By the same token, it may be hat the Choctaws will file suit or Terrell County and we won't ave to worry about the kinship i the tribes. Or maybe the Tiuas ran the Choctaws out of his area in the first place and really belongs to "us".



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

Market was strong here Wednesday on light, long-staple 12 months wool at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. sealed-bid wool sale.

Of the 320,000 pounds of both eight and 12 months wool offered, all lots were sold and none was left pending.

Prices on 12 months wool were from 52-701/4 cents per pound, grease basis, with one lot of 5,400 pounds selling at 50-511/2

Several lots of 12 months wool amounting to about 76,000 pounds sold between 641/4-701/4 cents per pound. Several lots comprising 53,000 pounds brought 60-63 3-4 cents per pound, and 52,000 pounds sold from 52-591/4 cents per pound.

A total of 42,000 pounds of eight months wool sold for 581/2-621/4 cents per pound, with 70,000 pounds selling at prices between 501%-58 cents per pound. One lot of about 2,700 pounds sold under 50 cents per pound.

Top buyer at the sale was Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co. of Boston which bought about 87,800 pounds; Wellman & Co., Boston which bought about Lefebvre and Co. of Boston, 43,000; Blanks Oglesby of Del Rio, 31,719; Burlington Industries of Clarksville, Va., 41,700; and Russell Wool Co. of Boston, 31,500.

Johnny Williams, manager of Sanderson Wool Commission Co., said prices were good over most of the offerings and both he and the producers were satisfied with prices paid. He said some of the wool buyers told him the wools offered at his sale Wednesday were "some of the best 12 months wools they had seen this year."



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
