## E.W. 'Pappy' Meeks Dies In Del Rio, Funeral Last Week

Erin W. (Pappy) Meeks, 71, a former Sanderson resident died early last Wednesday morning in a Del Rio hospital where he had been a patient for a few days. He had been residing in San Angelo two years but had recently moved to Del Rio to make his home with a niece.

Funeral services were in the First United Methodist Church in Sanderson Saturday morning and the body was taken to Marathon for interment. Rev. Albert Peak, pastor, officiated at the rites and the Geeslin Funeral Home of Alpine was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Meeks was born November 11, 1898, in Florida. He was a Navy veteran of World War I, a member of the Legion post at Marathon, and of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. He was a retired engineer for the Southern Pacific Railroad.

## Phone Rates Upped Here

New telephone rates for Sanderson customers became effective Sunday December 21.

"Southwestern Bell had not increased telephone rates for several years despite rising costs," said Bob Hurt, manager for the company. "However, continuing hikes in the cost of business operations have necessitated the rate increase for Sanderson."

Basic rates for one and two party residence service have not changed, Hurt said, although the monthly charge for a residence extension phone went from \$1 to \$1.25.

The one party business rate increased to \$11. It had been \$8.75. The rate for a business extension phone went to \$1.75 from \$1.50.

Rates for both eight party business and residential service went up also, Hurt pointed out. Within five miles of an exchange area boundary, the rural rates now are \$8.80 for a business phone and \$4.25 for a residence line.

Beyond the five mile area, customers will pay the basic rural rates, plus applicable mileage charges.

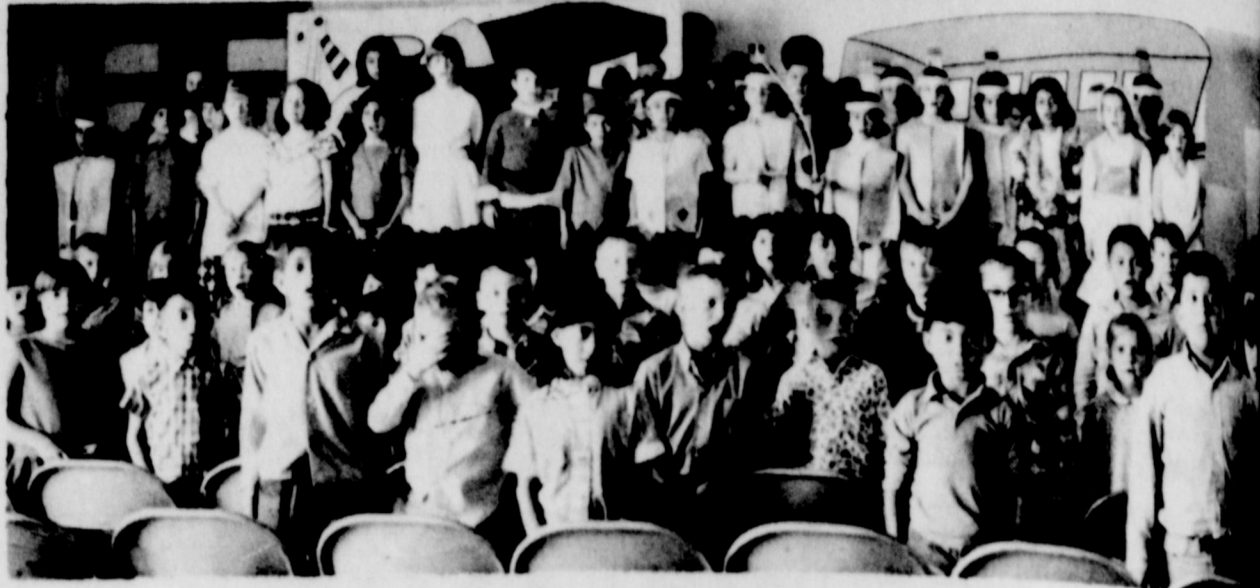



## Terrell Leases Bring Top Price In UT Bidding

This week's land sale (mineral leases) by the University of Texas, put the spotlight for possible wildcat activity on Terrell County and the Ward-Winkler deep gas areas in the bids of oil companies for the tracts offered.

Nearly two million dollars was added to the permanent endowment fund of the University system's land division.

Twenty-three oil companies bid a total of \$1,736,500 for 113 tracts of land covering 37,636 acres. The deep gas potential in Ward and Winkler Counties brought the best prices of the day from the oil companies.

In those two counties 29 tracts totaling 9,130 acres sold for \$797,500. Terrell County came in second when 2,297 acres sold for \$76,000.

Cities Service paid the highest single price of the day when they bid \$180,000 for a 323-acre tract of land in Terrell County. Its price was an average of \$556 per acre for the single tract.

Cities Service also spent the most money after all the bids were tabulated. Its total bill was \$440,000 for nine tracts of land covering 2,913 acres.

Getty Oil was the second biggest money spender when it paid \$380,000 for eight tracts of land covering 2,402 acres.
