There is a spirit that seems to exist that is a commendable asset to the team and school.

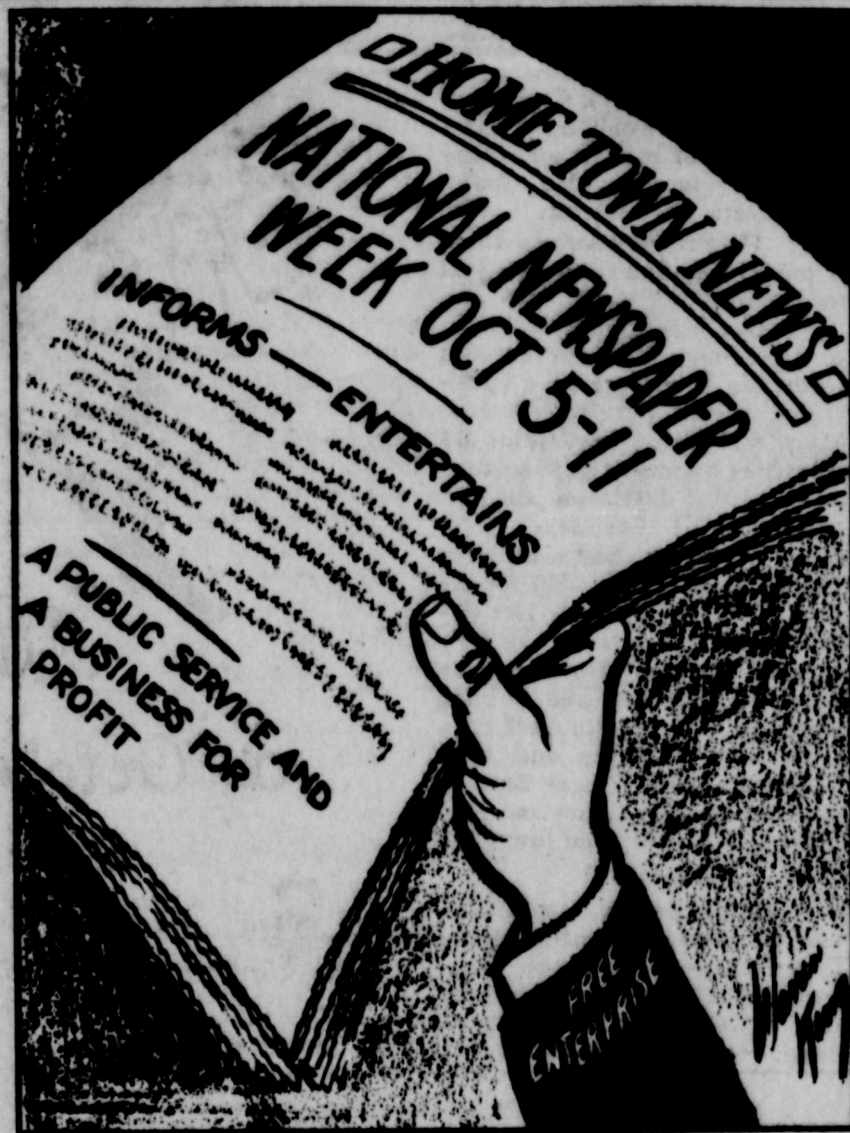
We are proud of the young people for this spirit.

Gregorio Castillo Former Resident, Killed in Vietnam

Gregorio Pedro Castillo of Monahans was killed in action in Vietnam on Sunday, September 21. Services are pending the arrival of the body.

Gregorio was a member of Co. C, 4th Bn., 3rd Infantry of the American Division. The company had set up a night defensive position and were attacked by hostile Viet Cong forces who overran their position and Castillo was killed.

He and his sister, Mary Carmen, who is now Mrs. Pres Escamille III of Monahans, were a nephew and niece of the late Mrs. Pedro Castillo and were adopted and reared by her and her husband familiarly known as "Tamale Pete".

He is survived by another sister, Mrs. Cristina Martinez of Mexico and three brothers, Juan Martinez of Eagle Pass, Manuel Martinez of Los Angeles, Calif., and Francisco Martinez of Chicago, Ill.

Eagles Beat Grandfalls 30-0 Here; To Go To Balmorhea This Friday Night

The Sanderson Eagles thrilled local fans with their 30-0 win over the Grandfalls - Royalty Cowboys here Friday night.

In their first series of offensive plays, the Eagles got on the scoreboard when Manuel Olivas went through the line and 74 yards of Cowboys for the score. James Druse, quarterback, threw a pass to Robert Barron for the two extra points.

During a sustained drive following their reception of the kick-off, Grandfalls worked to the Sanderson 15 where they lost the ball on downs. The Eagles took the ball to the Cowboy 30 before the quarter's end.

Early in the second period the Eagles worked to the Cowboy 6 and fumbled. Grandfalls was contained in their series and punted from the 8-yard line and the Eagles lost the ball on downs on the 10. The Cowboys were forced to punt again, this time from their 16. Olivas ran to the 1-foot line on the next play and from there Leslie Hall took the ball into the end zone for the TD. Another Druse-Barron pass was tried, but was incomplete for the PAT try.

Both Sanderson and Grandfalls lost fumbled footballs in subsequent plays and a pass interference infraction helped the Cowboys gain the Sanderson 27-yard line and the Eagles intercepted an aerial on the next play to give them the ball at the close of the first half.

Grandfalls received the kick-off opening the second half of

play and their series started on their 1-yard line. They punted from inside the 5 and it went to the 19. Three plays later Olivas scored from the 2. Druse ran the ball over for the extra 2 points to bring the score to 22-0.

The hapless Cowboys were forced to punt on their first series from the 36. Sanderson began from the Grandfalls 49 and after a first down drive to the 32, and two plays later Hall broke into the clear for 27 yards and the fourth score. Druse tossed a pass to Mack Turner for the extra two points.

The fourth period was scoreless and most of the play was in the mid-field.

Sanderson Coach Willie Myers was liberal with substitutions during the fourth frame and the Eagles tried to improve their passing game, losing the ball only once by interception.

Besides the thrilling offensive runs by the Eagle backfield and the stalwart defense of the line and secondary when Grandfalls had the ball, a stand-out in the outcome of the game was the kicking game of the Eagles. The punts and kick-offs helped to keep the Cowboys on their end of the field to give advantage to the Eagles when the ball changed hands.

Sanderson will go to Balmorhea Friday night this week to have a practice round with that team and will have a non-district game here with Brackettville October 10 prior to the beginning of counting competition with Van Horn when they come here on October 17.

Program Set For Training Of Handicapped

An exploratory program in vocational training for handicapped adolescents has been funded West Texas Education Center by the Occupational Education and Technology Division of the Texas Education Agency, according to an announcement received last week.

The funding date was September 8 and the program will run through June 30, 1970. A full-time vocational guidance counselor and a vocational instructor will be named later.

The program will be piloted in Fort Stockton, Pecos, Fort Davis, Alpine, Marfa, and Sanderson. The overall objective of the program is to provide the handicapped adolescent with sufficient skills to enter vocational training or work activity in his community. Teachers will be trained to work with each student on an individual basis. The total environment of the student will be considered as evaluation of students' aptitudes, interests, and abilities is conducted as a means of guiding students toward vocational and on-the-job training.

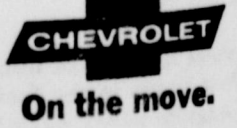

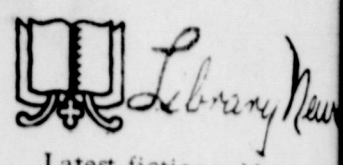
