## LISTEN TO LUKE

Albert: ---  
Free immunization against typhoid is available for the asking at the office of Dr. A. N. Clanton. Everyone should have the vaccine and help prevent the disease ever occurring. Ask your neighbors to be sure they have been immunized and all them of the free service if they haven't. We all took the typhoid shot on a cube of sugar many years ago and it's the same type of immunization.

Dr. Clanton stated that this year that there is expected to be an outbreak of rubella or German measles and that there is word that the vaccine will be available soon from the State Department of Health, but it is not known when. The regular immunization is available and those who are not immune should talk to their doctor. There are some conditions for not taking the vaccine but you should find out.

Last week we got word from the Health Dept. that an inspection had been made of the jail in April and the local facility fell far short of the minimum standards for county jails required by Article 5115, Texas Civil Statutes. The details of the inspection were forwarded to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson and County Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

Without going into the long list of shortcomings required by law, they include: insufficient number of cells to segregate prisoners by classes; retention of insane prisoners; filings less than required; entrance to the cell block through a safety vestibule; living one or more interior rooms in addition to the main outside door, all arranged to be unlocked, etc.; outside of any such enclosure; some prisoners have direct access to windows in walls of building; one-prisoner cells not equipped with water closet and sink; fountain-lavatory; multi-prisoner cells do not have water closet and lavatory; fountain for each 12 prisoners; fraction thereof; mattresses and blankets were dirty at time of inspection; multi-use eating and drinking utensils should be sanitized after use and the proper procedure was given to accomplish this.

So, on top of our need for drainage procedure improvement and work done on the streets--along with the continual and perpetual need for good and efficient trash pick-up and disposal, and a thousand and one other chores, needs, and costly items, we have this new need to look at. But who is going to be responsible for this complicated?

It may appear to many of the younger generation that everything is not being done that needs to be done, but when they are able and willing to start helping to foot the bills, the responsibility, the manpower, the technology, and when they accept the consequences, they will feel they will be a little better off.

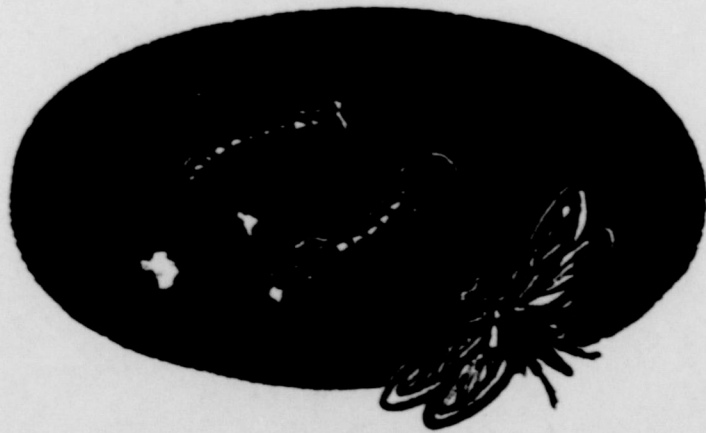
