## Sanderson Edges Clint 26-20 Friday; Will Host Socorro At Homecoming

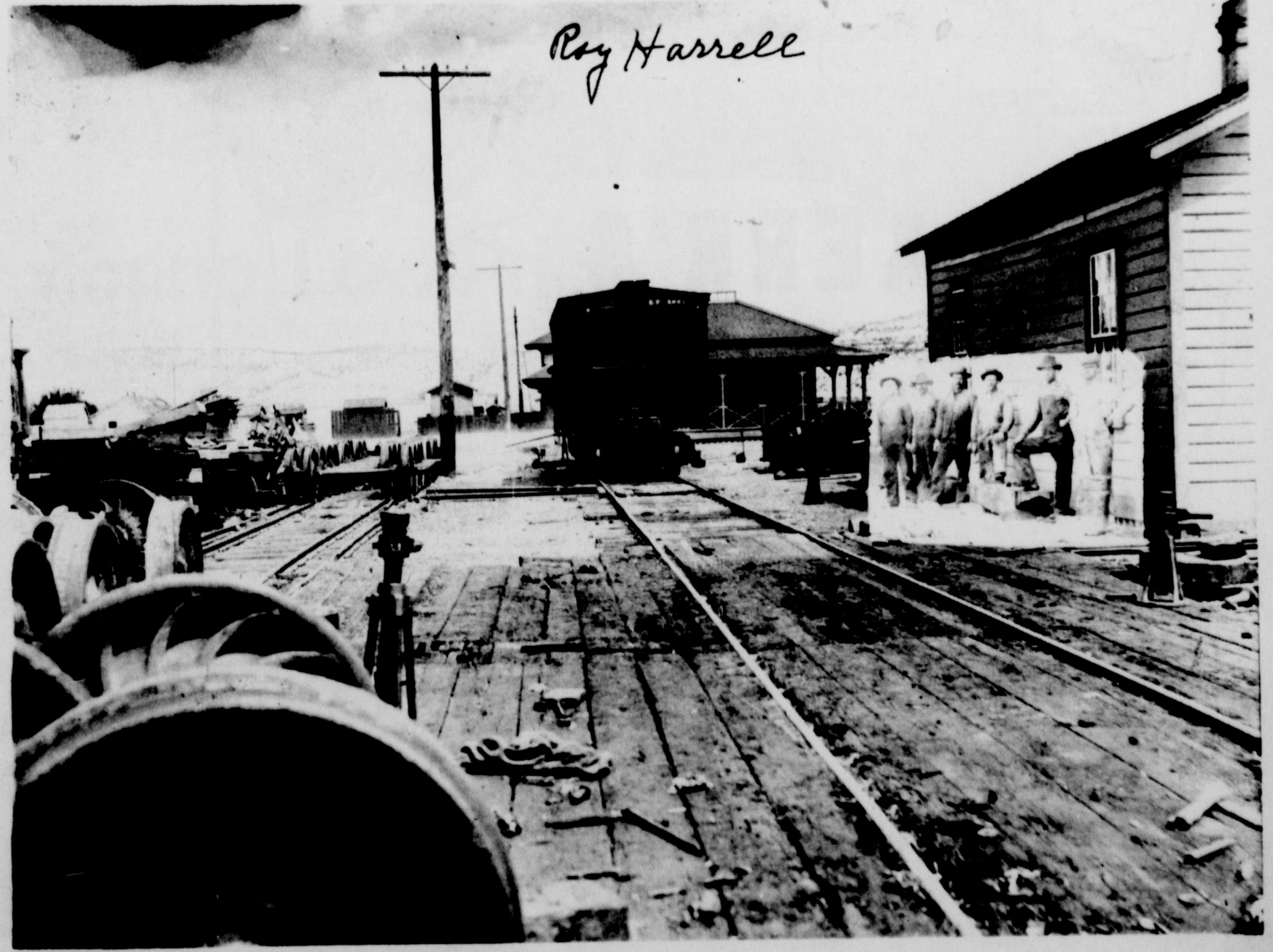
The Sanderson Eagles split up their scoring combinations Friday night to edge out the Clint Lions 26-24 before a homecoming crowd there.  
 Santiago Flores put Sanderson on the scoreboard in the first period when he intercepted a Clint pass and ran 55 yards for the score.  
 In the second period, Bill Littleton caught a pass from James

