\$26,591 Given To Local Schools For Low-Income Aid

Public schools of the 16th District will receive \$1, 601.995 in the fiscal year 1970 under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Con-gressman Richard C. White has announced.

Allotments under Title I are made to those school districts having special programs to assist low-income pupils. 





Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the bal-"AGAINST" the proposition:

To be eligible to show they must fall within a live weight range of 75 to 105 pounds. The lambs must have a high dressing percentage and one that will grade high in carcass. He must yield a high percentage of leg and loin which is highly palatable, and must reach market weight quickly with a minimum amount of feed.

The main objective of the annual "Lamb With a Future" Show is to assist producers in locating and intensifying bloodlines within the various breeds of sheep that will produce the lamb with a future.


