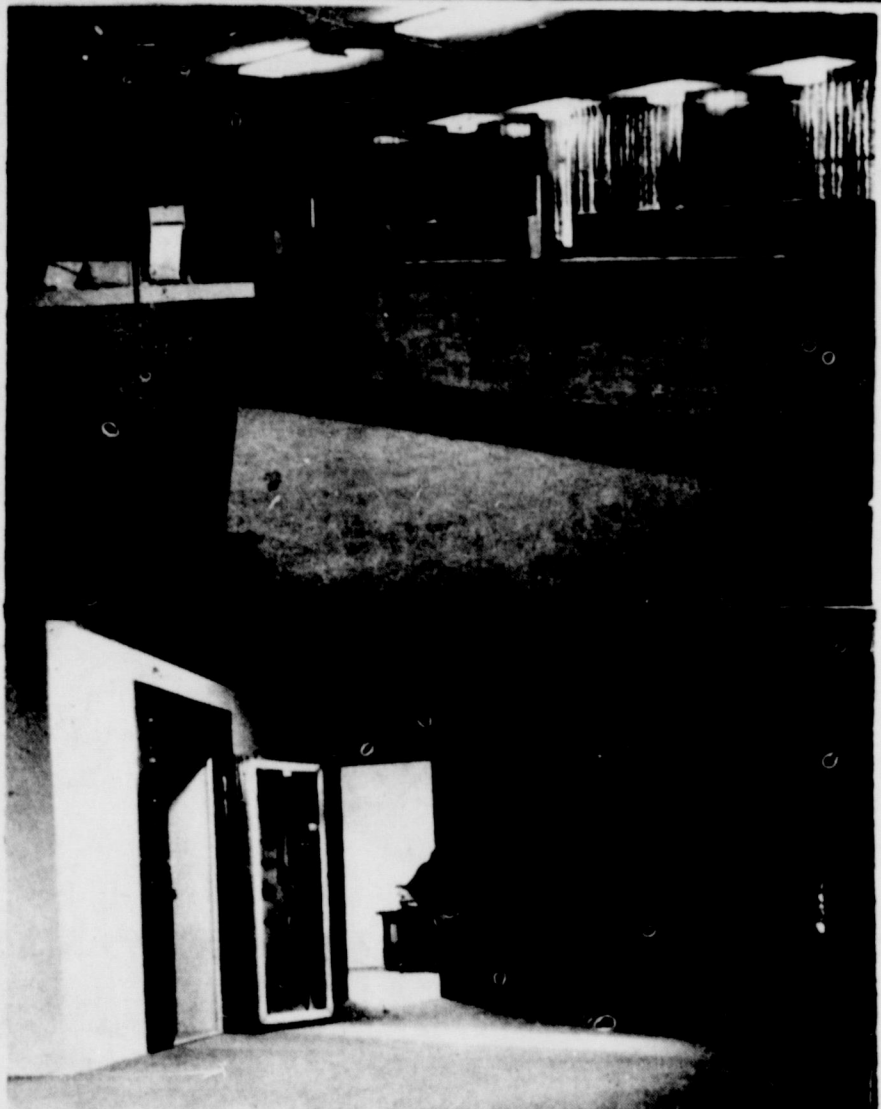

Sanderson's Christmas lights are now up on the streets and many of the homes and businesses have been decorated to lend a festive note to the appearance of the community.

 The paper next week, with Christmas greetings from anyone who wanted one, will be put in the postoffice on Tuesday morning. This way, everyone who reads the paper will have their greetings before Christmas and we and our printing in Alpine will be able to have a holiday.

The bank is having open house Monday, December 23, and everyone is extended an invitation to come and view the new banking quarters.

Bank Moves To New Quarters

The Sanderson State Bank began business Monday morning of this week in new quarters on the corner of Oak St. and School St., the site of the former Eagle Lumber Co.
 Extensive remodeling of the building was done prior to the move. An entrance vestibule opens into the lobby which contains the desk of the bank secretary, paying and receiving counter, vault entrance, and booths for safe deposit box users. On the west side of the lobby is the office of the executive vice-president, Jack M. Hayre, and the directors' room.
 On the right side of the vestibule is the night depository, and opening off the right in the lobby is a hospitality room, the bookkeeping systems work room, opening from which is a drive-in depository window which will be utilized later, and the entrance to the men's and ladies' rest rooms.
 Draperies line the window walls on the south and west sides of the building, carpeting covers all of the floors, and an attractive and sophisticated decor is noted in all of the furnishings.

J. D. Nichols, 81, Rancher, Merchant, Is Buried Monday

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock from the First Presbyterian Church in Sanderson for Joseph Dudley Nichols, 81, who died Saturday morning on his ranch south of Sanderson. He had some friends as hunting guests and was in the process of leaving the house when he fell near his pickup. He got up and the friends insisted that they bring him to town. When he got into the cab on the pickup he collapsed, apparently from heart failure.

Rev. John W. Byrd, a former pastor, now serving the Van Horn Presbyterian Church as pastor, conducted the funeral services which were under the direction of the Janes Funeral Home of Ozona.
 The officers of the church were named as pallbearers. Serving were R. S. Wilkinson, C. C. Mitchell, A. H. Zuberbuehler, Jolly Harkins, Charles Stegall, and W. C. Downie.

