It is the governing body that leads us into a dilemma and makes every kind of excuse to put taxes here and there over upon their spending misdeeds and then alibi and conceal to try to hide other misdeeds of a taxing bill.

Gov. Ben Barnes told the television audiences that they had to protect the people so he taxed the businesses - in fact.

This is fine salve for the voter who is tired of taxes and is unable to presume that every increase to the business tax is passed on to the consumer.

We were able to voice our sentiments exactly to our own representative when we told him we were in favor of eliminating all exemptions to the state sales tax and leaving the rate where it was at 3%, instead of 3 1/4%. What a ridiculous figure!

Taxes Upped By School Board In Values Change

What amounts to an 8% increase in the amount of taxes to be paid by property owners in the Terrell County Independent School District is the result of action of the board of trustees of that governmental agency recently, according to A. H. Zuberbueler, tax collector-assessor for the school district.

Valuations of all properties in the county were raised 12% for assessment and collection of taxes for 1969, but the tax rate was lowered to \$1.85 per \$100 valuation.

The rate for 1968 taxes was \$1.92 per \$100 valuation on the valuations before the increase.

Of the \$1.85 now collected for each \$100 valuation, \$1.50 goes for local maintenance and 35¢ for the interest and sinking fund. Prior to the valuation increase and the adjustment of the

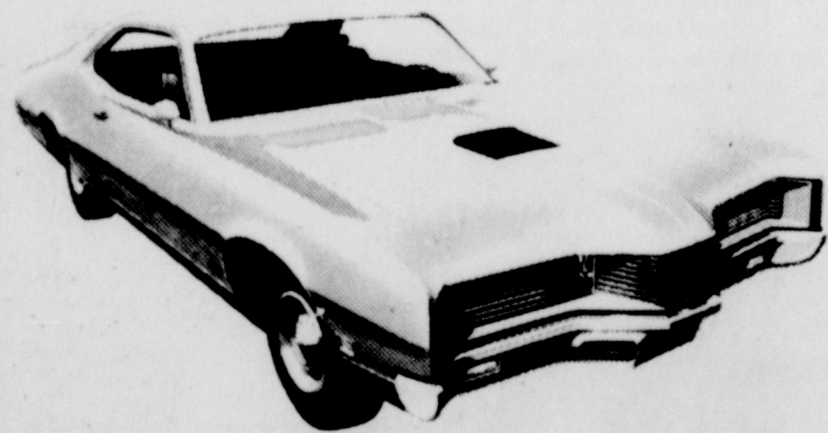

"Man With Mission" Has Real Meaning For Napier

A man, his job and the territory he serves brought Southern Bell's employee magazine, Scene, to Big Bend country in a major article in its July-August issue.

The Scene article describes the work of Bob Napier, telephone installer - repairman, based in Alpine, Napier serves an area reaching from the peaks of the Rio Grande into the mountains of Big Bend National Park.

Logging 4,000 miles a month in his specially-equipped in-

stallers truck, Napier also covers 28 miles of open wire by horseback. Scene gives its more than 75,000 readers in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas and Missouri a vivid account, in words and color photography, of Napier's horseback patrol through some of Big Bend's most rugged terrain.

The article presents both the legend and the reality of this country. Civilization has come slowly. Modern conveniences (the telephone, electricity, paved roads) found in parts of the

park are made possible only by the hard work of men like Napier.

The magazine describes Napier as a "man with a mission." The phrase with a double meaning refers not only to the dedication with which he works, but also to an actual mission - the only church in the primitive Mexican village of Pilares, 125 miles west of Alpine. The Pilares mission is part of an expanding "river ministry" which Texas Baptists are conducting in Mexican border towns along the Rio Grande.

Unpaid volunteers like Napier and his wife participate in this ministry, rewarded only by the satisfaction of end results.

The article quotes Napier's philosophy: "I think a fellow

needs to make everything mean something - it may be old-fashioned for a man to help his neighbors, but this is an old-fashioned country."

Napier was the telephone maintenance man in Sanderson several months ago.

