

In the picture above the railroad bridge just west of the local gas bulk plants on the west side of Sanderson is shown as it appeared Friday morning tollowing a heavy rain and run-off Wednesday night. The channel of the creek is almost at right angles to the openings under the bridge. A rise in the creek tollowing the collection of brush as shoon in the picture might have caused a setious result in forcing the water on to the left which is an extension of Downie St. and paralle's the railroad and Oak St.

The picture at the right shows how some of the water came down Downie St. Wednesday night following the rains west and north. Persons who saw the water jump out of the reek channel teared another slight rise and the recurrence of the conditions of June of 1965. This view is looking west toward the extension of Sanderson Canyon channel and is the path taken by the devastating water four years ago.

The Sanderson Junior High School gridders were blanked by the McCamey teams here last Thursday afternoon before a large crowd of spectators.

Coach Lawrence Barber's 7th graders lost 18-0 and the 5th graders, coached by Norman Gladson, lost 26-0.

The local lads had been out for football only three weeks, according to the coaches and they felt that this was one of the drawbacks, although the McCamey players were just a little better, too, they stated.

Locally, fain gauges showed about 1.2 inches of rainfall on Wednesday night. There were slight show rs again Friday night and Saturday afternoon in Sanderson.

Bill To Curb National Park

A bill co-sponsored by Congressman Richard C. White to prevent misuse of National Park properties passed the House of Representatives today. The House took the action in response to the building of the so-called "Resurrection City" near the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, in 1968.

The bill prevents camping or overnight occupancy or the erection of structures in areas regularly designated for such use, or except for use for national security, official uses, or in case of emergencies arising out of natural disaster.

"This bill will insure that National Park Service properties be used for the purposes for which they were intended," Congressman White said. "It
