Diversion Plan For Sanderson Canyon Talked By Schrader

It has been proposed by some Sanderson residents that Sanderson Canyon be diverted into Isinglass Canyon by cutting through a hill on the Gregory ranch about 10 miles west of Sanderson. While this idea has some merit, the following facts should be considered:

1. The difference in elevation from the lowest point in the saddle of the hill to the bottom of Sanderson Canyon is over 80 feet;
2. The length of the most practical route for a diversion would be over 8,000 feet;
3. This would divert only 53% of the drainage of Sanderson Canyon. It would leave Sanderson Canyon unprotected from all of the tributaries of Sanderson Canyon east of the point of diversion including 3-Mile Draw;
4. It would offer no protection to the land, railroad, and highway above the point of diversion.

Schrader also pointed out that the most recent flood-scare to Sanderson was due to rainfall below this point, adding credence to the over-all plan of flood-control structures over the entire watershed.

Eagles Shine in Brackettville Tilt Here; To Begin Conference Play Friday Night

The Sanderson Eagles demonstrated a polished and refined ability here Friday night against the Brackettville Tigers to take the game by a 44-6 score.

The Eagles dominated play throughout the game and there was a liberal use of substitution during the second half and in the final quarter, the Eagle coaches used all of the players who had been able to suit out. James Druse, who had been the starting quarterback, was out of the game due to a pulled muscle sustained in practice during the week and he was replaced by Santiago Flores, back-up quarterback, who ran the team efficiently and demonstrated a pass attack that gives the Eagles a depth in the stellar spot that poses a threat to all opposition.

Brackettville put together a drive in the fourth period that netted their touchdown play, but were unable to get anything going otherwise.

Their dependence on a passing game lost them the ball on several occasions, one of which was an interception and return for a touchdown by Mack Turner.

The Tigers received the first kick-off and punted on their 4th down from their 14. The Eagles began their first offensive series from the Tiger 29 and made their first touchdown from the 12 on a pass from Flores to Turner when Olivas ran over. A pass from Flores to Turner converted the two extra points. On the following kick-off Brackettville fumbled and Raul Ybarra

recovered for the Eagles on the Tiger 37. Three plays took the Eagles to the 29 and a Flores to Turner pass netted the second TD and Bill Littleton ran over the two extras. Littleton set up the next score on a run from the 41 to the 5 and the Flores to Turner aerial combination was successful again. This time the try for the extra points failed.

Brackettville was able to run only nine plays from scrimmage during the first period and punted three times.

In the second period Flores threw a pass to Robert Barron to open play, but there was an ineligible receiver down field and the play was called back. Later Littleton intercepted a pass and combining running plays with Leslie Hall, put the ball just short of the goal from where Flores ran over for the tally.

Turner's pass interception TD run was for 40 yards and Olivas ran over the extra two, putting 36 points on the scoreboard for the first half.

The final Eagle tally was on a sustained drive and Olivas ran over from the 1-foot line with Flores scoring the two points conversion on a pass-option run around the right end.

The Tiger score was about mid-way in the final frame and came on a pass from Roger Rodriguez to Ernest Sandoval on a 41-yard play. The try for extra points failed.

The blocking and team effort on both offense and defense was an outstanding improvement for the Eagles' team this year and these qualities improve with each game.

The Eagles will begin conference play next week, hosting their Van Horn cousins.

