Work Begun On Stadium Projects

Work began last week on the construction of bleacher seats and a press box on the north side of the football field. W. W. Sudduth and O. T. Sudduth received the contract from the school board.

There will be five tiers of concrete bleachers added to the existing tiers in the center of the field. The new seats will be an upward and northward extension.

The call for bids specified the tiers to be approximately 94 feet wide, with seats 30 inches wide and 12 inches high.

A press box, specified to be six feet by 12 feet will be on the top row and in the middle of the new part of the stadium. It will have a glass front with a wooden cover and railing around the top so that the top of the press box may be used for picture taking.

Year May Cut Some SS Income

Texas school teachers and other school employees who are social security beneficiaries may not receive the usual three full months' social security benefits this year because of the extension of the school year, according to H. P. Thomas, social security manager.

Under the new Minimum Foundation Program, students in Texas are required to attend classes 180 days; class-room teachers will work 190 days; counselors and administrative personnel will work 200 days. The longer school year, plus teacher workshops which precede the actual classroom work will mean that teachers and others may begin work in August, rather than September.

Social security benefits are paid to beneficiaries who do not earn more than \$140 in a month. It is believed that beneficiaries who are school teachers, counselors, administrative personnel, and some other employees - may earn over \$140 in August. In such cases, the benefit check normally received on September

3, will not be due. Daily wages of school employees can be computed in the following way. Divide the annual salary by the number of working days. For example, an annual salary of \$5,-700 divided by 190 days (classroom teacher) equals \$30 per day. Therefore, a teacher with the salary of \$5,700 who works 5 days in August, will earn \$150 and will not be entitled to social security benefits for August. All beneficiaries who believe their earnings will exceed \$140 in August should notify the social security office.