Mr. Nichols was born Jan. 6, 1887, in Lenoir City, Tenn. He was married to Elizabeth Parker May 24, 1913, in Chattanooga, Tenn. He moved to Texas in 1913 and settled in Dryden where he bought a ranch and operated a general store until 1923. He moved to Sanderson that year and remained in the general merchandise business here until 1945.
 He was active in the Rotary Club here and served several terms as president and secretary. He was an elder of the Presbyterian Church 40 years. He was a member of the Terrell

Amused as we may be at such superstitions, many are still current because, since every version has a 50-50 chance of coming true, they help satisfy a woman's ancient and deep-rooted urge to know everything possible about her unborn child.

Today, it is actually possible to learn much more about future children than the relatively unimportant fact of sex, thanks to a new and increasingly helpful specialty called genetic counseling.

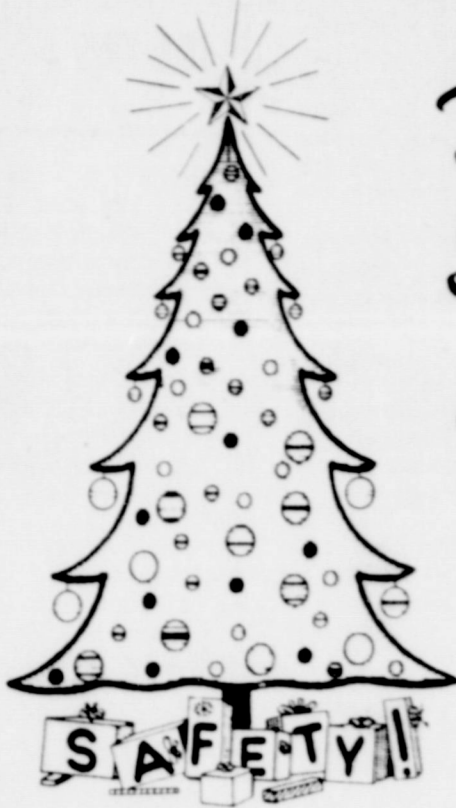

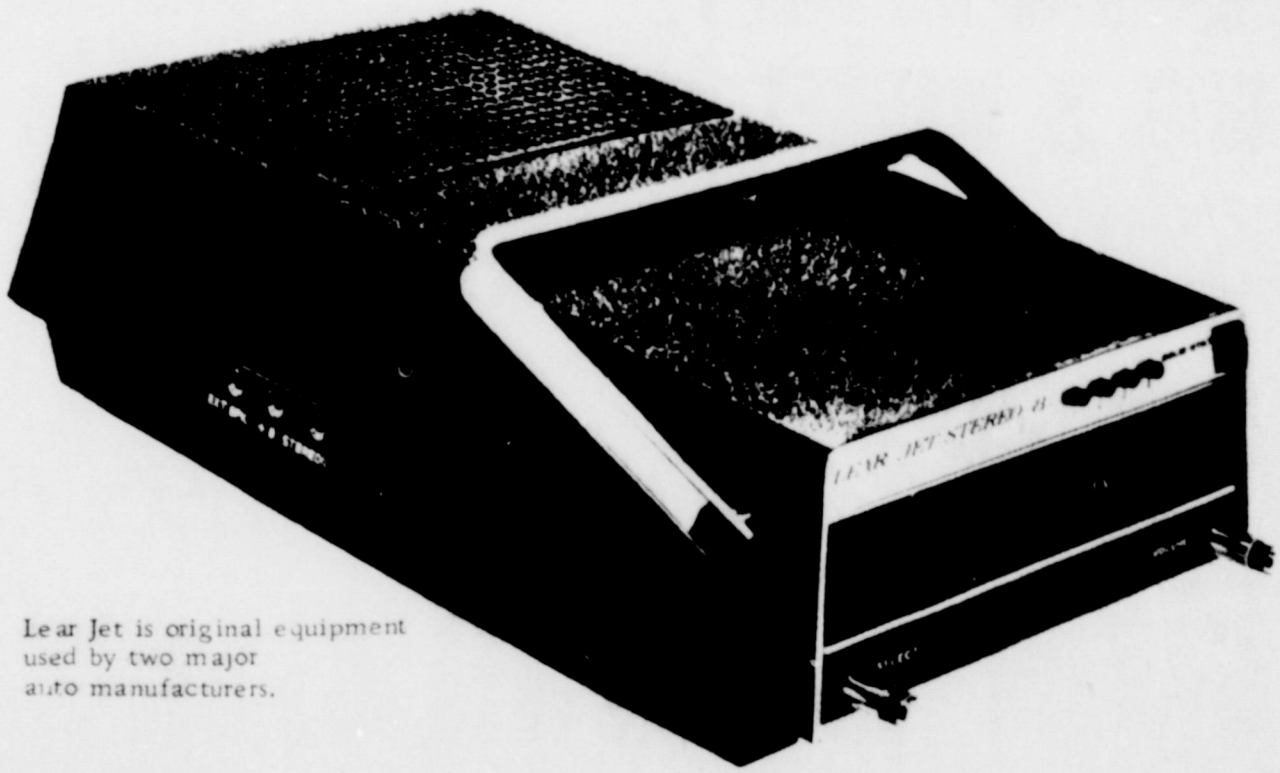
