LISTEN TO LUKE

There have been a lot of rumors this week about law enforcement ruining business here, etc., and we have only this to say:

No firm, organization, group, or individual, has the right to say what laws will not be enforced, no more than a law enforcement officer has the right to say which laws he will enforce.

When the citizen dictates the laws he will obey without punishment, he is no more or less wrong than the officer who refuses to enforce all of the laws.

Let us be thankful that we have law enforcement and encourage it all we can.

We have been reading and hearing so much recently on education and its importance, but there have been few who would take the time to write anything about the reason education can be important. We think that there should be quite a bit written about that, too, and the motivation should be stressed by those who are pushing so hard for education.

Education for education's sake only - in our humble opinion - is ridiculously foolish. If, for example, every person now under the age of 21 were afforded the opportunity of a degree - and they took advantage of the opportunity, this could not raise the living standard of future generations in the economic field. There would still be cooks and bakers, shearers and ditch-diggers, prune-pickers and grocery clerks, and all of the other labor, service, and technical jobs that must be filled, even if by BAs or MSs or by whatever other title.

There has been too much emphasis put on the earning power of an "educated" person rather than what an education, either by experience or academics, can do to enrich a person's life even if his earning power is not increased.

But this follows the trend of so many other things, a person is too often judged by his buying or earning power, or his accumulation of material possessions by any method.

Some of our values are sorely misplaced!

There has been two occasions in cities over this area in recent weeks of families suffocating in their homes from improperly burning heaters, or improper ventilation in their homes while they have heaters burning.

In cities steps are being taken to educate the people on the proper type of stoves, ventilation, etc., to try and prevent such tragedies in the future. It has been a long time since we have had such a tragedy here and, if we can do anything to prevent it, it should be a long time before it ever happens again!

Proper ventilation seems to be the best prevention against asphyxiation. Some poor-burning heaters may give off some foul-smelling fumes, but asphyxiation comes from the air

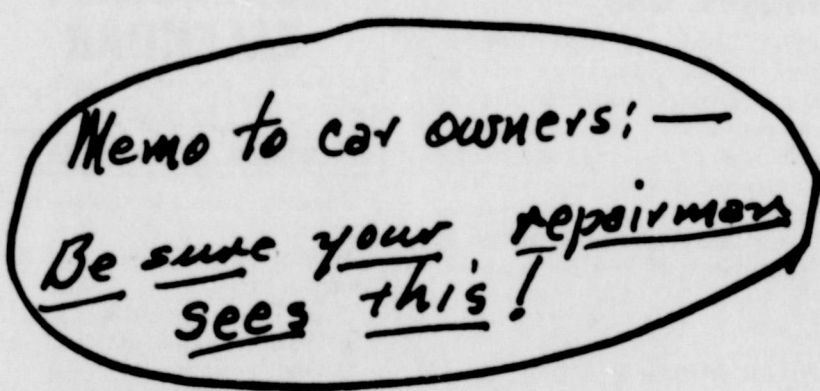
He is survived by his father, two sisters, two daughters, and a grandson.

The Bolinger family will remain in Sanderson until the end of the current school term.

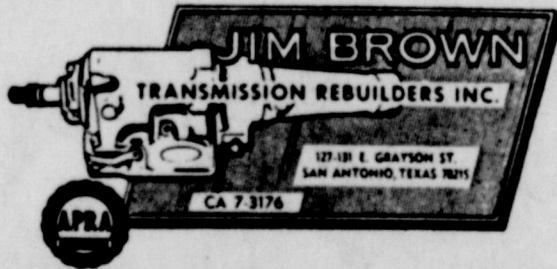
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1-ACT PLAY CHOSEN

being replaced by other gases and one of the worst, according to what we can find out is carbon monoxide, usually due to too hot a flame in too tight a room, and unvented space heaters usually are the culprits for this condition, according to our information.

Now this is not a slam against all space heaters, and we are not condemning any of them.

We are trying to point out the fact that every effort should be made to see that heaters are as safe as they can be under the existing conditions, and the conditions improved when and if possible and ventilation of rooms where space heaters are used is the recommended procedure, according to many informative sources.

Space heaters are those that are moveable and do not have any means of ventilation of fumes or gases.

If you know of cases where this type of heat is used, an effort to be sure that there is adequate ventilation of some sort in the house to prevent asphyxiation would be a good deed.

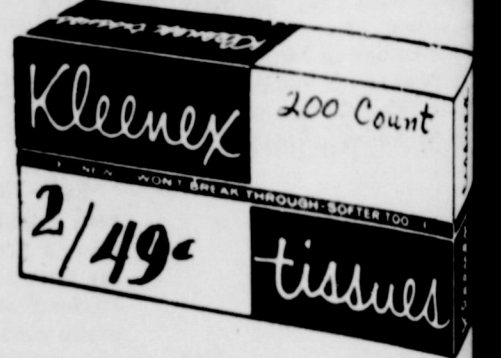
