## Van Horn Tramples Sanderson 43-6; Eagles To Be On Road For Two Games

The Sanderson High School Eagles lost their first conference outing with the Van Horn Eagles here last Friday night by a 43-6 score.

The game gave Sanderson their second loss of the season.

Sanderson received the opening kick-off and fumbled the ball on the third play, giving Van Horn the ball on Sanderson's 21-yard line.

Van Horn's first play took the ball to the 1 and from there Jesus Valdez ran over for the TD. He also booted the extra point.

Following the ensuing kick-off and a first down to the 43, Sanderson had a pass intercepted by Joe Nobles of Van Horn and he ran to the 15. Three plays later Valdez scored again, this time from the 2 and kicked the extra point again.

In their third try with the ball Sanderson started on their 40 after a 35-yard run-back of the kick-off by Manuel Olivas. On their 4th down effort, needing only a yard, the defense keyed on Olivas who got the ball from Santiago Flores, the starter at quarterback, and Sanderson lost the ball on downs. In their offensive series Van Horn scored, with Valdez again getting the honors from the 4. His PAT kick effort was no good and Van Horn had 20 points.

A Sanderson fumble of a Van Horn punt gave the visitors the ball for the fourth time in the opening period.

Sanderson's score came in the second quarter when they got the ball on a Van Horn punt and began driving from their own

19. The drive went to the Van Horn 3 from where Olivas took the ball over. He tried a PAT run which was no good.

Sanderson contained the Van Horn offense in their first series and the visitors punted. In the first play from scrimmage - on the Sanderson 27, the local birds' pass was intercepted by Manuel Carrillo of the visiting team and he had nothing but grass in front of him for 33 yards to the goal line. The kick PAT try was no good and the half ended with a 26-6 score in favor of the visitors.

Both of the bands were on hand for the half-time show and received the plaudits of the fans on both sides of the gridiron.

After the opening kick-off in the second half Van Horn had a setback to their 15 after a loss and penalty and punted to the 35, giving Sanderson good field position. The local Eagles moved the ball to the 26 and lost it on downs. Determination and Van Horn strength moved the ball down in front of the Sanderson's 4 from where Valdez took it over for his fourth tally. Perry Tally carried over for the 2-point conversion.

Sanderson punted on their 4th down and Van Horn did likewise to give Sanderson the ball on the opponents' 45. Sanderson lost the ball on a fumble in the last part of the third frame.

The visitors scored twice in the final period, the first by David Durbin from the 9. The play was set up by a Sanderson fumble following a pass interception by Bill Littleton.

The final tally by Van Horn was a field goal from the 25 by Edward Albeo.

Sanderson will go to Iraan on Friday night and will play Clint there on October 31.

