"An ordinance regulating the subdivision of land in the city of Friona, Texas, and within one-half (1/2) mile of its corporate limits: requiring and regulating the preparation and presentation of preliminary and final plats for such purpose: establishing minimum subdivision design standards: establishing final plat approval requirements: providing minimum improvements required prior to acceptance of final plat: establishing variances and prescribing penalties for the violation of its provisions.

City officials began to think about a second water tower a little over a year ago, when on June 29, 1962, an electrical outage for 45 minutes caused the city's water supply to become depleted, since all the city's wells operate by elec-

Since that time, another precaution has been taken with the installation of an auxiliary diesel engine at the well at the west water plant, which is capable of pumping 750 gallons per minute in case it is ever needed.

Preliminary steps were taken toward the construction of the new tower on October 8, 1962, when the city engineer met with the city council and provided estimates on cost, as well as advisements on size and loca-

On November 5, plans and specifications for the tower were presented to the council by the engineer, and the council voted to solicit bids for the

The bids were opened on December 10, and the contract was awarded at the council meeting that night, to Chicago Bridge and Iron Company, Tulsa, which had built the city's first water tower, as well as the ground storage tank at Sixth

On January 3, foundation specifications were given by the engineer, and the contract for the foundation was awarded on January 25 to W. B. Abbott of

The work on the tower's foundation began on February 18, with the footings being poured on February 20. A month later, on March 20, the construction crew from Chicago Bridge and Iron Company erected the stand pipe, and construction began in

Another month, on April 20, found the construction of the tower complete, with the construction crew leaving Friona. Preliminary electro-rust proofing equipment was installed on May 6.

The painters began the task of painting the new tower on May 8, and on May 27 the job was finished and the inside was sterilized.

The tower was filled for the first time on May 28. Soft ground caused by excessive rains resulted in a connecting main bursting after the initial filling, but on June 12 the mains were repaired and the tower was put into service for the first time -less than a year after its need was fully realized.



### It's Time To Become Safety Conscious On The Farm

It really isn't news to those who live and work in rural areas that farming can be a hazardous occupation. Farm accidents are a constant threat, not only to life and limb, but also to livelihood. The injured farmer can't work, and the crops and farm animals won't wait for him to recover.

Earlier this year the American Medical Association sponsored the First National Congress on Farm Safety. Hundreds of leaders in farm health and safety programs from scores of private organizations and government agencies spent several days studying the farm safety problem and seeking ways and means of helping the farmer to stave off accidents.

Next in the farm safety campaign comes National Farm Safety Week, proclaimed by the president, governor and county judge for the week of July 21-27. Once again rural leaders will strive to help farmers learn how to avoid accidents.

Inspection, Correction and Protection are the three keynote themes of National Farm Safety Week. Farmers are urged to inspect equipment, land, buildings, and their own work habits and attitudes. They are urged to correct dangerous conditions and careless habits. By so doing, farmers can protect lives, their own and others.

Farm resident accidents cause 9,000 deaths and 800,000 disabling injuries every year. These statistics are appalling, because most of these deaths and injuries could have been prevented. And the statistics do not convey the grief, loneliness and pain involved in accidents.

Accidents don't just happen, they are caused. More than 90 per cent of all accidents involve some human failure -- improper attitudes, carelessness, lack of attention to rules and regula-

American physicians, particularly those who practice in rural areas, are well aware of the serious problem of farm accidents. Thus physicians, through their professional association, the AMA. have long been in the forefront of farm safety programs.

Farmer -- once again your physician urges you to Inspect. Correct and Protect. It might save your life, or the life of one of

### Be Careful When Viewing Eclipse, Eye Specialists Warn

On April 8, 1959, 170 Australians -- principally school children -- suffered permanent retinal damage and partial loss of central vision in watching an eclipse of the sun.

Similar eye damage may be anticipated over most of North America on July 20, the date of our next solar eclipse, total from Alaska to Maine. A partial eclipse will be visible over most of the

There is real risk of eye damage in viewing an eclipse according to the members of the South Plains Optometric Society. Makeshift methods include dark photographic negatives, glass that has been smoked over a candle, or a card with a pinhole opening. None of these devices is completely safe, Looking directly into the sun, even for a few seconds, involves the possibility of permanent retinal damage, Unfortunately, sun glasses are no answer to the problem

A piece of photo film, overexposed on its entire surface and developed, provides adequate protection,

A safe alternative is a pinhole camera. Punch a clean hole in one end of a shoe box with a pin or needle. In a darkened room, air the pinhole directly at the sun. On the inside surface of the other end of the box, you can see a clearly defined solar image, In a completely darkened room, a larger image can be viewed at a greater distance. A pinhole works like a lens of universal focus but the greater the distance, the less the illumination. The

size of the disc will be 1/100th of the projection distance. A solar eclipse has a deservedly popular appeal, It should be an opportunity for us to extend our knowledge of the universe, but not an occasion for damaging our precious vision,



About 75 acres of the approximately 400 acres near Friona had been harvested as of the first of the week, The potatoes were making about 200 sacks per acre, according to Kenneth Neill, manager of Friona Growers and Shippers.

At Lariat, the yield is about the same. "We're making from 175 to 200 sacks of number one potatoes to the acre", said T. W. (Buck) Gregory, who has about 325 acres of potatoes this

Gregory described the market as "not strong, but we're moving some potatoes."

The market is running from around \$2.35 per hundred to

"This is lower than you'd like to see the market at the start of harvest. But some shipments from this area earlier contained some junky potatoes, and this may have hurt the market some," Neill said. He added that such potatoes had not shown up in the Friona area as yet.

Harvest operations began near Friona on July 5. Gregory Produce began operations on July 10. "We're still not going full speed. We like to let the potatoes mature completely before starting," Gregory said.

The Lariat producer said he had about 100 additional acres of fall potatoes which would mature some time in October. The vegetable income in Par-

mer County amounted to close to a million dollars. "We're going to have to make something off the potatoes, having lost our cotton to hail,"

> The county agent explained that it was his theory that the damage being experienced by early maize was caused by cold temperatures during the rains during June, which were followed by hot weather, throwing the young plants into "temporary distress.'

It is a plant's natural tendency to bear fruit when in distress, Coker explained, and this might explain the early heads having a damaged ap-

"Now, there have been definite cases of midge reported to the south of us, but I think it's too early for the midge in our county," Coker said.

"I think most of the early damage is a physiological damage of some kind, due to the weather and planting season," Coker re-iterated.




