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

This fact is and has been known for some time and there has been much conversation in past years about the possibility, but like the weather, there has been a lot of talk, but no one does anything about it!

One of the facts that is always brought up is the fact that there is no hospital here, and it is said by some that a hospital is almost a "must" for such a facility as a retirement center. We would agree that it should be a very desireable thing. And then another hitch comes along which comes first?

In more or less re-hashing the conversations, and thinking out loud, so to speak, the question would arise that if one had the hospital, then it would be much easier to attract those who are living the retired life. By the same token, if we had a larger population, retired or not, then it would be much easier to get a hospital. The same thing holds true with the personnel to staff a hospital. Certainly, it would be difficult to get them without a hospital, but a hospital does not assure a staff of adequately trained people to operate a hospital.

And the same is true in a building to house retirees, a necessary item, for sure. Would it be simple to assure occupancy if one had the facility built, or if one could see the need for such a building only after the retired people moved to town.

Which comes first? And who would want to foot the bill for the beginning of the

Some have said that there is help available from the government always in building a hospital. The town has been through this before - and this is true, but there are some circumstances other than just filling out the check for the cost of what people think they would need in hospital facili-

Alien Address Reports Are Due

J. B. Bannahan, deputy district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service in El Paso, reminded today that the annual alien address report program is again under way. "Federal law requires all non-citizens in the U.S., with a few exceptions, to report their addresses during the month of January each year," Mr. Bannahan pointed out. "This is true even though the alien's address is unchanged since the last report. Wilful failure to comply with this requirement could result in serious consequences," he added.

Forms with which to make

the reports are available at all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and at all post offices. Trained personnel in all offices of the Immigration service are available to assist aliens in complying with the law, but this assistance is not available in all post offices, according to Mr. Bannahan.

The parent or legal guardian of an alien child under 14 years of age must fill out the form for the child, and a person who is ill may send for a form by a friend or relatives who can return it to the clerk after it has been completed by the alien.

"To caution aliens as well as employers that possession of a Social Security card by an alien is not evidence of permission from the Immigration and Naturalization Service for the alien to work in the United States. Only those aliens lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence (immigrants) and those aliens temporarily in the United States

They were elected in the general election in November.



(non-immigrants) who have been authorized by the service to take employment may work in this country. Aliens working in the United States in violation of law may be subject to certain penalties. Any alien or employer of aliens having questions concerning the employment of aliens should consult with the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service", Mr. Bannhanan advised.



MISSIONARY TO SPEAK AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH


Rev. Ben H. Bateman, who has been in the missionary field in Korea, will speak at the First Presbyterian Church Monday night at 7:30.