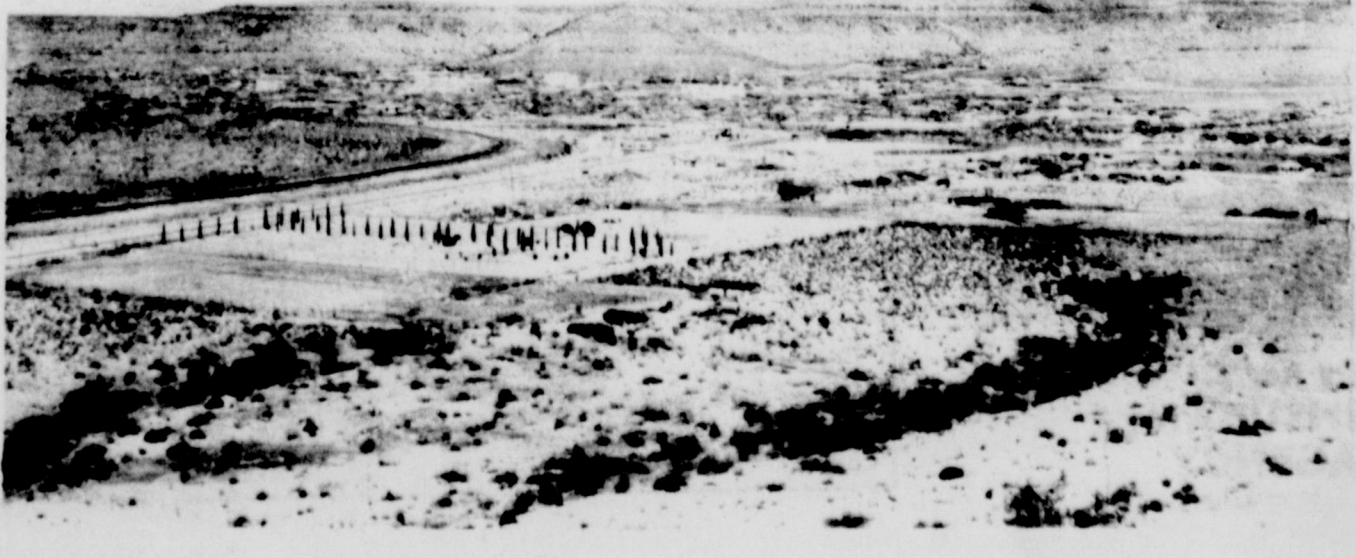

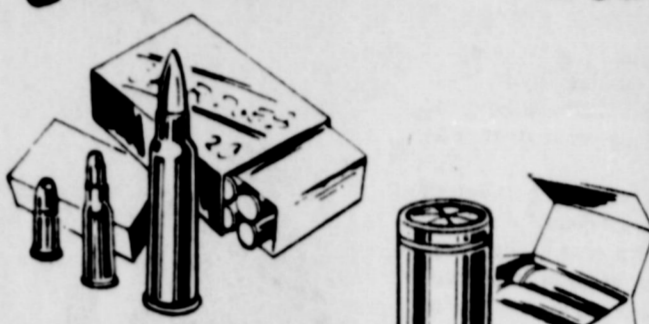

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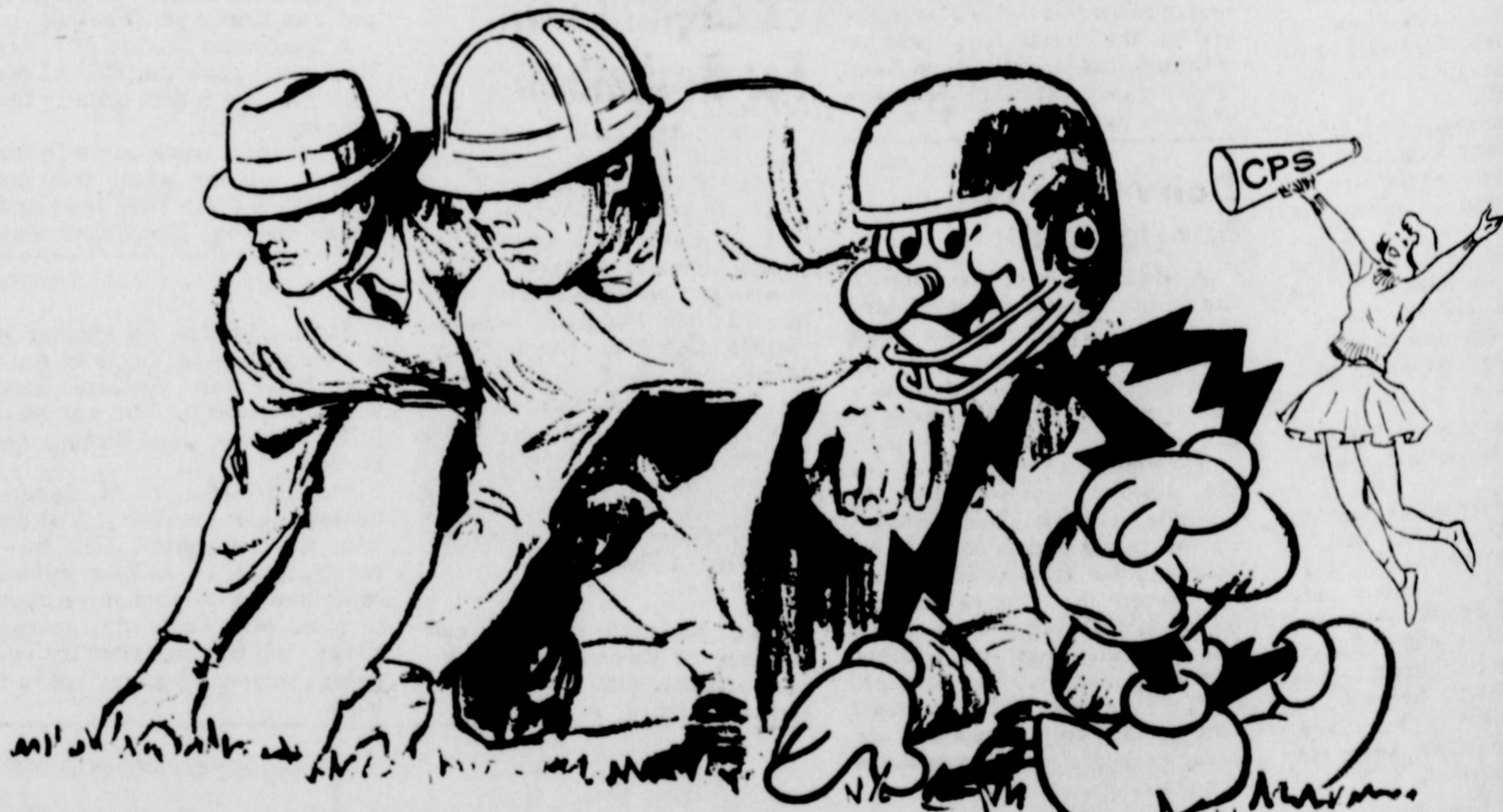
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**Legion Auxiliary

