We wonder, as the days go by, what will be the ultimate final straw that breaks our collective backs in this nation... We will not deny the right of the individual to hate, but we will say that the hater is the loser of the battle.

We would not deny the right of a citizen to not like his station in life, but he does not have the right to loot and destroy those things which belong to another in vengeance.

We would not deny the right of the individual to fill his mind and thoughts with all of the vulgarity and lewdness he is able to conjure, but we feel it a privilege to go to some place and feel certain that we will not be exposed to it.

Marching or protesting is a good way to get attention, but beyond that, outside the law, is a sorry way to try to get by. What we are trying to say is that we have had it up to our ears, reading about lawlessness, hearing about threats of burning, killing, looting, and all the violence and hatred and disrespect for law and order that goes along with it.

"Love" and "freedom" have lost their meaning completely if there is no obligation and responsibility along with them.

Have we created an uncontrollable Frankensteinian monster in our society because of a fear of upholding the law - the very thing that can give us protection? Have all of our leaders become blind to the fact that there are still some laws that can be enforced or is the fear of the law they are trying to enforce the deterrent of the officials of our land?

A large number of defendants were released just last week due to the error on the part of the arresting officers who took certain tests of the condition of the defendants to use against them in court; and the tests were made following their arrest and without them having first had benefit of counsel.

It has been ruled that there is no pornography or lewdness in nakedness, that those conceptions exist in the minds of people, and not in fact. We who believe that public nakedness is wrong have nasty old minds.

Each of these decisions - whether to justify public nakedness, rioting, looting, or driving without a license - is made by some person or persons, and as long as we tolerate it, the condition will continue.

There is a wrong way, however to oppose even this! And here is a right way!

Rattlesnake Bites B. G. Hills' Daughter

Miss Cindy Hill, 14-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B.G. Hill, is in Uvalde Memorial Hospital after being bitten by a rattlesnake Saturday night. The Hills, who have recently moved into a new home four miles below town on the Batesville Road, were being honored with a surprise housewarming, and a number of friends were at their house when the incident occurred.

As Cindy and a friend, Kirk Chapman, started to get into a car in front of the house, they both stepped on the snake. It struck Cindy on the heel, but got away before they could kill it.

An ice pack was immediately applied to the area of the fang marks and the girl was rushed to the hospital.

In a telephone conversation with her mother Tuesday, we were glad to hear that Cindy is resting comfortably. Mrs. Hill said the doctor told them that the ice application was the most effective first aid they could have used, and that she would just

like to pass that information on, since there might be people who had not thought of using ice in case of snake bite.

The following day a rattler was killed a few yards from the Hill's house, but they do not know if it is the snake that struck Cindy or not.

Mr. Hill was reared on the West-Pyle Cattle Co. ranch and attended the Sanderson Schools before graduating from Texas A&M. Mrs. Hill is a niece of Mrs. Herman Couch.

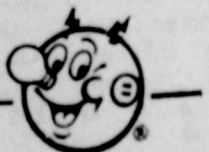

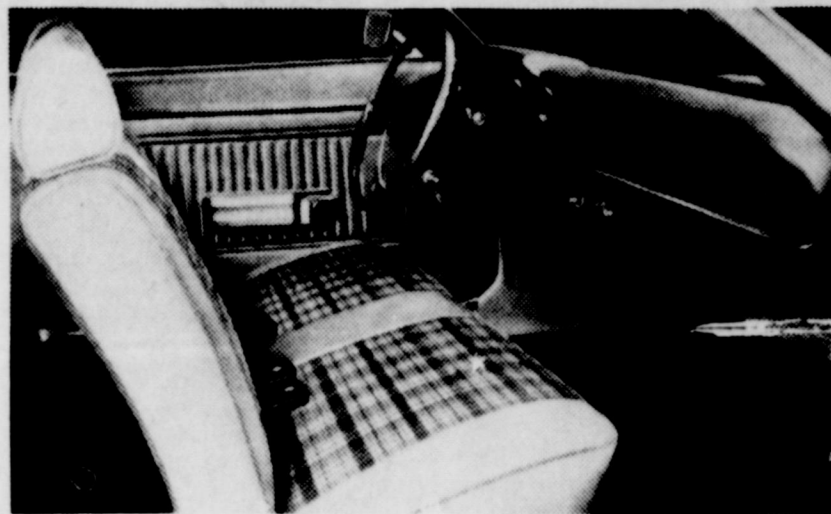

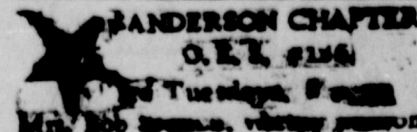

New Helicopters To Aid Tex. Emergency Missions

AUSTIN - A new dimension in versatility for the Department of Public Safety will soon begin with the launching of five new helicopters which will join two others already in operation and be available over the state for any type of emergency mission that might arise.

Col. Pat Speir, DPS director, said that three of the new craft have been delivered and two others are expected to arrive in April. The federal government, as a result of its interest in law enforcement, has approved sharing with the state the cost of purchasing and operating them.

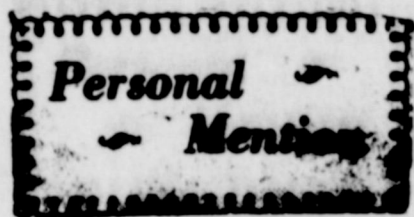
The DPS helicopters will include three jet-powered five-passenger "Jet Ranger" helicopters which can be altered in minutes to accommodate two stretcher patients. The three larger craft will be stationed initially in the Dallas, Lubbock and Austin areas.

The DPS director said the usefulness and versatility of helicopters have been demonstrated numerous times since the DPS has had the original two aircraft. He cited these examples:

-In March of last year, the craft was used for surveillance of a remote area near Abilene where narcotics suspects were known to be in a car. The vehicle was spotted on a dirt road. Under observation of officers in the helicopter, two people got out of the car and walked into a field. The officers alerted ground units when they observed the men burying something in the ground. They landed and found a plastic bag containing one and one-half pounds of marijuana. The officers on the ground apprehended the suspects.

-In September, 1968, DPS

Narcotics Agents and U.S. Customs Agents at Van Horn called for the helicopter to assist in a narcotics investigation. A cache of about 200 pounds of marijuana had been found in an abandoned building at the nearby airport. The agents called the copter crew on the radio and advised that it had been loaded into a car and gave its description. They believed the car was to make contact with another vehicle to transfer the load. This did not happen and it was decided to go ahead and stop the car. The agents in their car began to give chase, the helicopter overhead. The chase lasted for 53 miles, running up to speeds of 120 miles per hour. The copter crew radioed for a Highway Patrol road block, gave the escape car's description, and when it was stopped by the road block, landed and assisted in the apprehension.