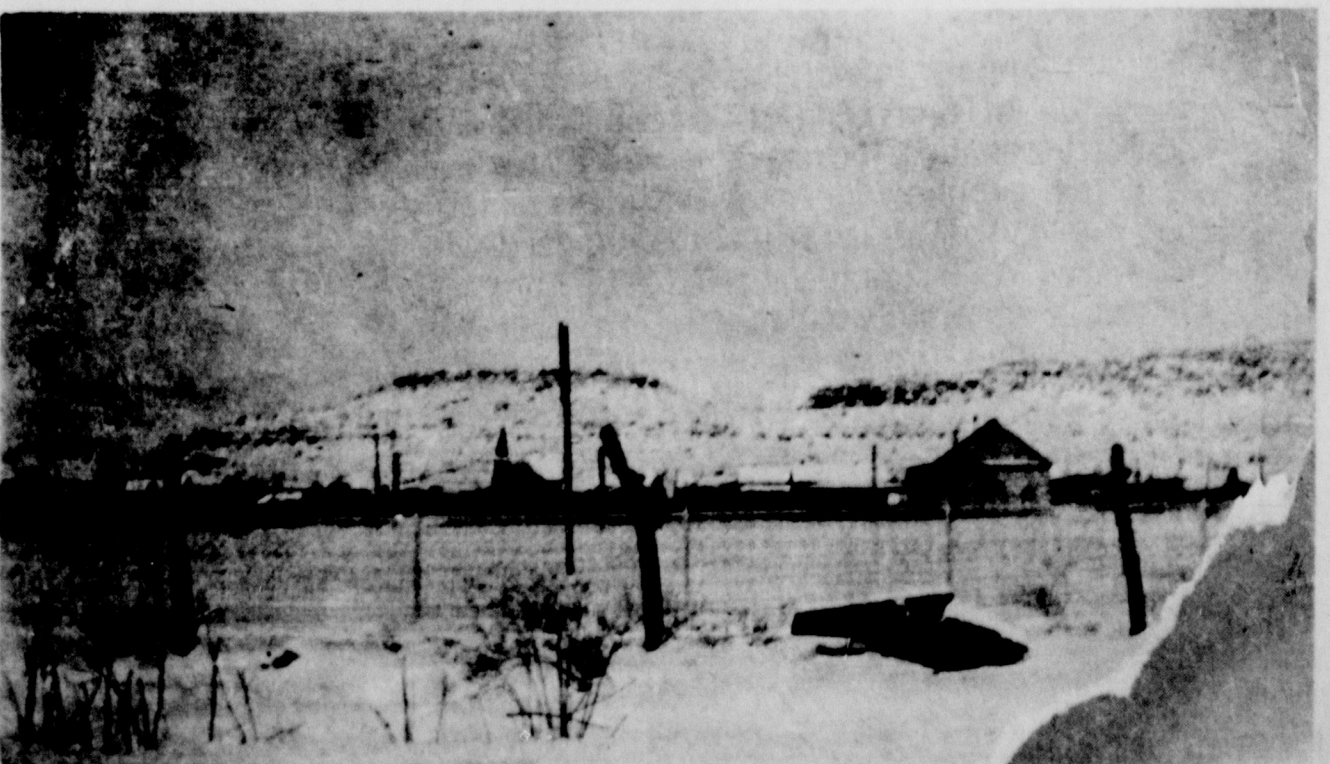

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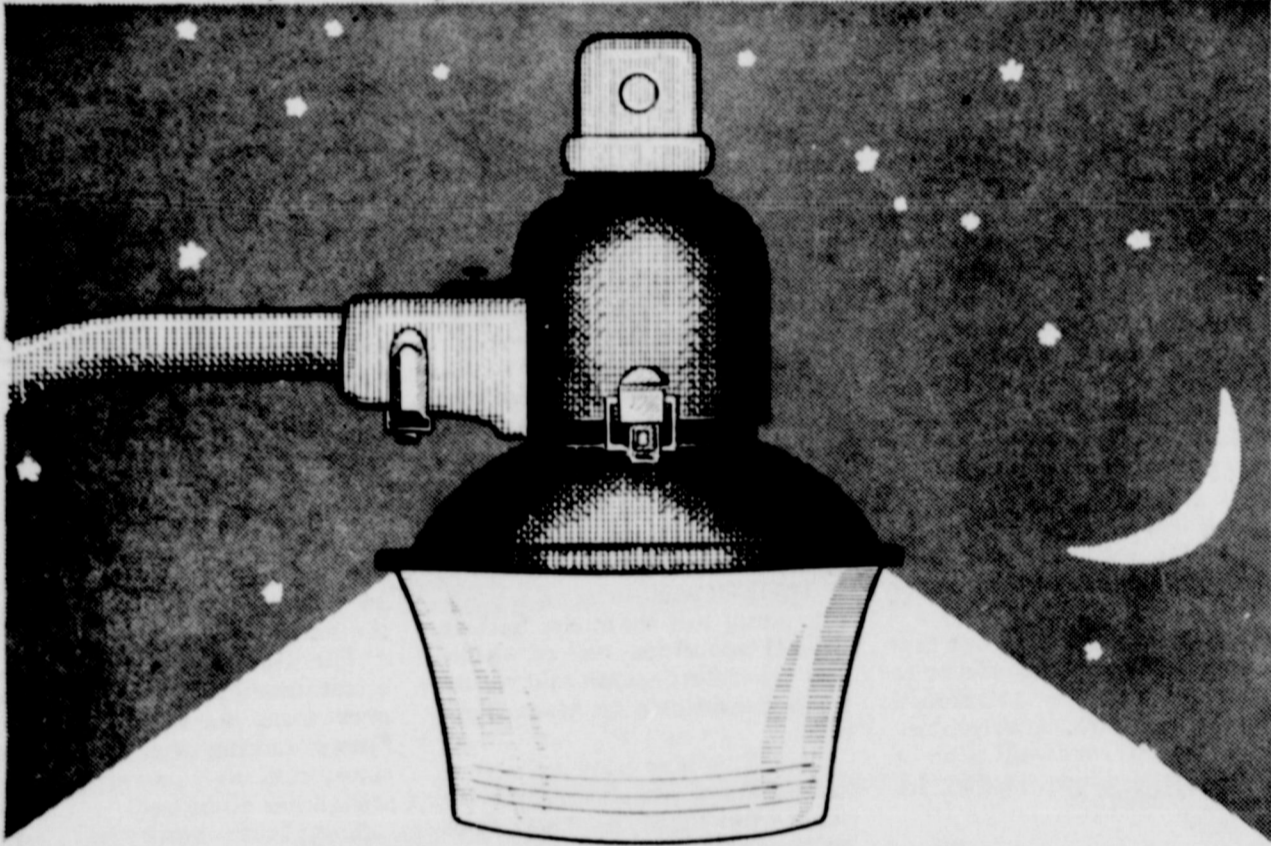