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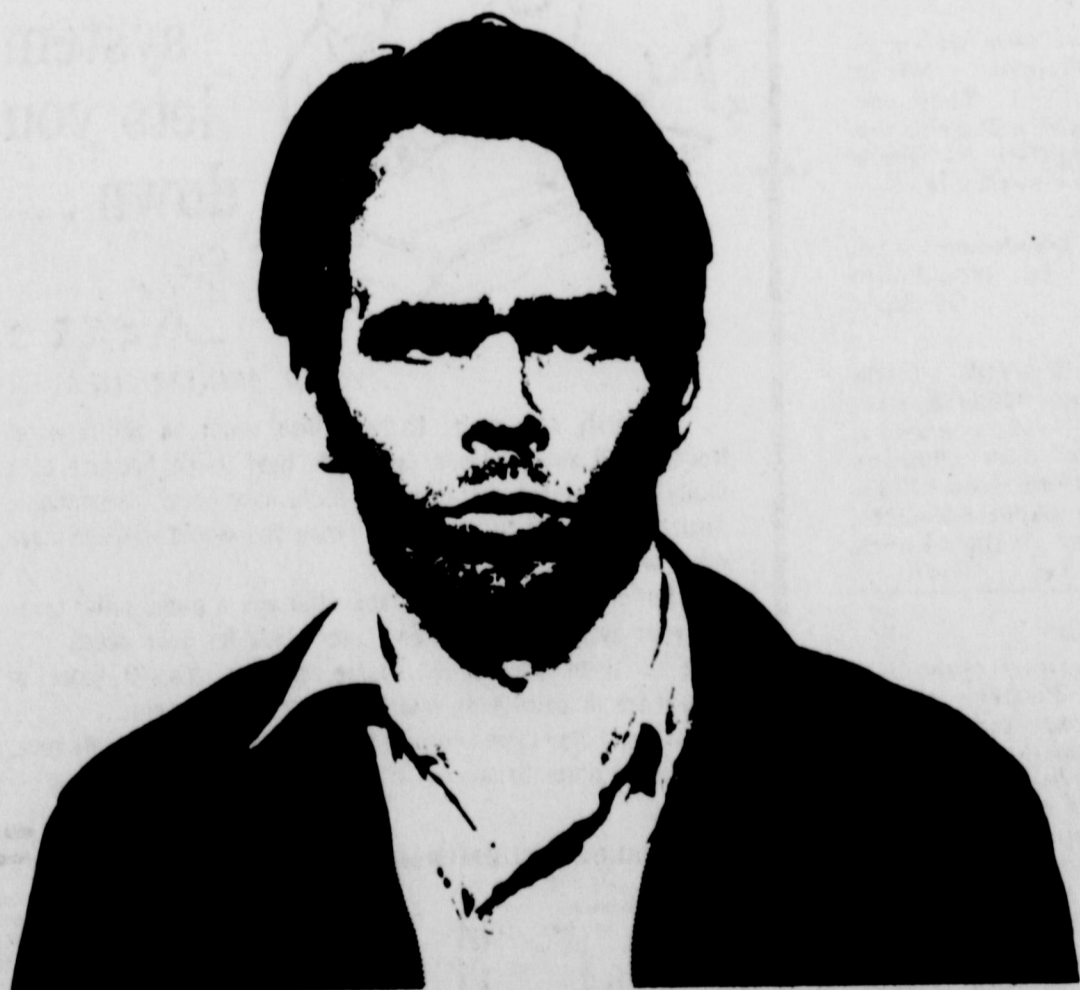