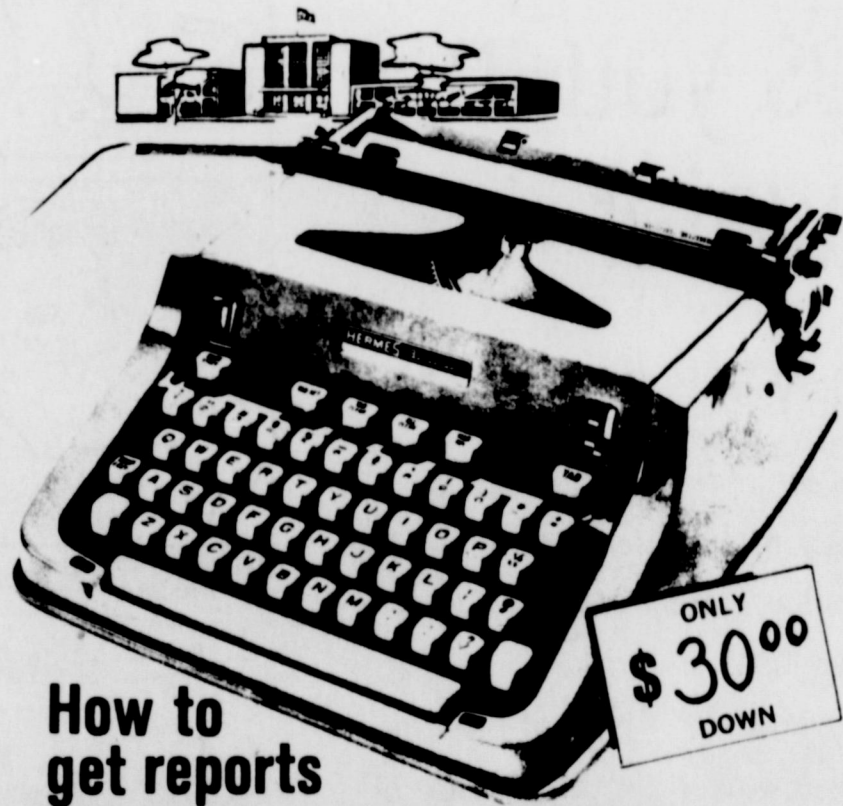

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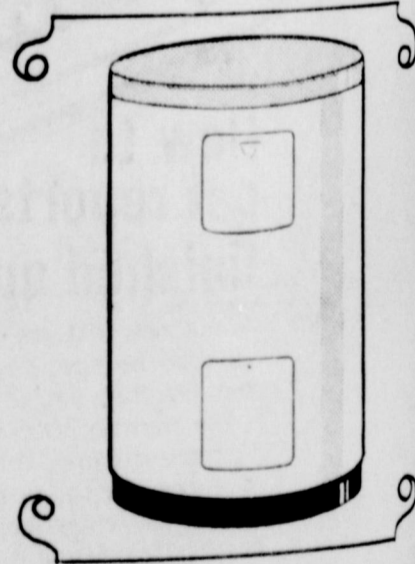

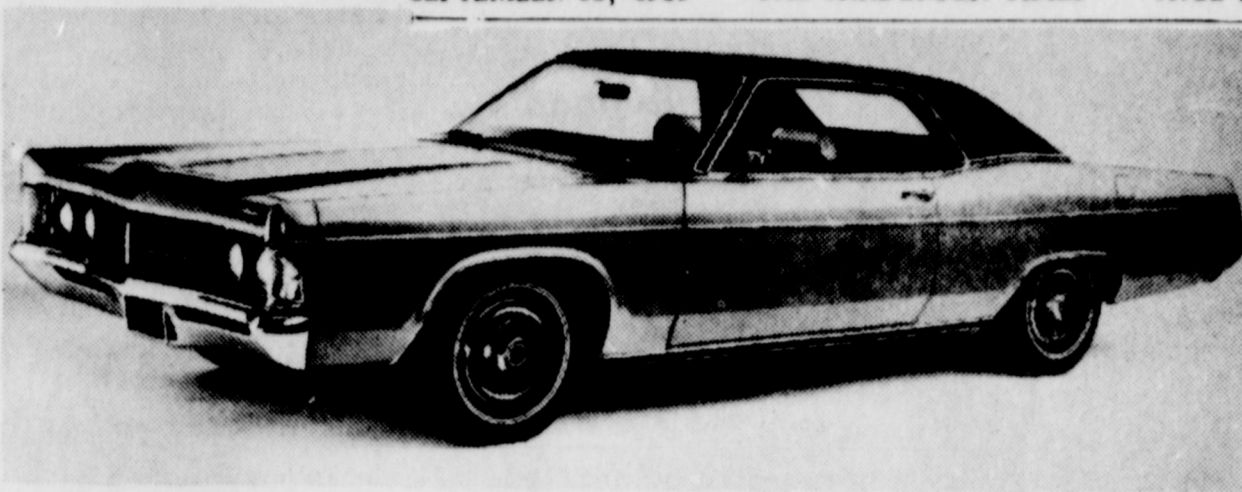
Sparan, L.H. Gilbreath, and H.E. Ezelle to serve as alternates.

