World's 2nd
Deep Hole
Runs Casing

Forest Oil Corp., Midland, was preparing to run casing, size and seat unreported, at the No. 1 Corrine R. Judkins, in 66-1-CCSD&RGNG, Terrell County wildcat and the world's second deepest hole, 22 miles northeast of Sanderson.

Drilled to 24,637 feet, it fished for a bit cone at that depth for over a month.

It reportedly has encountered shows of possible gas production in the Devonian and found interesting gas shows in a 31-foot Ellenburger, topped at 23,520 feet, on derrick floor elevation of 2,611 feet.

Other sample tops are Devonian, 21,420 feet; and Simpson, 21,550 feet.

It was spudded in August 1967 as a 21,000-foot wildcat and in January was rescheduled to 24,000 feet and in April to 25,000 feet.

The world's deepest hole is Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1-EE University, Pecos County 25,340-foot failure, abandoned in 1959.

Previously the second deepest hole was Glover, Hefner, Kennedy Oil Co., et al, No. 1 Green, an Oklahoma gas producer, producing at 21,615-655 feet, which was drilled to 24,453 feet. It is the world's third deepest producer.

Deepest producer is Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1-DD Gas Unit, in the Gomez (Ellenburger gas) field of Pecos County, producing at 21,476-22,752 feet; and the second deepest, Gulf No. 1 Dalco-USM, in the same field, producing at 21,356-22,698 feet.

Industrial Values
Upped 12 Per Cent
For Tax Purposes

At the meeting of the county school district board of equalization last week, the oil companies', utility companies', and industries' tax representatives agreed to an increase of 12% in valuations. The agreement was that the school board of trustees reduce the proposed budget for the coming school year to a level more realistic with the proposed income this year and in future years.

The oil company and related industries' tax representatives have held for several years that there was a possibility of a decrease in valuations and that they would not continue to underwrite the financing of the school's budget and that in case of a serious decrease in the oil valuations in the county, the other taxpayers would have a tremendous tax burden to take up the slack of any decreases in valuations of oil properties.

The valuations of all properties on the tax rolls other than those mentioned above will be reviewed by the board of equalization at another meeting to be held soon.

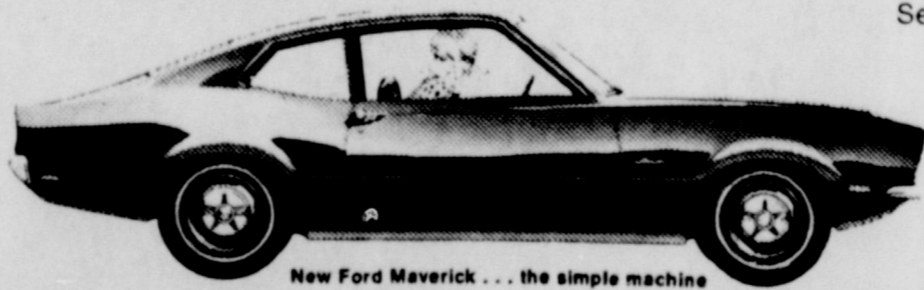

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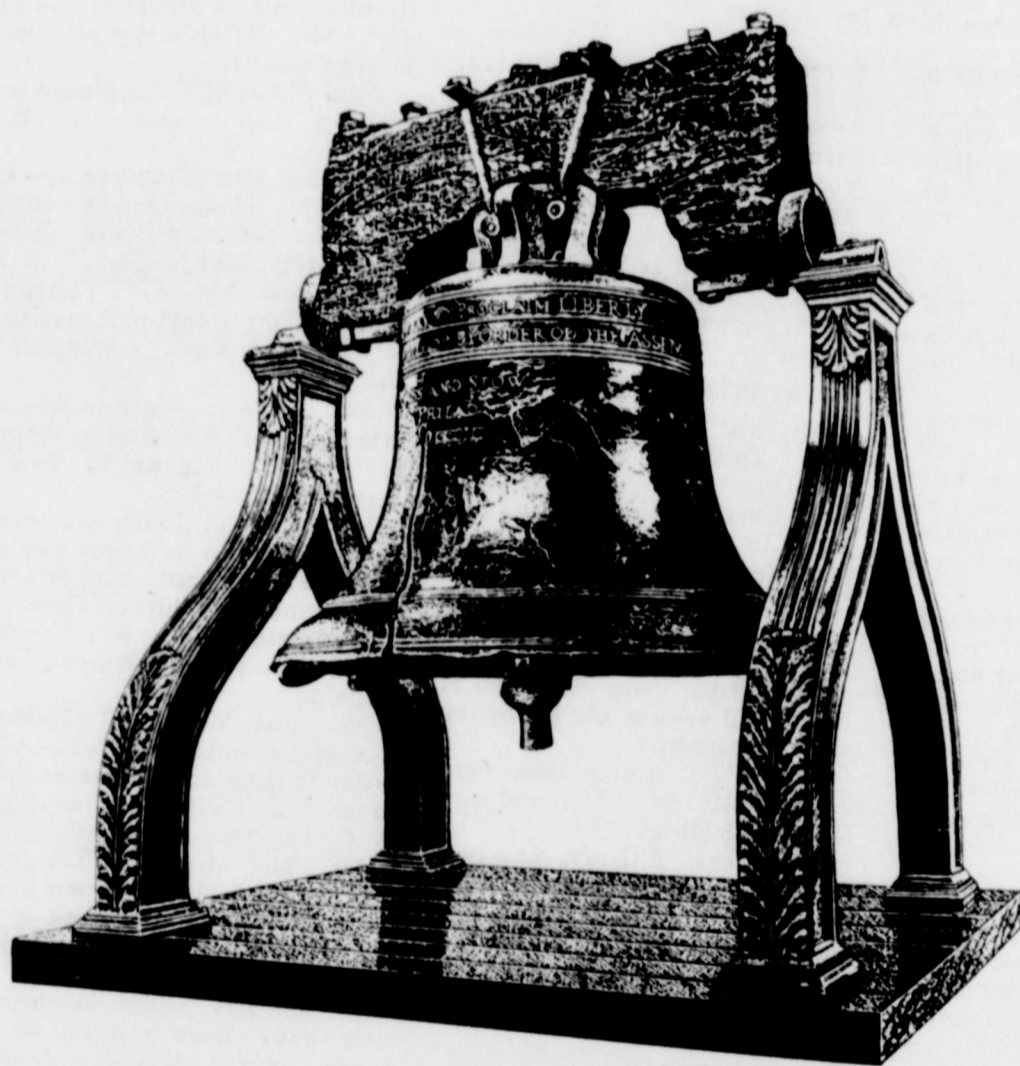
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
