## Federal Help To Local Schools For 199 Disadvantaged

Congressman Richard C. White has announced the allotment by the Office of Education, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, of \$1,937,759.49 to the public schools of the 16th District under Title I of the elementary and secondary education act.

Each school district determines whether to apply for its allotted funds.

Federal grants under this title are for special programs for educationally disadvantaged children. They are based on the number of children from low-income families, families receiving assistance under the Aid to Dependent Children provisions of the Social Security Act, and children under public care in institutions or foster homes. There are 13, 209 qualifying children in the 16th District, according to figures supplied Congressman White by the Office of Education.

The allottment for Terrell County is 199 children, the same that has been reported for the past three years, and the amount is \$29, 193. 29.
