# LISTEN TO LUKE

One could hardly say that the political pot is beginning to boil with the announcement of only one candidate for nomination by the Democrats, but there is one announcement at this writing and more are expected to announce for re-election. Or so they said!

There are some who like the "pla," of politics, who like to see opposition in a political race for the sake of opposition, and there are some who do not like the strife of political races or anything else. We would not advocate that no person in a political office should not have an opponent, but it is difficult to have an opponent for a local race without the creation of some ill will, hard feelings, or just plain animosity.

Since these things are a natural by-product of "local" politics sometimes, and since sometimes people feel compelled to seek an office - either for reasons of their own or to be the tool of some other person or faction - then hard feelings have to result seemingly. But that doesn't make it good, does it?

We suppose the best way to get around any situation of that kind is for a person to find an office that no one wants - like county surveyor or county weigher, and do such a good job during his first term that no one would think of opposing him, and then not seek re-election since some feel that one term in office is long enough and two terms is the end of any consideration and three terms is an autocratic take-over of the office. And the county surveyor or county weigher who expects to have a successful one term certainly had better be in a county where there is only one political party primary or he will not and cannot be popular with the minority party members, even if they did not have a candidate, and regardless of the name of the minority group.

There seems to be a likelihood that there will be a third party again this year, according to what we heard on the tube Sunday. And if this is so, there are some things that the voters should be aware of and then be governed by their desires; as we expect they would be anyway. It is illegal and next to impossible to vote in the primary of two parties. In voting in any primary one ties himself - in a manne of speaking - to that party through the general election and yet nomination in the Democratic Party - in this county, at least - is tantamount to election because of the strength of that party in that area.

And speaking of general elections, since it is commonly know that there is a lot of ballot-splitting in general elections which are in November, and since a nominee in any party is not assured of an election, there has to be campaigning up to the time of the election. This runs from February to November and that is too long. There is no reason why there should be such a long time between the primaries and the general coction in our humble opinion. # Only 507 Voters Are Registered

Only 507 Terrell County residents have registered to vote in elections during this year, according to Mrs. A. J. Hahn, deputy tax assessor-collector. The deadline for registration is January 31.

There will be an election for school trustees this year as well as primaries in the respective parties and the general election in November. Also proposed, and following the customs of the past, there will be several constitutional amendments up for approval or rejection by the voters of the state.

It has been pointed out that any election that comes up during the current year will be voted only by those having registered and that this year there are no exemptions from registration as a qualification for voting. This is mentioned so that those who possibly have no interest in the selection of any of the local, county, or state officials may be interested in voting in something like a bond election, were one to be called, and they met the other qualifications for voting in such elec-

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

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


