Preliminary Draft Completed For Work On Sanderson Flood Control Project

Darwin Schrader, local work unit conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service working in the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District, this week received the preliminary draft of the work plan for the completion of the flood control and water conservation on the Sanderson Canyon Watershed. He stated that all sponsors - the commissioners courts of Terrell, Brewster, and Pecos Counties, Soil Conservation Districts of those counties, and all persons or organizations working in any way with the project had received a copy of the preliminary work plan.

A meeting has been called for July 14 in Sanderson for all sponsors or their representatives, and any interested parties to meet at the court house in Sanderson to go over any or all of the preliminary work plan for some clarification on whatever questions there are at that time, and another meeting will be called at a later date to finalize and approve a work plan acceptable to all parties and sponsors concerned so that work can begin as soon as congressional approval is given the work plan and appropriations made.

The preliminary work plan is the efforts of many people both in and out of the Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service, who have made an intensive survey, geological, hydraulic, financial, economical, and in other fields in an effort to properly evaluate the need for the flood control project and the most feasible way to accomplish the purpose. The man-hours that have been spent in the preparation of the workplan are incalculable, but many thousands of man-hours were spent in its preparation.

64-Bed Nursing Home Planned By Group Of Stockton Doctors

Fort Stockton will soon be the home of a new locallyowned, 64-bed nursing home, now being planned by a group of four Fort Stockton physicians.

A block of land within the city limits of Fort Stockton has been acquired for the nursing home site and architectural planning is moving ahead stead-

1ly for the \$225,000 project. A spokesman for Comanche Springs Enterprises, Inc., confirmed Friday that negotiations for land and financing are near-

ing completion and that building plans are now under study by stockholders of the organiza-

Officers of the corporation are Dr. George Hoffman, president: Dr. J. Dayle Lancaster, vice-president; Dr. John C. Hundley, secretary; and Dr. Charles Jones, treasurer. All four stockholders are wellknown general practitioners in Fort Stockton.

Although a building site has been secured for the home, backers of the project have not yet released the exact location. The home will definitely be located on a site convenient to the downtown shopping area, local doctor offices, and Memortal Hospital.

The 64-bed complex will offer complete nursing home factlities to the usual three classes of patients - ambulatory, semibed and skilled-care patients.

Ambulatory patients are those strong enough to walk and do most day-to-day chores for themselves; semi-bed patients are those who are partially ambulatory but who would require some professional attention; and skilled-care patients are thos who are bed-ridden and require full staff attention.

The local backers are currently in search of a professional nursing home administrator, who would handle all operational duties and supervise the staff.

An artist's conception of the new home indicates that the structure will feature Spanish architectural design, with exterior of white brick and a red crushed-brick roof.