Druse and scored on a 16-yard play. Leslie Hall scored the two points on the conversion run.  
 Manuel Olivas thrilled the local fans in the third frame with a 50-yard run to pay dirt.  
 The final Eagle tally was by Hall in the final frame on a 7-yard run.  
 Clint's scoring was on a field goal in the first period, two close-in runs in the third frame, and one in the fourth.  
 The scoring threats of Sanderson's offensive team looms large in the final home game of the season which will be this week against the Socorro Bulldogs here, as each of the backs was able to get into the scoring column and the Eagles held up their offensive threat and potential throughout all of the game.  
 The Socorro fray will begin at 7:30 at Eagle Field.

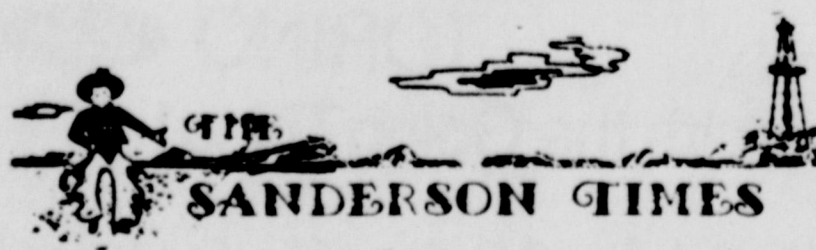

## Bishop Leven Is Named To San Angelo Diocese

Soon after announcement of the assignment of Bishop Thomas Tschoepe to become Bishop of the new diocese of Dallas, the vacancy thus created in the San Angelo diocese was filled by the naming of Bishop Stephen A. Leven as his successor.

The Texas Concho Register outlines the details of the appointment, and the career of the new Bishop, in the following story in Friday, Oct. 24, edition:

"Pope Paul VI has named Auxiliary Bishop Stephen A. Leven of San Antonio to be bishop of San Angelo, Tex.

"The appointment was announced in Washington, Oct. 22 by Archbishop Luigi Raimondi, Apostolic Delegate in the United States.

"Bishop Leven succeeds to a see left vacant by the transfer of Bishop Thomas Tschoepe to the diocese of Dallas.

"The date for the installation of Bishop Leven in San Angelo had not been determined at press time, but it will be released as soon as plans are made for the installation.

"Born in Blackwell, Okla., April 30, 1905, Bishop Leven was a pioneer in the street preaching apostolate, and had served the Church on two continents when he was named titular bishop of Bure and auxiliary bishop of San Antonio in 1955.

"He had been a professor and vice rector of the American College, Louvain, Belgium, from 1935 to 1938, and had held various pastoral assignments in the diocese of Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

"Bishop Leven studied at St. Gregory's College, Shawnee, Okla.; St. Benedict's College, Atchison, Kans.; St. Mary's Seminary, Laporte, Tex., and

at the American College in Louvain.

"He was ordained to the priesthood in St. Mary's church, Ponca City, Okla., June 10, 1928, and took post-ordination studies at Louvain, receiving the doctorate in philosophy.

"After serving as assistant pastor at St. Joseph's Old Cathedral, Oklahoma City, Bishop Leven held pastoral assignments in Bristow, Tonkawa and Enid, Okla.

"During World War II, he was active in providing spiritual care for prisoners of war interned in Oklahoma.

"In May of this year, Bishop Leven was transferred at his own request from a parish he had served for 13 years to be pastor of Sacred Heart church, the oldest parish on the west side of San Antonio."

