Enrollment Down 26 From Last Year As '70 Term Begins

Enrollment in Terrell County
 Schools is down 26 from the be-
 ginning day of school last year,
 according to figures released by
 Carroll B. Card, superintendent,
 Monday afternoon.
 In the kindergarten and first
 four grades - all housed in the
 elementary building - there
 are: 33, 35, 26, 41, 35, for a
 total of 170;
 In the junior high building -
 5th through 8th grades - there
 are 40, 30, 38, 34, for a total
 of 142;
 In the 9th through the 12th
 grades, housed in the high
 school building, there are 42,
 34, 35, 28, for a total of 139,
 making 451 students in all.
 There was a total of 477 en-
 rolled last year, according to
 Supt. Card.

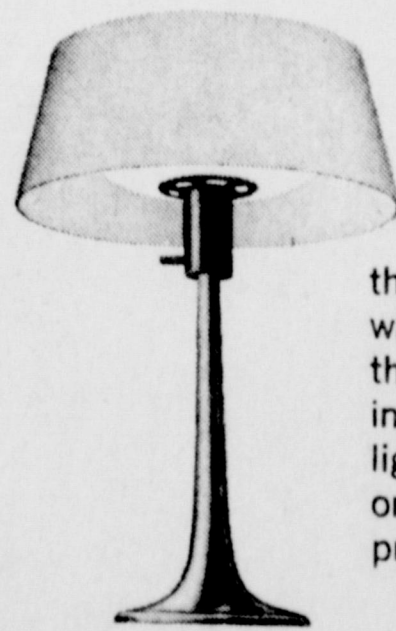
