School Opening Details Are Set

The Terrell County Independent School District will begin the school year with a week of in-service and work days for the teachers. Effective this year the teachers will have an additional 10 days of in-service work.

One major change will be the relocation of the superintendent's office to the elementary building. This change will reduce the faculty by one and will be a savings to the school district. Another major change will be the moving of the fifth grade, as a self-contained unit, to the junior high building.

The following schedule will be followed for registration: August 18 - Seniors, 8th grade, kindergarten at 9:00 a.m.; juniors, 7th grade, 3rd and 4th grades at 1:30 p.m.

August 19 - Sophomores, 6th grade, 1st and 2nd grade at 9:00 a.m.; freshmen, 5th grade, 1:30 p.m.

Students are asked to bring a pen and pencil to registration and be at the proper place on time. Students will fill out age, grade, and registration cards nd be given insurance forms. When the A. G. R. card is signed by the parent and is properly filled out, books will be issued. Early or late registration will be done only in emergency cases.

Wayne Mitchell, high school principal, should be contacted in case a student needs to register early or late and he will take care of emergency regis trations for junior high school students as Jack Cosby, junior high principal, will still be enrolled in school during registration. Supt. Carroll B. Card will handle emergency registrations for the elementary students in the principal's office of that building. High school students are asked to report to room 1 in that building; junior high students, to room 1 in that building; and elementary students will meet in the auditorium in that building. All students who will be five years old on or before August 31 and plan to attend kindergarten should bring a birth certificate to registration. First grade students enrolling in the local schools for the first time should also bring a birth certificate to registration. Effective Sept. 1, 1954, all students beginning in the first grade must show proof that they have been vaccinated against smallpox or show doctor's certificate that the student is immuned or that vaccination would be considered injurious to the health of the student.

Atoka Gas Strike In Terrell County By Brown-Bassett

An Atoka gas discovery was assured in Terrell County with the flowing of gas at the maximum rate of 3, 465, 000 cubic feet daily at Skelly Oil Co., Midland, No. 1 CITGO-University, in 13-34 University, 31 miles northeast of Dryden, six miles northwest of the Brown-Bassett, North (Fusselman gas) field and nine miles north of Wolfcamp, Devonian and Ellenburger production in the northwest portion of the Brown-Bassett field.

Opened up on a 1/2 inch choke after perforations at 11, 523-538 feet had been acidized with 1,000 gallons, plus 400 cubic feet of nitrogen per barrel, with tubing pressure of 2,200 to 300 pounds, it flowed load water and acid gas.

Changed to a 20-64 inch choke, it flowed gas at the rate of 3, 260, 000 cubic feet daily, with tubing pressure of 2, 040 pounds the first hour; at the rate of 3, 208, 000 cubic feet daily, with tubing pressure of 1, 990 pounds the second hour; the rate of 3, 208, 000 cubic feet daily with tubing pressure of 2, 010 the third hour, and at the rate of 3, 465,000 cubic feet daily, with tubing pressure of 1, 580 pounds, the next 45 minutes.

Shut in for 2 1/2 hours, tubing pressure increased to 3,325 pounds.