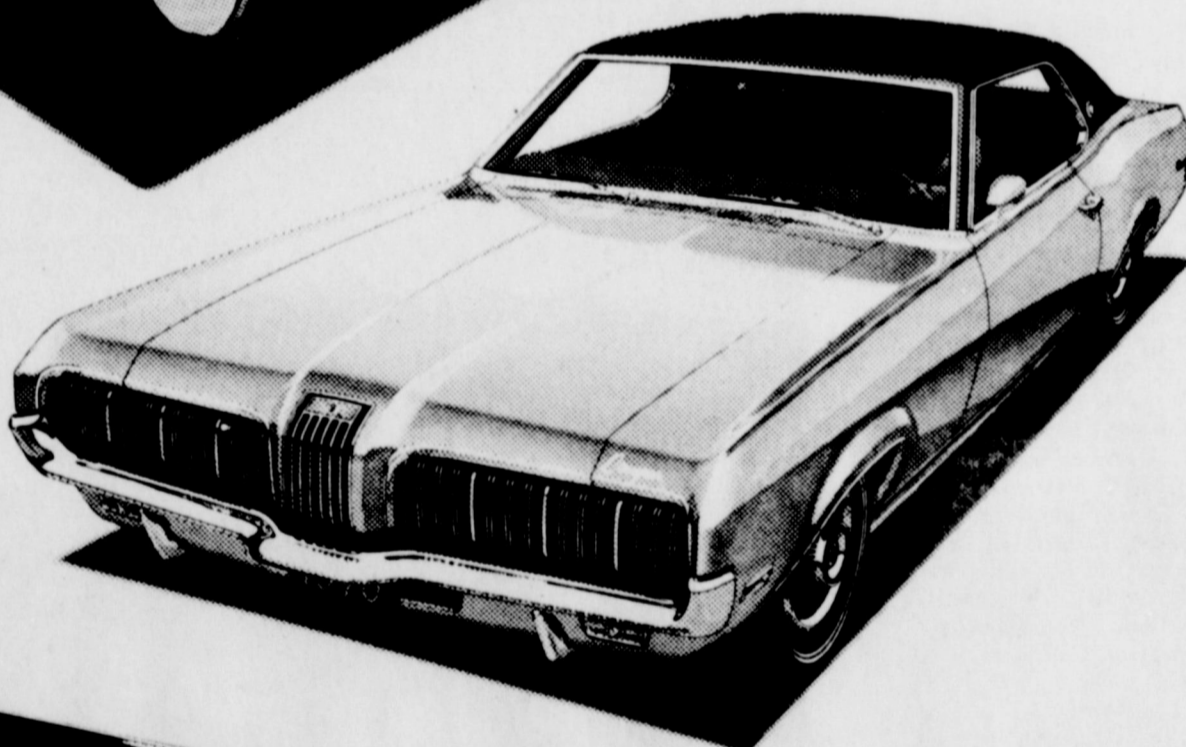

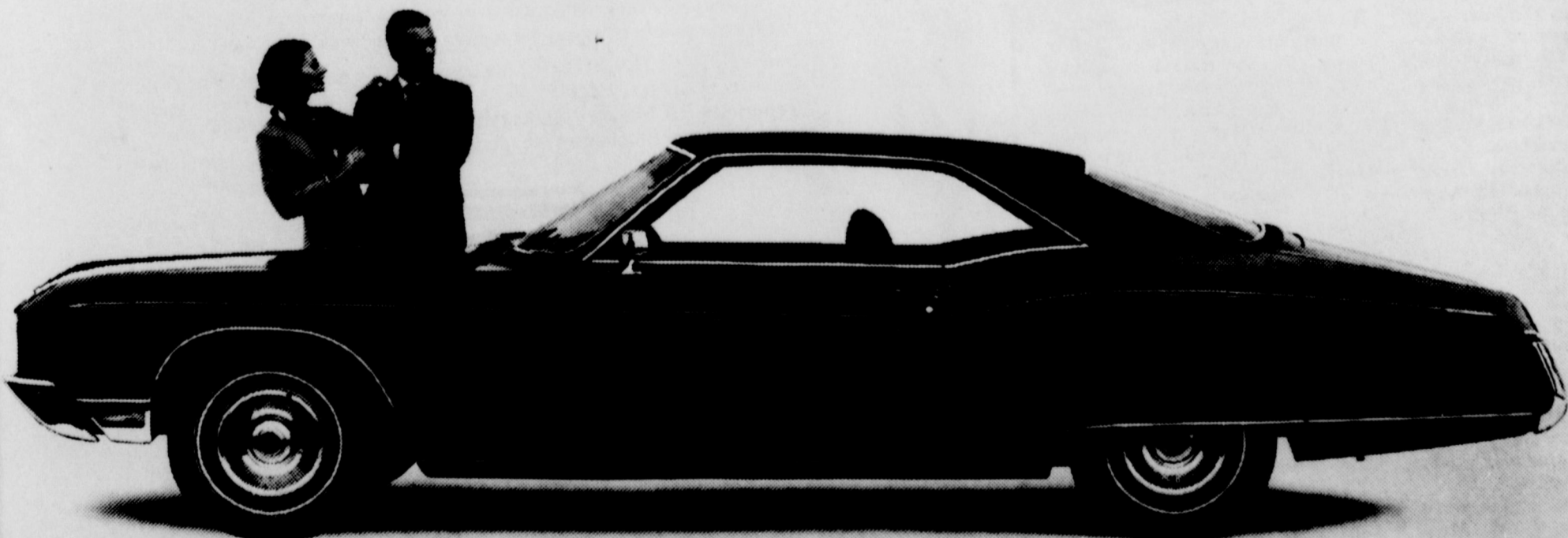

Plans for the year's work and the regional meeting in El Paso in November were made. Miss Laurene Lighthouse, president, gave a detailed report on the state convention.