The new San Angelo bishop has worked in the Roman Catholic San Antonio Archdiocese since 1955. He was ordained as priest at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Ponca, Okla., on June 10, 1928. He has served pastoral assignments in Bristow, Tulsa, Tonkawa and Enid, all in Oklahoma, as well as serving as pastor at St. Joseph's Old Cathedral in Oklahoma City.

Bishop Leven said in Dallas when Bishop Tschoepe was installed, "It is a high privilege to be named by His Holiness Pope Paul VI to the Diocese of San Angelo, established by the genial and saintly Angelo Roncalli, Pope John XXIII."

## A Pot Primer for Parents.

*Now enough basic facts about marijuana to talk to your son and daughter about it.*

As a parent, you're concerned. You read that college, high school, even junior high students smoke marijuana. What about your own son or daughter? Have they tried it? Would they tell you? Do you just keep quiet and hope—do you talk?

Your youngsters may joke about grass, tea, joint, roach, head—words that mean something different to you. They seem to know more about drugs than you do—that's their side of the generation gap. But not all their "facts" may be facts.

*Can you talk frankly to your child about pot?*

As frankly as about other important matters, with tact and mutual respect. It may be easier to start by discussing marijuana experiences he's heard of from his friends. You won't want to come across as accusing or angry—it's as risky to assume he does "turn on" as to assume he doesn't. Keep it simple, direct. And make sure your concern for him, and what happens to him, shows.

*Who uses pot, and why?*

More boys than girls. Girls are likelier to try if their boyfriends smoke it. A majority of young people have not tried it, and have enough self-assurance to resist trying it. A number have tried it once or twice out of curiosity or boredom. A smaller number "turn on" just on weekends. A small percentage become "heads"—their lives centered around marijuana or other drugs, with very little interest in anything else.

*What proven facts about marijuana can you tell him?*

1. Individuals react very differently to this drug, which is why you hear stories of extreme reactions, and stories of no reactions.

2. Reactions vary according to setting, expectation, pattern of use, and the strength of the marijuana (which varies greatly).

3. Because of all these variables, little has been proven conclusively about specific effects of marijuana on the mind

and body. This does not mean there are no ill effects, but that they cannot be catalogued and predicted exactly.

4. Involvement with this drug during the years while the young personality is finding and shaping itself, and learning how to deal with life's problems, is an intangible danger to try to measure, but of deep importance. That's a hard fact for the young to understand.

5. The possession of marijuana is illegal under local laws. In many states, it is a felony, equivalent to the possession of heroin. The laws provide severe penalties. Even being in the company of someone who possesses marijuana may make your child liable for arrest.

*Easy answers to hard questions.*

There aren't any. If your children ask, "What about parents' drinking and smoking?" a partial answer is that your body and personality have matured. Once anyone becomes dependent on any drug, including alcohol and cigarettes, it can be difficult to stop. Even if you're convinced they're harmful.

"Why do adults say marijuana leads to stronger drugs when that hasn't happened to my friends?" A teen-ager's experience is limited; it has happened. While marijuana itself does not lead to other drug use, association with "dealers" and drug users may be the first step to experimenting with LSD, speed and even heroin. And these drugs are far more than a stronger form of pot.

"What about the people who say pot is OK?" To be honest, scientists still don't know everything about the specific effects of marijuana. But certainly, the "authorities" your children quote, know even less. No expert is saying today that pot should be legal.

It boils down to this: Marijuana is a risk nobody has to take. Least of all somebody you care about.

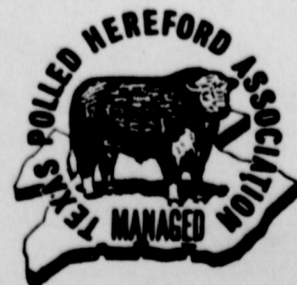