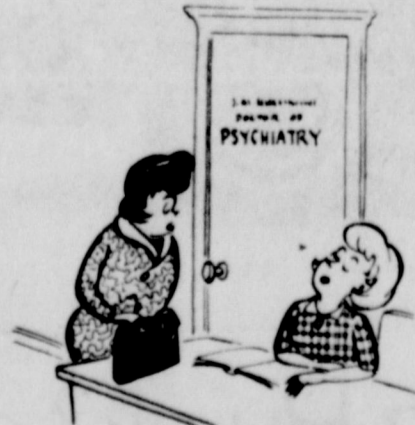

Jack Riggs lost his pickup in Big Canyon just north of FM2400 Monday afternoon. The trailer that he was pulling was salvaged.

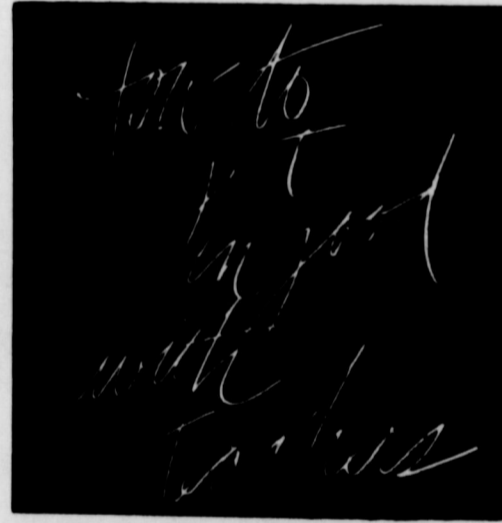
